Braxton Memorial Hospital celebrates 40th Anniversary

Tuesday, January 5, marked the 40th Anniversary of the opening of Braxton County Memorial Hospital.

With the closing of the doors of the Sutton Hospital around 1966 followed

by the Gassaway Hospital in 1975, the Braxton County community being left without a hospital for a number of years, soon realized the need to re-establish a local health-care facility. Dedicated

individuals from various walks of life coordinated their efforts by contributing countless volunteer hours in addition to monetary donations. Their commitment resulted in a ceremonial grand-opening event in October 1980 followed by Braxton County Memorial Hospital opening its doors in January of 1981 to begin a legacy of providing compassionate healthcare services to the community and surrounding areas.

During the four decades of existence, the critical access hospital has faced many changes, but always remained steadfast in its goal to provide quality, dependable care to the community. The most recent of changes was being welcomed into the WVU Medicine Health System in January 2019. This well accepted transition has enabled the hospital to provide much needed services to the citizens of central West Virginia. Through the assistance of WVU Medicine, BCMH provides quality specialty services such as general surgery, cardiology services, orthopedic care, women's health, and much more. Much needed specialty services, just a short drive from home.

WVDOH Accepts Bids for 20 Projects Including

An approximately \$32 million project to build a new interchange on Interstate 64 near Culloden is among 20 projects included in a bid letting conducted by the West Virginia Division of Highways on Tuesday, May 17, 2022. Of importance to Braxton County residents, the Bulltown to Falls Mill Road paving is also among in the work bid.

The projects are made possible through funding from Gov. Jim Justice's \$2.8 billion Roads to Prosperity program.

The WVDOH is reviewing the bids and hopes to award contracts for these projects soon.

In addition to the Braxton County work, the May 17 letting included the

following projects: Marlinton traffic signals (Pocahontas County); Culloden Interchange (Cabell County); (Roads to Prosperity); Rupert sidewalk interchange (Greenbrier County); Statewide pavement markings; East River Mountain guardrail cable (Mercer County); Barksdale to Sandstone paving (Summers County); Porterwood to Moore Station paving (Tucker County); Romney paving (Hampshire County); Inwood paving (Berkeley County); Corridor H guardrail upgrade (Hardy County); Holden Bridge to Fountain Place Mall paving (Logan County); Slate Road slide repair with piling wall (Wood County); Shinnston sidewalk, pedestrian and

bike facilities (Harrison County); Highland Trace Road paving (Greenbrier County); Anmoore Bridge overpass cleaning and painting (Harrison County); Moorefield paving (Hardy County); Baker to McCauley Bridge paving (Hardy County); Institute lighting (Kanawha County); Millesons Mill Bridge cleaning and painting (Hampshire County).

Several factors are considered before awarding a bid, including whether a bid falls above or below the WVDOH Engineer's Estimate and by what percentage. In cases where a bid is above the Engineer's Estimate, WVDOH must consider the project need, repercussions of not

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Braxton Man Arrested in Upshur County While Driving Stolen Vehicle

An 18-year-old Braxton County man was arrested over the weekend after he was pulled over while driving a stolen truck in Upshur County.

According to a criminal complaint, deputies with the Upshur County Sheriff's Department tried to pull over an orange Chevrolet truck that didn't have a registration visible. The driver failed to stop and attempted to elude police, spurring a police chase that spanned Gaines Road, Roby Road and Salem Ridge Road.

The truck broke down on Guy Hardman Road, according to the com-



plaint, and the driver fled on foot into the nearby woods. A K9 with the Buckhannon Police Department responded to aid in the search. With the dog's assistance, of-

ficers located the driver who was identified as 18-year-old Anthony Fisher of Braxton County.

According to the complaint, the truck had been reported stolen on Friday in Webster County.

Fisher has been charged with numerous felonies, including fleeing with reckless indifference, fleeing while driving under the influence and possession of a stolen vehicle.

Fisher is currently being held at the Tygart Valley Regional Jail in lieu of a \$40,000, cash-only bond awaiting further court proceedings.

