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Harper chosen Braxton Teacher of the Year

Nikki Harper, fourth-grade teacher at Little Birch Elementary, has been named Teacher of the Year. Harper, a Braxton County native, just finished her sixth year at Little Birch, and she said she truly enjoys teaching there.

The Braxton County High School graduate received her bachelor's degree from Glenville State College and a master's degree from Western Governor's University. She has 11 years of teaching experience. Following graduation from Glenville State, she taught two years at Braxton County High School. Then came three years at Gilmer County High School. She explained her move back to Braxton. "I became homesick," she said.

Replying to a question asking what she

likes best about teaching, Harper said, "I love watching the progression of a student from the beginning of the school year to the end. I like watching them achieve their goals even if it's just [understanding] a concept they've been struggling with. Most of all, I love being with the kids."

Acknowledging that problems do occur in schools, Harper said she thinks the biggest problems at Little Birch "are

that we've had so many split classes and lost staff because of budget cuts." She added, "Especially in our area, the needs of our students are great because it's a poverty area and what our students have experienced. It's difficult to meet our needs because of the small staff."

Harper's philosophy of teaching centers around "a growth mindset." She explained. "I believe that mistakes are powerful and nothing to be afraid of because we learn from our mistakes. When students struggle, I remind them they shouldn't be discouraged. They're just not 'there' yet."

When she is not involved with school, Harper enjoys a variety of activities. She likes gardening along with kayaking and fishing. She is also involved with her church.

Burnsville man joins Fine Arts Faculty at GSU

Glenville State University alumnus Garrett Hacker has returned to his alma mater, joining the Department of Fine Arts faculty as a Lecturer of Music.

Since January, Hacker has been teaching courses in applied percussion, conducting, and recording and engineering, in addition to conducting the Percussion Ensemble at Glenville State. This new position will see him taking on many of the same responsibilities in a more permanent way.

"Coming back to Glenville State really means the world to me, honestly. Anyone I know who has attended GSU has seen it as a second home, and it's the same to me. So, it is like moving back home and getting to live out your dream job," Hacker said.

He says he is most looking forward to the music he will get to make with students. "Memories and music are really tied together, so I want to create as many memorable performances and teaching



experiences as I can for my students and myself," he added.

Hacker graduated from Braxton County High School in 2015 before attending Glenville State where he completed a bachelor's degree in music in 2019. He then went on to Ohio University where he earned a master's in music performance.

He has previously spent time as a drumline instructor for various bands, including the Liberty-Harrison Band, Doddridge County Band, Appalachian Gold Drum and Bugle Corps, Braxton County Band, and Athens County Band. During his first semester at Ohio University, he was

part of the OU percussion ensemble that collaborated with Oakland University and University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh to perform at the Percussive Arts Society International Convention 2019 in the World Showcase Concert. The program was a celebration of Ugandan music led by Haruna Walusimbi, the leader of the Nachabembe group from Uganda whose works the ensemble performed. During his time at Glenville State he served as field commander of the Pioneer Marching Band in 2018.

"Having grown up in Braxton County and attended Glenville State as a student, I think I can really put myself in the shoes of students and can relate to them in a lot of ways. I got exposure to a lot of different kinds of music and techniques when I was at Ohio University, so I really want to bring more awareness to music of other cultures and other genres that we don't get to hear or study as

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Board of Ed hires new Superintendent

The Braxton County Board of Education conducted two meetings on Tuesday, May 24.

The first meeting was a special meeting for discussion on the appointment of a new superintendent. The meeting was called to order at 3:00 pm and went immediately into executive session on a motion by Evelyn Post with a second by Dr. Martha Dean. Board members reconvened into regular session at 5:40 pm.

On a motion by Dr. Martha Dean and a second by Dolores Wright, board members unanimously approved the hiring of Dr. Rhonda Combs to serve as the new superintendent of Braxton County School. The one-year contract will begin "July 1, 2022 at a salary of \$115,000 per year, subject to contract and benefits as authorized by the county board president and presented to the board at a later date."

