Day use fees to be charged at Sutton Lake beginning May 1

Collection of day-use fees will begin at Sutton Lake on May 1, 2022. The fee amount will be the same charged to use the launch ramp in the past. However, only credit card payments will be accepted going forward - no cash will be collected or accepted. Automated fee machines have been installed in Bee Run and at the South Abutment areas and visitors will be expected to pay the \$5 fee to use the areas. Customers will receive a receipt to display in their vehicle dashboard where the date can clearly be seen. Park Rangers will periodically check the vehicles within the recreation areas to ensure payment. Once the fee is paid, it is

good for all day use areas that day.

The fee machines have been situated along the entry road to make payment quick and convenient to visitors, according to Corps of Engineers authorities. Customers with Annual Passes, Senior Passes, Access Passes or other relevant America the Beautiful Passes, do not need to stop at the fee machines; passes should be properly displayed in the vehicle dash so they can be seen from the outside of the vehicle.

Annual Day Use passes may be purchased at the fee machines for \$40. Customers have 10 days to take their Annual Pass receipt to the Lake Office or to the Gerald R.

Freeman Campground Entrance Station to exchange it for a hard pass.

According to the Corps, boat users have been assessed these fees since 1996 and have competed for parking and amenity usage with other visitors who were not assessed the fee. All vehicles parked in Bee Run and the South Abutment areas will be expected to pay the day use fee. Marina customers should consult with the marina operators for instructions.

Saturday, April 16th is National Healthcare Decisions Day (NHDD), a nationwide initiative that encourages adults of all ages to plan ahead of a health crisis. When health decisions are made ahead

of time, those wishes are put in writing, which brings peace of mind for the individual and their families. "The issue of knowing what to do in a serious health situation helps to eliminate the stress of making tough decisions for you and/or a loved one," says a WV Caring spokesperson.

"This takes the burden away from wondering if you have done what your loved one wanted." It is important to enable your caregivers to advocate for you when you are unable to do so for yourselves. Board of Ed recognizes Math Field Day winners

The Braxton County Board of Education opened their most recent meeting on April 5 by recognizing Math Field Day winners. All first thru third place winners were announced and recognized for their achievements. Present to receive their awards were the following students, Emma Liston, Claire Duckworth, Holden Lloyd, Bailey McCallister, Audrey Duckworth, Owen McCallister, and Adam Cosner.

The next big item discussed was the approval of the lowest bid for the Braxton County Middle School gymnasium floor and bleachers renovation. The two bids that had been received for the project were presented by Chris Campbell, representative of ZMM Architects. On a motion by Evelyn Post, with a second by Dr. Kenna Seal, the board approved the bid of \$217,412, submitted by City Construction Company of Clarksburg, which will include a refinishing and widening the floor, painting new graphics and new bleachers with the seating capacity of 440 individuals. The winning bid also included two additional bids for the wall safety pads under the

baskets and painting the walls of the gym. Over \$14,000 has been raised to go toward the project which will begin in the summer and should be completed by mid-October.

Campbell also discussed the flooding issue at Flatwoods Elementary. He recommended hiring someone to camera the drainage lines to check for obstructions and blockages. His company recommends then to place a concrete ditch near the playground for water flow to connect to perimeter drain lines.

Rebecca DeNuzzo spoke to the board with the two calendar options developed by the calendar committee for the upcoming school year. The two calendars are very similar with just a few minor differences in the some of the holiday breaks. Graduation is set for May 19 in both calendars.

Two individuals requested to speak to the board. The first, Marcy Westfall, requested she speak to board members in executive session. The board went into the session at 6:34 pm and reconvened at 7:08 pm.

Dylan Johnson spoke to the board next with his concerns on the change of time of the Senior Scholarship

Awards Ceremony. In the past, the awards ceremony has been conducted in the evening allowing parents and scholarship presenters to attend. This year the ceremony has been changed to 1:30 pm in the afternoon. The change was stated to allow for entire student body to see the amount of scholarships available. Johnson noted it will be hard for parents and donors to attend. He asked the board to investigate the matter and have the high school administration change the time back to the evening.