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WV Dept. of Ed. to Honor Golden Horseshoe

The West Virginia Department of Education (WVDE) will recognize 221 eighth-grade students from middle schools across the state as 2022 Knights of the Golden Horseshoe on Tuesday, June 14, 2022, at the West Virginia Culture Center in Charleston. The event will be livestreamed on West Virginia Public Broadcasting stations and include three Braxton County students.

The WVDE will induct these students as a part of the 306th anniversary of the Golden Horseshoe legacy, recognizing them for their achievement in knowledge of West Virginia history. It remains the longest-running program of its kind in the country. Approximately 15,000 eighth-grade students have been recognized since its inception.

"Our students have worked diligently for this moment to become Knights of the Golden Horseshoe," said State Superintendent of Schools W. Clayton Burch. "It is clear their passion for knowledge and resilience to achieve this accomplishment will make them incredible ambassadors for the Mountain State. I look forward to all of their future success."

Earning the prestigious honor from Braxton County were Adyson Conant, Alexis Knowlton and Joel Sigman.

The state has administered the test each year since 1931 with 87 students honored from 46 counties in its first year. The exam focuses on Mountain State topics including civics, government, geography, culture and numerous other categories. A minimum of two students from each county and one student from the West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and the Blind are selected for the award. The other honorees are selected from the 55 counties based on each county's eighth-grade population.

The WVDE will host three separate ceremonies to honor the 2022 Golden Horseshoe recipients on Tuesday, June 14, at the West Virginia Culture Center. A complete list of 2022 winners can be found online on the WVDE website.

The first ceremony will begin at 9 a.m. and will recognize recipients from: Boone, Braxton, Cabell, Calhoun, Clay, Harrison, Jackson, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Marion, Putnam, Roane, Wayne and Wirt.

Most of all, thank you to the voters who took the time and effort to come out to vote for the candidates of their choice. There are billions of people around the world in nations under the crushing fist of dictators. Citizens in those countries long for the day when they can cast a vote for freedom. Thank you to our Veterans for preserving the freedoms we enjoy as Americans and for standing up for other freedom-loving men and women around the world.

I want to offer my sincere thanks to the hundreds of his brother and sister volunteer firefighters, law enforcement officers, EMS personnel and all first responders from Braxton, Gilmer and across West Virginia that joined the

community for the funeral and tribute to our fallen firefighter John Forbush. John tragically lost his life while attempting to extract two victims from a submerged car in the Elk River.


cess can take longer.



If you have thoughtfully considered pet ownership, NOW may be the time to add a feline friend to your family.



white litter




May 18, 2012: Ice Mountain in Hampshire County was named a National Natural Landmark by the U.S. Department of the Interior at a ceremony to mark the 50th anniversary of the program.



May 19, 1920: Ten people were killed in what became known as the Matewan Massacre. Baldwin-Felts detectives came to Matewan to evict striking miners and their families, but Police Chief Sid Hatfield tried to stop the evictions as being unauthorized by law.

May 20, 1949: Nick Joe Rahall II was born in Beckley. When Rahall entered Congress in 1977, he was

its youngest member.



May 21, 1853: William M.O. Dawson was born in Bloomington, Maryland, just across the Potomac River from what is now the Eastern Panhandle of West Virginia. He became the 12th governor of West Virginia.

May 22, 1947: Supreme Court Justice Margaret “Peggy” Workman was born in Charleston. In the election of November 1988, she became the first woman on the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals and the first woman to be elected to statewide office in West Virginia.

May 23, 1862: In what became known as the Bat-

tle of Lewisburg, Union troops repelled a Confederate advance, killing 38 and wounding 66, while losing only 13 men.

May 23, 1941: Rod



Thorn was born in Princeton. Thorn attended West Virginia University, where he was an All-American guard. Thorn has had an extended and distinguished career in the National Basketball Association.

May 24, 1896: Confederate General John Echols died in Staunton, Virginia. Echols served in the Kanawha Valley in 1862 and commanded Confederate forces at their defeat at the Battle of Droop Mountain in November 1863.

The trees are fully leafed out, except for the oaks. When the oak leaves are the size of a squirrel's ear the soil is warm enough to plant corn. The old timers never needed a soil thermometer, as experience and observation guided them. Of course it is also warm enough to plant squashes, cucumbers, beans and set tomatoes outside. Our last possible date of frost here is May 20th, so keep all this in mind while setting out your plants and seeds. Each season is visually so unique in our mountains.

