There are no specific income guidelines, but applicants are intended to be those families living in or near the Braxton County area that would have financial difficulty obtaining these services without the benefit of the program. case then the picture was took long before Robert built his log house. Robert's house set on the site of the Okey Marx house site. The old house that Okey and Mame lived in was mostly just a shack.

Peg leg was crossing the fence in the picture on his way back home. The days hunt did not seem to have offered him much in the way of a groundhog or he missed it. My hero would

usually shoot well over 150 groundhogs a season. My oh my I have eat so many of the things I don't want anymore. A week or so would go by and he would be looking for another whistle pig. Peg seemed to know where every hole was and the number of residents to the hole. I don't remember him ever cooking a squirrel but if nothing else a rabbit could make a good meal. When the deer numbers became plentiful his main living was deer potatoes, and biscuits. Peg liked his deer meat ground up into burger. My oh my he would say I went around the hill this evening and did not see a deer. Or he might say I looked around the ridge and seen them white tails flying in the air.

They were waving bye bye. He says (1) person don't have much of a chance getting a deer. Then one day while halling walnuts he would get lucky. My oh my he would say that little buck deer is nice and tender and fine eating. Someone might ask did you check it in, he might reply oh yes I checked it in at the table. 



# On The Other Side of the Mountain

By Verena Sava

Once a year we trim the hooves of our sheep, the rest of the year we only inspect them, if one of the animals is limping which could be an in indication of some foot problem. It happens rarely, but any discomfort should be investigated immediately. Usually we do foot care right before we move the sheep from their winter quarters to the new spring pastures. This year we were able to start pasture rotations early, due to the warm temperatures.

We anticipated some difficulties in herding them back to the barn, especially with a bunch of little lambs in tow. We thought we had a good strategy in place, but we had misjudged the little ones. Their adorable cuteness is only matched with an equal amount of stupidity. It took us only an hour to coax the lambs into the barn to join their mothers, then the tedious task of hoof trimming started, followed by neutering lambs and administering shots to them.

I cut the hooves back to their natural state, carefully removing any pocket where dirt and manure could accumulate. If there should ever be any sign of decay or unusual tissue formation, I dip the foot in a bleach solution, dry it well with a paper towel, inspect it again, then rub copper sulfate powder onto the trouble area. We never have a problem with foot rot, even if it is very wet.