Dr. Combs comes to Braxton County from the Brooke County School District where she has

served as district administrator for the past 19 years. In addition to the numerous administrative positions Combs has held she also served as a principal for seven years at the elementary and middle school levels.

She obtained here Ph.D. in Educational Leadership and two master's degrees in Education and Educational Leadership from The Ohio State University and West Virginia University. In a letter accompanying her application for superintendent, Dr. Combs outlined her vision for the job, "In the wake of two years of in-

structional disruptions, I would focus on providing the leadership and stewardship necessary to address learning loss, transitions, mental health, compensatory services and ensure that an effective, comprehensive personalized learning environment is provided. I believe that this is an opportunity for school systems to emerge stronger and more responsive to all learning needs. As educators, we can work together to harness the opportunities presented by this crisis to truly transform and move educations forward..."

The second meeting was called to order at 6:00 pm. The meeting started with the public budget hearing. Director of Finance Ginger Altizer reviewed the budget with board members. She explained salary changes based on new legislation and the costs increases affecting the budget. Evelyn Post requested a special meeting.

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Braxton Hospital's ER receives perfect score

Recently, Braxton County Memorial Hospital Emergency Department underwent process of trauma designation reverification, which resulted in the facility receiving an outstanding ZERO deficiencies. The reverification process, which is required to be completed every three years, included an on-site visit from representatives of the WV Office of Emergency Medical Services (WVOEMS). Braxton, like many rural hospitals, is designated as a Level IV trauma center. A Level IV center is a facility which provides advanced trauma life support prior to transfer in remote areas where no higher level of care is available.

Expanded WV Bigfoot Museum to be unveiled June 25

On June 25, The West Virginia Bigfoot Museum is scheduled to debut their brand-new museum expansion. The expansion will have its grand opening to kick off this year's West Virginia Bigfoot Festival in Downtown Sutton beginning at 9:00 am.

This new space will triple the size of the current museum and will also provide a separate store front next to the Mountain Laurel Country Store. The museum currently has nearly 30 Bigfoot casts in its possession but previously only had space to display a dozen casts at a time. This new expansion will not only allow The West Virginia Bigfoot Museum to display the entirety of its casts, but it will also provide additional space for new displays, including some made by Dr. Jeff Meldrum, a professor and anthropolo-

gist from Idaho State University. Museum co-founder, David Petolicchio, has stressed the importance of trying to keep the museum a free and educational experience for both tourists and locals alike. The new expansion will be no different, "We hope to continue our tradition of providing a free and fun destination that can be accessible to people of all income levels." Petolicchio noted that donations, merchandise sales, and the generosity of patrons help them keep the museum a free experience.

Six critical elements must be in place and functional at a facility in order to maintain designation.

The facility must utilize, at minimum, OEMS

Priority 1 Trauma Team Activation Criteria; They must implement and maintain an active Trauma Performance Improvement Program; The facility must use the State Trauma Registry; The hospital must have a functioning, organized Trauma Program; That Trauma Program must include policies which assure patient-oriented utilization of resources; The general surgeons and emergency medicine physicians must complete ATLS credentialing.

A great amount of time and effort is put forth, not only at reverification time, but every day, to ensure that BCMH is meeting, or exceeding the require-

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nificant following.

Upon returning to my desk, I found an email and a registered letter answering the freedom of information request I made to the Board of Education last week for names of the five finalists for the Superintendent’s job as well as additional information on the successful applicant.

I am glad that I received a timely response. We were able to contact Dr. Rhonda Combs and include additional information and a picture for inclusion in the front-page article detailing the Board’s selection of her as our next superintendent. I believe it made the story much more informative for our readers and hopefully eliminated some of the guess work and rumors that would probably have surfaced without the addition.