Board member Evelyn Post announced the superintendent search was still ongoing. President DeAnna Whipkey stated the posting for the position would be going out by next week.

Superintendent Kathy Hypes reminded everyone that spring break starts on April 11. Also, the WV General Summative Assessment begins on April 25.

Under regular business, board members approved the following consent agenda items on a motion by Dr. Martha Dean: approval of March 15 meeting minutes.

 The daughter of Jason and Rhonda Hunt, she also enjoys shooting basketball and spending time with her family during her free time. In school, in

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

Day use fees...

You will read on the front page of this issue that the US Army Corps of Engineers will be implementing a charging system to utilize the recreational areas of Sutton Lake. Yes, they have charged to use the launch ramps for some time, but this will be a first for local residents and tourists to have to pay \$5 per car to park on the paved areas of Bee Run or behind the Dam. That means \$5 if you want to go swimming; \$5 if you want to take your child to the playground; \$5 if you want to go walking or hiking on public property... the list goes on.

The only thing that the \$5 fee does not apply to is the customers at the Marina, that is assuming you can find a space on their already overcrowded gravel parking lot. The lot is too small to accommodate the boat owners and their guests as it is. The Corps has previously refused to allow the marina operator to enlarge the parking area.

Now we have a new Marina owner taking over this year and this can't be good for business. I have seen hundreds of people come to the Marina, buy a hotdog and soda or ice cream cone and walk along the shoreline and enjoy mother nature. Now we will have to pay \$5 for that privilege. How devastating will this be to the local economy?

To make matter worse, they only take plastic. You can't pay in cash. A lot of lower-income citizens patronized our lake by taking their children swimming or fishing along the bank. Many don't have credit cards. Regardless, if they want to continue that privilege, it will cost... you guessed it... \$5.

The same will apply when I invite someone to come to my boat for an afternoon. If it's the weekend, they will not be able to park in the gravel lot, particularly now. How much will it cost my children and grandchildren to be able to spend time with us this summer like they have in the past?

It is as if the Corps prefers to have less use of the recreational facilities. Oh, wait, on more than one occasion, I have had people in the upper echelon of the Corps tell me that flood control was their prime directive and everything else fell to a distant second.

In the nearly 50 years I have been behind this desk I have had multiple encounters with the Corps of Engineers. Some have been really rewarding and others... not so much. Way back, a group came up with a plan that entailed use of some property at the mouth of Bee Run. We had a series of meetings with the Corps before they said no. One of the interesting things that came from those meeting was a local resident provided a Master Plan for Sutton Lake, developed by the Corps when they first conceived the proposal of building the Dam. It was obviously a piece intended to soften the blow of condemnation of hundreds of acres of Braxton County property. It was amazing what the Corps promised to provide in exchange for taking the land. Most of those amenities never came to fruition. In fact, that Master Plan seems to have disappeared. Now the Corps is taking it to a new level and going to charge us \$5 a day to swim in our own lake.

While I'm not surprised. I really, really don't like it.

News from our Capitol

When you've been out of town for a few days, it's always a good feeling to know you've been missed. For those of you reading this that have pets, you likely know where I'm coming from. When we picked up Waldo and Buddy from being boarded while in South Carolina for a few days, they were beyond excited to see Jean and me. We've been home a week and they still are sticking close to the door, making sure we're not taking any suitcases to the vehicles. Zip the cat, on the other hand, is less excited at our comings and goings.

It's been two weeks since the GSU Lady Pioneers basketball team won the national championship. Previously scheduled spring break at GSU delayed an on-campus celebration, but the week did not dampen the enthusiasm and appreciation of what this team accomplished. A tremendous celebration was held last Wednesday at the Waco Center and in downtown

Glenville. After the parade, the team was met with a thunderous ovation from residents of central West Virginia, school students from several counties, and the GSU student population. Even WVU Basketball Coach and Hall of Fame Coach Bob Huggins traveled in from his hectic schedule to visit with and congratulate Coach Kim Stephens and the Lady Pioneers players, coaches, and staff.

