Branch banks closing...

I had heard a rumor several days ago that Peoples Bank was going to close their branches in Sutton and Burnsville. The date conveyed in those messages indicated the move would happen in July. I was pretty confident of my source, so I contacted an official of the bank but was told that no decision had been made.

However, that apparently was not correct information since I now understand that bank employees were officially notified within a couple of days of my call. I am disappointed that I was not able to get accurate and timely information to combat or confirm the rumors when I first heard them. I guess that's what happens when local entities are owned by big conglomerates headquartered outside the state.

I guess I'm old school. After 50 years of doing business with the Bank of Gassaway change does not come easy. When John Heater owned the bank, it was much the same. Those 40 plus years ruined me. Premiers' ownership brought about big changes. Some of it was good. I particularly like the electronic banks, even thought my initial thoughts were the opposite. Other changes were too drastic for this ole customer. I was hopeful that Peoples would be a positive change. I was told, by people in the industry, that they, Peoples, were very community oriented, and I was optimistic when they took over. I even persuaded one friend not to change his mortgage loan until after the ownership change.

Closing these branchs does little to reinforce Peoples' commitment to the local area. I know that the Sutton Branch is highly used. I seldom do normal banking at Flatwoods. Yes, I realize it is close, which is probably the business reason for closing Sutton, but with gasoline over \$4 per gallon, I will not be driving the sixmile round trip for daily office deposits. I have been a devoted supporter of that bank, under all its owners, for five decades and was hoping for better treatment, communications, and service.

In my mind, closing these branches at this time is a bad move. It may be good for Peoples in a business sense, but it certainly stinks in the realm of public service. I know it will be inconvenient for hundreds of customers who patronize the

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While we missed Jessica's family, we were glad to at least visit with them over the phone. As we celebrate the resurrection of our Savior, Jesus Christ, it's been a day of blessings for which I'm thankful. And, as we watch the continuing evil of Russian leaders inflicting harm on Ukrainian citizens, it makes me even more cognizant of counting the blessings we enjoy.

Despite sending petitions, videos, and letters to



our congressional delegation, it appears at this date they have yet to indicate whether they plan to intervene with the Corps of Engineers on behalf of the citizens that use our lakes. Effective May 1, a daily user fee will be imposed via a credit card only kiosks for visitors that swim, boat, picnic, etc. Based on the local economic conditions and lack of a public swimming pool, charging for use of the lakes sends a poor message to our citizens in central West Virginia. There are still many unanswered questions, and the public deserves answers now.

While I will not give up trying, it's up to our federal representatives to act, as the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is a federal agency and unfortunately, the State of West Virginia has no jurisdiction on these plans, which apparently have been in the making for years. While the COE did listen, they just aren't working with the thousands of concerned citizens that use our major impoundments.

Finally, the Governor has

indicated that he intends to call a one-day special session of the Legislature when we are back in Charleston for April interim meetings next week. While we do not have an official proclamation issued by the Governor with his agenda items, there is a list of sixteen possible bills circulating, as of last week. As the session is anticipated to be a one-day only session, any bills that lack the support to pass or insufficient votes to suspend the rules that a bill be read on three separate days will likely be postponed for a session later this year. I'm including the April interim meeting schedule below. A few on the list are technical veto messages, based on a technicality. I imagine that it will likely change when the Governor indicates the date of the session.

closer than the site of the original building. Then, too, students are seeing a more modern structure. This structure has a full irrigation system, and it also has a hard plastic shell while the original one is covered with two layers of plastic film which must be replaced every five years. The updated covering will last 15 to 20 years.

The FFA advisor/ teacher began working toward this greenhouse by studying and writing grants. His first success was \$20,000 from Weyerhauser. Next he approached the Braxton County Board of Education, whose members 'were on board with it,' he said. After that, he continued soliciting funds from many sources to reach the original goal of \$80,000. In 2021, with BOE approval, he began soliciting bids for the construction. That effort was successful, and construction began.

Porto says that the is "really happy" with the results and hopes that those who shop for plants there will appreciate the new structure and its contents. He estimates that the greenhouse will be open two to three weeks and suggested that the best way to stay up to date on what's available and the hours is to go to the FFA Facebook page.


