### Day use fees...

You will read on the front page of this issue that the US Army Corps of Engineers will be implementing a charging system to utilize the recreational areas of Sutton Lake. Yes, they have charged to use the launch ramps for some time, but this will be a first for local residents and tourists to have to pay \$5 per car to park on the paved areas of Bee Run or behind the Dam. That means \$5 if you want to go swimming; \$5 if you want to take your child to the playground; \$5 if you want to go walking or hiking on public property... the list goes on.

The only thing that the \$5 fee does not apply to is the customers at the Marina, that is assuming you can find a space on their already overcrowded gravel parking lot. The lot is too small to accommodate the boat owners and their guests as it is. The Corps has previously refused to allow the marina operator to enlarge the parking area.

Now we have a new Marina owner taking over this year and this can't be good for business. I have seen hundreds of people come to the Marina, buy a hotdog and soda or ice cream cone and walk along the shoreline and enjoy mother nature. Now we will have to pay \$5 for that privilege. How devastating will this be to the local economy?

To make matter worse, they only take plastic. You can't pay in cash. A lot of lower-income citizens patronized our lake by taking their children swimming or fishing along the bank. Many don't have credit cards. Regardless, if they want to continue that privilege, it will cost ... you guessed it... \$5.

The same will apply when I invite someone to come to my boat for an afternoon. If it's the weekend, they will not be able to park in the gravel lot, particularly now. How much will it cost my children and grandchildren to be able to spend time with us this summer like they have in the past?

It is as if the Corps prefers to have less use of the recreational facilities. Oh, wait, on more then one occasion, I have had people in the upper echelon of the Corps tell me that flood control was their prime directive and everything else fell to a distant second.

In the nearly 50 years I have been behind this desk I have had multiple encounters with the Corps of Engineers. Some have been really rewarding and others... not so much. Way back, a group came up with a plan that entailed use of some property at the mouth of Bee Run. We had a series of meetings with the Corps before they said no. One of the interesting things that came from those meeting was a local resident provided a Master Plan for Sutton Lake, developed by the Corps when they first conceived the proposal of building the Dam. It was obviously a piece intended to soften the blow of condemnation of hundreds of acres of Braxton County property. It was amazing what the Corps promised to provide in exchange for taking the land. Most of those amenities never came to fruition. In fact, that Master Plan seems to have disappeared. Now the Corps is taking it to a new level and going to charge us \$5 a day to swim in our own lake. While I'm not surprised. I really, really don't like it.



It's been two weeks since the GSU Lady Pioneers basketball team won the national championship. Previously scheduled spring break at GSU delayed an on-campus celebration, but the week did not dampen the enthusiasm and appreciation of what this team accomplished. A tremendous celebration was held last Wednesday at the Waco Center and in downtown



Glenville. After the parade, the team was met with a thunderous ovation from residents of central West Virginia, school students from several counties, and the GSU student population. Even WVU Basketball Coach and Hall of Fame Coach Bob Huggins traveled in from his hectic schedule to visit with and congratulate Coach Kim Stephens and the Lady Pioneers players, coaches, and staff.

It was indeed a great day to be a Pioneer. As I write this Sunday night, I've been reviewing Department of Veterans Affairs regarding its Asset and Infrastructure report (AIR), released in mid-March. Some of the recommendations are causing concerns across our state for our veteran's population I've always been appreciaand their families. After reviewing the report, I share their concerns and how it could adversely impact our veterans in West Virginia.

The AIR Commission will conduct public hear-

ings as part of its review of the VA's recommendations before submitting its own recommendations to the president for review in 2023. When these public hearings are scheduled, I urge everyone to voice their opinions in support of keeping current services available at Huntington, Clarksburg, and Beckley VA facilities. Meanwhile, contact the members of our congressional delegation and respectfully insist they do everything possible to ensure our veterans need not travel further for medical care and treatment. Veterans have put their lives on the line for us. They deserve our help and support.

On a different topic, I don't often venture into the personnel decisions of the Executive branch of West Virginia government agencies. but at times over the past twenty-six years, I've called out the less-than-helpful agency chiefs and personnel that fail to assist constituents respectfully, accurately, and promptly. Likewise, tive and vocal in the praise of those senior level workers that go the extra mile to serve the citizens of our state. This week, I'm very concerned over the yet unexplained departure of DHHR Deputy

Secretary Jeremiah Samples.

Over the years, for the hundreds of problems, concerns, and inquiries that have involved DHHR at every level, I've counted on Jeremiah to be a thorough, prompt, and highly knowledgeable source of help and information when trying to navigate the behemoth agency. Prior to his coming to DHHR from the Office of the Insurance Commissioner, DHHR often kept legislators and the public in the dark, stalled on providing requested information, or simply never responded without calling the Governor's office in frustration. Chances are if you've ever asked me for information or help from DHHR, Jeremiah Samples was my first call. I never had to call a second time. In short, he'd tell you what you needed to know; not what you wanted to hear.

Jeremiah has consistently been a great asset to legislators from both parties and the citizens we serve. It would be a terrible disservice if his departure was because he helped everyone, not just one party. His absence at DHHR will be sorely missed. 





Throughout the month of April, the staff of Mon Health System encourages the public to learn more about autism, one of the fastest growing developmental disabilities in the United States. Supporting, educating, and advocating for autistic individuals will make a difference in the lives of the patients the System serves.

"Autism was considered to be very rare when I started working in this field in 1985," said Marc Ellison, Ed.D., LPC, Executive Director of the WV Autism Training Center at Marshall University. "The prevalence then was estimated to be 4 to 5 per 10,000 children. Today, CDC studies show prevalence rates in 8-year-old children to be 1 in 44. As we've learned more about autism over the years, we've learned to better identify, diagnose, and assess need."

Autism, or autism spectrum disorder (ASD), refers to a broad range of conditions characterized by challenges with social skills, repetitive behaviors, speech and nonverbal communication. Characteristics typically appear during the first three years of life.

in West Virginia, the WV Autism Training Center (WV ATC) was established in 1984 at Marshall University. The Center provides services to those with autism spectrum disorder as well as their families, educators, and others significant in their lives. Since its inception, the Center has served nearly 4,000 families and over 5,000 educators

"There are several important considerations a family makes when a child is first diagnosed with autism, one of the most important is finding available resources," Dr. Ellison continued. "Resources - such as skillbuilding therapies, speech and language training, and occupational therapy-can be challenging to access here. The Center provides several types of services statewide, and one of those is facilitating periodic cohorts for parents of newly diagnosed children. These cohorts help parents better understand autism, identify resources, and offer an opportunity to become part of a community of people who share their experiences."

A second resource available is the Autism Society of West Virginia, a state chapter of the Au-Fortunately for those tism Society of America.

The state society is made up mostly of parents and caregivers and is focused on helping parents find and access services. Parents may register with the WV Autism Training Center by calling 304-696-2840. Christine Fair, President of the Autism Society of WV, can be reached at 304-224-2769.

As part of educating West Virginians about ASD, the Center is providing a screening for the award-winning documentary "In A Different Key". An extraordinary narrative history of autism: the riveting story of parents fighting for their children's civil rights; of doctors struggling to define autism; of ingenuity, self-advocacy, and profound social change. The viewing will be on April 19 from 9:30 AM to 12:30 PM at the Marquee Cinema, Pullman Plaza in Huntington.