I am disappointed that the Board was not more open during the selection process. As previously stated, I also am dissatisfied with the fact that three newly elected board members apparently didn’t receive any more information than the newspapers did.

There was a letter from DeAnna Whipkey with the FOI response. While I take issues with some of the statements, they simply are not worth my time to elaborate on. However, the good news is the letter did contain the names of the five people interviewed by the Board for the school’s top job. They were in addition to Dr. Combs, Dr. Tony Minney, Dr. Ronnie Tarchichi, Dr. Andrea Lemon and Dr. Leatha Williams.

The new Board will soon be seated, and I hope they take an improved stance on the public’s right to know. I don’t think there has been any ill-will involved with this or other incidents when the Board of Education has dropped the ball in being responsive to those who elected them. It’s appears they are just too involved or mis-guided to be answerable to the public. This is certainly not the first time I have seen such actions from elected officials. Nor is it the first time it has been discussed in this space. However, it’s too important not to reinforce it again. As the WV Freedom Of Information Act plainly states, our elected officials are not elected to decide what is good for us to know. They must work on our behalf in a transparent fashion. I hope the Board of Education gets on board!

I read an article in today’s Charleston Gazette which stated that 3010 public school vouchers had been approved and 469 additional ones were pending. That’s \$4,300 for all 3010 of them... just under \$13 million that will be taken from our public educational system. How is our educational system going to survive? Cuts are coming and our county Board of Education has to be upfront with the public. They must regain the public’s confidence. With past history, that will take some effort on the Board’s part. Lets keep our fingers crossed.

Every Acre Counts

Mineral Stumps Not what you think...

It’s time to focus on another habitat enhancement for whitetail deer specifically. In the next two articles I will talk about deer myths and truths based on the latest studies released, but today we are talking about a practice to put more nutrition into your cleared 1-acre woodlot we have been using as an example.

Just like mowing, when (what time of the year) will affect what you grow or what the plants you cut do. If you cut a tree in its dormant cycle, generally, it will die and not re-sprout. This happens sometime between November and March in most cases – yes, there are always exceptions. If you cut a tree in its prime growing period, such as late May or June, it will re-sprout the majority of the time. Those sprouts have earned the practice the

name of “mineral stumps” in the habitat world.

Dr. Marcus Lashley, Florida State University Wildlife Management Professor watched from his tree stand as deer walked past his well-prepared browse he had been planting and managing to eat the stump sprouts of a green ash tree he had cut for a shooting lane. Dr. Lashley is a plant guy, so he decided to take a few samples of the green ash – a low wildlife food value plant – and see why the deer liked it above the honeysuckle and green-brier growing at his stand site.

When he tested the stump sprouts, he wound that the sprouts were very high in minerals and other nutrients such as protein. The protein level was at or exceeding Soybeans and several of the key minerals were

several times that of any food plot plants or native browse. Why were these sprouts so nutrient rich and how did the deer know?

Breaking down the science so we don’t get too far into the weeds - pun intended – when a tree is full of leaves it tries to maintain a 1:1 ratio of nutrients in the biomass (leaves) above the ground and in its roots. When you cut down a leafed-out tree in June, the root system immediately senses the loss and attempts to regrow as quickly as possible to restore the tree to its spot in the canopy. As it does, it pushes the stored nutrients into the sprouts to accelerate their growth and balance out the minerals and other nutrients in the plant. And there you have it – a mineral stump is born!

So, what does this mean for the diversity of our 1 acre clearcut we are using as our example? Depending on your goals for this area, will depend on when you want to cut the trees. Cut them in the dormant season and no re-sprouting for a clean sunlit area. Cut them all or some of them in the summer and mineral stumps jump up everywhere.