It was indeed a great day to be a Pioneer. As I write this Sunday night, I've been reviewing information from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs regarding its Asset and Infrastructure report (AIR), released in mid-March. Some of the recommendations are causing concerns across our state for our veteran's population and their families. After reviewing the report, I share their concerns and how it could adversely impact our veterans in West Virginia.

The AIR Commission will conduct public hear-

ings as part of its review of the VA's recommendations before submitting its own recommendations to the president for review in 2023. When these public hearings are scheduled, I urge everyone to voice their opinions in support of keeping current services available at Huntington, Clarksburg, and Beckley VA facilities. Meanwhile, contact the members of our congressional delegation and respectfully insist they do everything possible to ensure our veterans need not travel further for medical care and treatment. Veterans have put their lives on the line for us. They deserve our help and support.

On a different topic, I don't often venture into the personnel decisions of the Executive branch of West Virginia government agencies. but at times over the past twenty-six years, I've called out the less-than-helpful agency chiefs and personnel that fail to assist constituents respectfully, accurately, and promptly. Likewise, I've always been appreciative and vocal in the praise of those senior level workers that go the extra mile to serve the citizens of our state. This week, I'm very concerned over the yet unexplained departure of DHHR Deputy

Secretary Jeremiah Samples.

Over the years, for the hundreds of problems, concerns, and inquiries that have involved DHHR at every level, I've counted on Jeremiah to be a thorough, prompt, and highly knowledgeable source of help and information when trying to navigate the behemoth agency. Prior to his coming to DHHR from the Office of the Insurance Commissioner, DHHR often kept legislators and the public in the dark, stalled on providing requested information, or simply never responded without calling the Governor's office in frustration. Chances are if you've ever asked me for information or help from DHHR, Jeremiah Samples was my first call. I never had to call a second time. In short, he'd tell you what you needed to know; not what you wanted to hear.

Jeremiah has consistently been a great asset to legislators from both parties and the citizens we serve. It would be a terrible disservice if his departure was because he helped everyone, not just one party. His absence at DHHR will be sorely missed. While I do not know the details of whether he left voluntarily

lowing professional, service and extra-curricular personnel recommendations on a motion by Dolores Wright: employment of Melissa Strong, from first grade, Flatwoods to Title I teacher, Little Birch, Jamie Lemon, from LD/BD/MI/AU teacher, BCHS, to history teacher, BCHS, Jami Hefner, extended day transition specialist (part-time), Sherry Moats, substitute aide and substitute cook, Madeline Wankmuller, substitute cook, and Chelsea Hosey, custodian, BCMS/board office; resignations for Leslie Shiflet, teacher, BCHS, Marissa Fagnoli-Peterson, elementary music teacher, and Rodney Pritt, assistant football coach, BCHS; leave of absence for Patrick Facemire, extend unpaid medical leave through end of the school year; and suspension of employee A, teacher, three days without pay.

The board approved Policy 3125: Extra-Duty Assignments-Service Personnel on a motion by Dr. Seal. Superintendent Hypes noted that no comments had been made on the policy that laid out guidance for extra-duty assignments for service personnel.

On two separate motions, the board approved Linda Jenkins as parent volunteer for the BCHS Greenhouse

and the fundraisers that were presented.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:01 pm. The next regular meeting is scheduled for April 19 at 6:00 pm. 

This team is implementing a WV Branded Ground Beef program to diversify market opportunities for all WV beef producers and meet

identified wholesale market demand for local West Virginia beef. The product will be supported through statewide marketing efforts.

Small Ruminant Field Day Planned for May 10

Sheep and goats provide many benefits for livestock producers - added income, brush and weed control, and im-

proved utilization of grasslands when grazed with other livestock. However, they come with some challenges - one of the major ones being parasite management. Local producers should consider attending the Small Ruminant Field Day on May 10, at the Cantrell Farm in Duck.

The program begins at 3:00 p.m. Farm Service Agency personnel will be on hand to share available programs. Participants will be trained in FAMACHA scoring - a tool that allows sheep and goat producers to make deworming decisions based on the level of anemia associated with the barberpole worm. Dr. Scott Bowdridge, WVU Associate of Food Animal Production, will conduct the FAMACHA training and will also share information about selecting ewes and rams for parasite resistance.