Of course, everybody always looks forward to the color display in fall, but I find spring just as wonderful, lasting only a very short period of time when the first leaves emerge and faint greens are dotting the woods, then a few days later a whole array of pastel colors in every shade of green, some red, tan and purple mixed in appear, together with some magic white flowers of the Sarvis and dogwood trees, truly a perfect master piece of an impressionistic painting, all produced by the most splendid artist, nature.

Greg and I never give each other presents anymore. We need very little and if we don't have it right away, we can do without or invent something to make do. I was very surprised when he showed up with a huge box when he returned from getting the mail, wishing me a merry Christmas, sometime back in December. Instead of being thankful I reminded him of not wasting money for no reason. It turns out that it was a much needed contraption. I am not getting younger and trimming hooves becomes more painful for my back. I used to be able to trim hooves every Wednesday for an hour and a half. I rarely had a problem with handling goats. Some posed more of a challenge, but trimming sheep's hooves can be back breaking. Our goats are used to being handled (milked) every day, but the sheep are stubborn and uncooperative. With my Christmas present I could easily open a 5 star sheep luxury spa, trim hooves for hours and never get tired! I'll add a picture to make my position clear.

Perennial herbs are the easiest to keep, but they need to be kept as weed-free as possible, with the exception of mints. We have spearmint, apple mint, peppermint and I warn you they take over where ever we plant them, no weed is any challenge to them, but they are wonderful fresh in salads or dried for use as teas in winter.

We have an oregano patch that dates back 40 years, started from a few plants given to us by Brian and Jeff who now live in another state.

This oregano is different in taste than the Greek oregano I raised from seeds, but we use both of them and cherish the difference. Oregano is easily started from seeds and once established will be a permanent feature in the herb garden, maybe forever. We use a few sprigs every day in our salad, but it is wonderful in any tomato dish (sauce, pizza,

soup). We dry quite a bit for use in winter by drying the whole stem, then when dry, remove the leaves from the stems. We keep the dried leaves in the freezer, the stems are discarded.

Another daily herb in our salad is sage. It comes in many varieties, but I only have the common sage, a velvety, greenish plant. It can be used in teas, soups, stews, as well as other meat dishes. Both oregano and sage have medicinal properties, both are rich in antioxidants and are antibacterial.

A favorite of course is parsley, either the flat or curled leafed one. Not only can parsley be used in pretty much all recipes, raw or cooked or infused in smoothies, but it has decorative qualities and can be added to any plate to make the presentation more appealing. Somebody who has kidney disease should avoid parsley. It is recommended for folks who have bad breath, since one of its compounds, chlorophyll can kill bad bacteria that causes bad breath in your mouth, of course brushing and flossing might have the same effect.

Another beloved herb is chives, an onion like tasting plant with many uses. It does not have to be dried for freezing, just cut into quarter inch pieces, then put into a double ziplock bag. There are many health claims for chives, especially for heart health, lowering the LDL cholesterol level, but I could never find any information on how much one would have to eat to make a difference.

Rosemary is hard to start from seed, as it has a poor germination rate. Use potting soil for your container, soak the seeds for several hours prior to planting, then put the seed tray on a heating mat. Seed thickly. It might take at least 30 days till seedlings appear, even under ideal conditions. Be patient. Keep the growing medium moist at all times and don't turn off the heating mat. Another way to start a new plant is to clip several tender sprouts off a mature plant in summer, strip off the lower leaves and put them in water glasses filled with water. Usually some roots will grow within two weeks or so. Once the roots are visible, transfer the cuttings to containers with soil. I usually start more than one, just to make sure at least one will make it. We have to take our rosemary pots inside in winter.

We also have a pot of lemon grass, which is a tropical plant and can only be outside when all danger of frost has past. It makes a wonderful tea and its grass-like structure reaching high up in winter, makes the room look cheerful.

There are other herbs, thyme, lemon balm, lemon thyme, marjoram but I wrote about the ones we use the most. Consider that they are all super nutritious foods, packed with vitamins, antioxidants, acting as antibacterials, helping digestion, one cannot possibly go wrong, using them every day. Don't forget the pleasure of added flavor to your dishes.