A nine-year-old young lady sat with her family behind me yesterday, up close to the piano. My heart was so touched when she handed me a note she had written:



THIS WEEK IN West Virginia History

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www. wvencyclopedia.org.

April 20, 1863: President Lincoln issued a proclamation that in 60 days West Virginia would become a state. This occasion was marked 100 years later during the state's Centennial celebration with a special ceremonial session of the West Virginia legislature on April 20, 1963, in Wheeling.

April 20, 1909: Fiddler Melvin Wine was born near Burnsville. A favorite of old-time music enthusiasts nationally, he was chosen as a National Heritage Fellow in 1991 by the National Endowment for the Arts, the highest recognition given to a folk artist in the United States.

April 20, 1939: Poet Irene McKinney was born in Belington, Bar-



bour County. Governor Gaston Caperton appointed her state poet laureate in 1993, and she served in that capacity until her death in 2012



April 21, 1908: Traditional musician Phoeba Cottrell Parsons was born in Calhoun County. Parsons's traditional claw-hammer banjo style, unaccompanied ballad singing, riddles and storytelling have influenced countless numbers of younger musicians.

April 21, 1936: President Roosevelt established the Jefferson National Forest. The West Virginia portion of this forest includes 18,530 acres in Monroe County.

April 22, 1908: Marshall "Little Sleepy" Glenn was born in Elkins. Glenn coached basketball at West Virginia University from 1934 to 1938 and football from 1937 to 1940. He was inducted into the WVU Sports Hall of Fame in 1992.




April 22, 2003: Activist Judy Bonds, a Raleigh County native, received the Goldman Environmental Prize for her fight against mountaintop removal. Her efforts inspired thousands and turned a local issue in West Virginia into a national cause.

April 23, 1857: Andrew Summers Rowan was born in Gap Mills, Monroe County. Rowan, a military officer, was chosen as the messenger when President McKinley wanted to send a message to Cuban General Calixto Garcia. The 1899 pamphlet, A Message to Garcia, made the incident famous.

April 24, 1865: The McNeill's Rangers surrendered to Union troops at New Creek (now Keyser). The Confederate guerrilla force probably never numbered more than 100 men at any time, but they managed to do damage to Union operations. April 25, 1863: About 1,500 Confederate soldiers under Gen. William "Grumble" Jones advanced through Greenland Gap, a deep pass through New Creek Mountain in Grant County. The Confederates encountered 87 Union soldiers who held off several assaults before finally surrendering. April 25, 1923: Union leader Arnold Ray Miller was born at Leewood on Cabin Creek in Kanawha County. In December 1972 he defeated Tony Boyle to become president of the United Mine Workers. April 26, 1816: General Alexander Welch Reynolds was born in Lewisburg. He served in the armies of the United States and the Confederacy. After the war, Reynolds accepted a commission as a colonel in the forces of the khedive of Egypt, the ruler of Egypt under the Ottoman Empire. e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia is a project of the West Virginia Humanities Council. 

Lady Eagles' softball team beats Clay, loses two other games





Two Braxton County youth sportsmen harvest gobblers during West Virginia's Spring Gobbler Youth weekend

West Virginia's spring gobbler season opened on April 18th and continues for five weeks to May 22, according to the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources (WVDNR). Hunters can harvest one bearded bird per day with a season bag limit of two.

This year's youth season was the weekend of April 16-17. Youth under the age of 18 could harvest one bearded bird, which counts toward their season bag limit of two, during the two days of hunting.

All hunters 15 and older are required to have a valid West Virginia hunting license, unless hunting as resident landowner, and a valid form of identification while hunting. A West Virginia hunting license can be purchased at retail agentsacross the state or online at WVhunt.com.

WVDNR officials remind sportsmen and women that hunting turkeys with bait and killing hens is illegal. Turkey hunters are encouraged to report any such activity to their local Natural Resource Police Officer or call 911 to report the violation. In addition, the West Virginia Chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation pays a \$100 reward for information that leads to the arrest and conviction of anyone using bait to kill wild turkeys.