FAMACHA training is free of charge to the first 30 families registered for the Field day. For others, the training will be \$25.

Pre-registration is required for the Field Day by calling WVU-Braxton County Extension at 304-765-2809, WVU-Clay County Extension at 304-587-4267 or Nicholas County Extension at 304-872-7898. Fox On Capital Hill

We saw on TV news this past week where a fox had gotten on Capital Hill and had bitten six people. It had rabies. Now, those people are being treated with shots. I Googled rabies and it is a deadly virus. It is spread through saliva of a bite from an animal. Some of the most common ones to get the rabies in our country are bats, coyotes, foxes, stray dogs, and coons. We had the scare of rabies when I was growing up but I never knew where it came from and didn't know that it was a virus. Treatment for people used to be a long series of shots. One of my cousins on the Stewart side, came up to me on the play ground at school one time, and told me he was waiting for his school bus to

Stewart, had married his Grandpa Winston Collins. Lou was a sister of my grandpa, Frank Stewart.

We were in elementary when that fox incident happened. That would be a very frightening thing to go through. It scared me when he told me and the thought of getting needles in the stomach made me cringe. We had a gray fox up in an apple tree here last fall. It had climbed the tree and was eating apples. Hubby heard our big dog barking and went out with a light. As soon as he shined that light up in the tree, that fox ran back down the tree, crossed the road, and went up the hill in front of us. So, that tells us that we have gray foxes over there. We knew there had always been a fox den on that hill but we hadn't seen a gray one. We had seen a red one. It showed up in the white snow. Once we saw it on the lower end of our property but it always stayed it's distance. It was the typical "sly ole fox," just sneaking around. Also, a dog does a lot to keep the critters away. That one just disappeared.

Mon Health Hospitals Encourage Autism Support and Education

Throughout the month of April, the staff of Mon Health System encourages the public to learn more about autism, one of the fastest growing developmental disabilities in the United States. Supporting, educating, and advocating for autistic individuals will make a difference in the lives of the patients the System serves.

"Autism was considered to be very rare when I started working in this field in 1985," said Marc Ellison, Ed.D., LPC, Executive Director of the WV Autism Training Center at Marshall University. "The prevalence then was estimated to be 4 to 5 per 10,000 children. Today, CDC studies show prevalence rates in 8-year-old children to be 1 in 44. As we've learned more about autism over the years, we've learned to better identify, diagnose, and assess need."

Autism, or autism spectrum disorder (ASD), refers to a broad range of conditions characterized by challenges with social skills, repetitive behaviors, speech and nonverbal communication. Characteristics typically appear during the first three years of life.

Fortunately for those

in West Virginia, the WV Autism Training Center (WV ATC) was established in 1984 at Marshall University. The Center provides services to those with autism spectrum disorder as well as their families, educators, and others significant in their lives. Since its inception, the Center has served nearly 4,000 families and over 5,000 educators

"There are several important considerations a family makes when a child is first diagnosed with autism, one of the most important is finding available resources," Dr. Ellison continued. "Resources – such as skill-building therapies, speech and language training, and occupational therapy – can be challenging to access here. The Center provides several types of services statewide, and one of those is facilitating periodic cohorts for parents of newly diagnosed children. These cohorts help parents better understand autism, identify resources, and offer an opportunity to become part of a community of people who share their experiences."

A second resource available is the Autism Society of West Virginia, a state chapter of the Autism Society of America.

The state society is made up mostly of parents and caregivers and is focused on helping parents find and access services. Parents may register with the WV Autism Training Center by calling 304-696-2840. Christine Fair, President of the Autism Society of WV, can be reached at 304-224-2769.

As part of educating West Virginians about ASD, the Center is providing a screening for the award-winning documentary "In A Different Key". An extraordinary narrative history of autism: the riveting story of parents fighting for their children's civil rights; of doctors struggling to define autism; of ingenuity, self-advocacy, and profound social change. The viewing will be on April 19 from 9:30 AM to 12:30 PM at the Marquee Cinema, Pullman Plaza in Huntington.

Town of Gassaway continues 90 day community clean up

WIC encourages increased fruit and vegetable purchases with Enhanced Benefits

West Virginia's Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC), within the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources' Bureau for Public Health, announced that the U.S. Congress has extended funding for enhanced WIC benefits through September 30, 2022 for the purchase of fresh, frozen, and canned fruit and vegetables.

As part of the federal enhanced WIC benefits, children receive \$24 per month, pregnant and postpartum participants receive \$43 per month, and breastfeeding women receive \$47 per month. Without the federal enhanced increase, the benefits are usually \$9 for children, \$11 for pregnant and postpartum, and \$16.50 for breastfeeding women.

"The WIC benefit in-

crease is one of the most effective investments that helps children get a healthy start," said Heidi Staats, director of the West Virginia WIC program. "WIC families want healthier options for their children. In West Virginia, we collaborate with our retail business partners to highlight the nutritious options and enhanced WIC benefits that not only help families but also stimulate local economies."

The WIC cash value benefit increase has resulted in more than triple the amount of fruit and vegetable purchases in retail locations, a greater variety of produce redeemed by WIC families and increased fruit and vegetable consumption for young children. WIC has provided enhanced fruit and vegetable benefits to more than 32,000 West Virginia women and children.

To continue these

great outcomes, the West Virginia WIC Program has partnered with authorized WIC retailers to highlight fresh, frozen and canned fruit and vegetable options available for purchase with WIC benefits. WIC branded cooler and floor decals share the message of "Fuel Up with Fruits and Veggies." Retailers may request additional decals from the WIC Vendor Management Unit by calling 304-558-1115 or emailing dhhrwicvu@wv.gov.

WIC provides nutrition counseling, parenting advice, breastfeeding support, food assistance and referral support to help families live healthier lives. 



Van Winkle was a member of the Governor's Council of the Reorganized Government of Virginia, 1861-63, under Gov. Francis Pierpont. On August 4, 1863, Van Winkle was elected as one of the first two U.S. senators from the new state of West Virginia.



April 18, 1912: The Paint Creek-Cabin Creek Strike of 1912-13 began when coal operators rejected the demand of their unionized workers for a wage increase. The strike that followed was one of the most dramatic and bloody conflicts in the early 20th century labor struggles in southern West Virginia known as the Mine Wars.



April 13, 1923: Medal of Honor recipient Jonah Edward Kelley was born at Rada in Mineral County. Sergeant Kelley died while leading his squad in repeated attacks on a German position during World War II.



April 16, 1829: Jacob Beeson Jackson was born in Parkersburg. In 1880, he became West Virginia's sixth governor.



April 13, 1873: Lawyer, diplomat, and presidential candidate John William Davis was born in Clarksburg. Davis argued 141 cases before the U.S. Supreme Court. His last case was one of the most controversial, when he argued in 1952 for the continuation of racial segregation in South Carolina.

April 14, 1774: Surveyors met at the mouth of the Kanawha River to establish military bounty claims in Kentucky. They became involved in several skirmishes with Indians in the region. This was the start of Dunmore's War, the name given to the conflict in the Ohio Valley in the spring of 1774.


April 15, 1872: Peter Godwin Van Winkle died in Parkersburg.



April 16, 1923: Arch Moore was born at Moundsville. He was the first governor in 100 years to serve a second term, and he returned later for a third.

April 17, 1827: Outdoorsman William "Squirrelly Bill" Carpenter was born on the Elk River near the mouth of Laurel Creek. Carpenter guided prominent West Virginians, including Governor MacCorkle, through the wonders of the Elk Valley.

April 17, 1871: West Virginians approved the Flick Amendment, which allowed former Confederates to vote. The amendment also applied to former slaves, but they had been enfranchised already by the 15th Amendment to the U.S.



April 19, 1896: Writer Melville Davisson Post was born in Harrison County. His best-known works are the Randolph Mason series, published in three volumes, and the more successful collection, Uncle Abner: Master of Mysteries.

April 19, 1902: Author Jean Lee Latham was born in Buckhannon. She wrote a number of children's books, including Carry On, Mr. Bowditch, which won the 1956 Newberry Award.