If you cut them in late May, the nutrients will be available when the late summer stress period of fawn rearing or antler growing is happening and most summer plants are beginning to lose their nutrient content. According to the study conducted by Dr. Lashley, 60-80 trees cut for mineral stumps can supply the same protein level as an acre or soybeans and 4-8 times the mineral content. Now we may not be wanting to mineral stump every tree as we may want to have some bedding cover from hinge-cuts, but having mineral stumps on the landscape, especially near your tree stand or blind may pay off in the fall.

I have nearly 80 minerals stumps in on my property in feeding cor-

In the eighties the group raised money and erected the monument on the Braxton County courthouse lawn dedicated to American Revolutionary War patriots buried in Braxton County.

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News from our Capitol

As I write this Sunday afternoon on Memorial Day eve, I’m not thinking of a long holiday weekend or a vacation. I’m thinking of the veterans I’ve known throughout my lifetime and their service to our nation, worked hard, raised their families, and now have passed on. I’m reflecting on those that gave their all in the Armed Forces; those that were wounded physically or emotionally from combat; those that were or may still be prisoners of war; those that were killed in action or missing in action. I’m remembering my grandparents and all Gold Star families past and present. I’m pondering the sacrifices of spouses and kids while their mom or dad, brother, or sister, is away from home and in harm’s way somewhere around the world.

If you haven’t reflected on these things during Memorial Day, I encourage you to do so, now and every day throughout the year. On this Memorial Day, we call into remembrance all those that have passed on.

This is a time to remember and give thanks for our nation, our families, and our freedoms.

Interim meetings concluded in Morgantown last Tuesday evening and the trip home provided some time to digest the three days of committees and visitations. During our meeting in the Joint Finance Committee, the topic of locality pay for state employees and teachers was on the agenda for discussion. The presenter was Dr. John Deskins, of the WVU Bureau of Business and Economic Research.

In basic terms, there are some counties – usually most of the eastern panhandle – that have an overall higher cost of living than most other areas of our State. However, the most pressing need in these areas is the “bleed” of state employees, teachers and state government workers living in West Virginia but taking jobs in border states that pay higher wages. In many instances, the difference in pay is \$10,000 to \$20,000 or more. This

makes it very difficult to fill critical vacancies. That’s the argument made by eastern panhandle delegates during the 2022 session, attempting to provide State Police in three eastern panhandle counties a \$10k pay raise, while they and every other trooper would receive only a 5 percent raise.

Their strategy backfired, as there was a bipartisan backlash, pointing out that that level of difference in pay based solely on location would drive resentment and be unfair to the remaining troopers around the state.

This is not a new issue to me, as I’ve commented on this many times through the years. I’m in the camp where we need to concentrate on lifting all boats, not just some selected areas. To be sure, if an exception is made in a few selected counties, make no mistake that the list of exemptions wanting higher wages will steadily grow. Ang, what would remain will be a handful of non-border, landlocked central West Virginia counties that will forever be relegated to being the lowest of the low-paid state workers, service personnel and educators.

I appreciated the fact that Dr. Deskins used my ongoing rationale as a counterpoint in his presen-

tation, noting that I’ve been a long-time proponent of raising all wages and not just a handful.

Other factors need to be considered before the next legislature rushes to revisit the issue. If implemented, will how will this affect state pension funds? Will differences in location pay lead to significant differences in pension benefits? What happens when workers gravitate to where the wages are highest and leave critical vacancies in the wake?

We’ve already had an example of what happened in a similar situation when the shortage of registered nurses led WVU - Ruby Memorial to offer big bonuses, along with higher wages and full-time benefits. Many nurses weighed their options and circumstances. Over time, a chain reaction of vacancies led to shortages in many areas that exist to this day, requiring some healthcare facilities to hire traveling nurses in order to fill vital staffing requirements.

There will always be differences in the cost of living between states; between counties within states; and in some instances, substantial differences within a single county. Accordingly, there are positives and negatives

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much,” Hacker added.

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ridors, stubble fields and in bedding areas. 100% of my mineral stumps are pruned on a weekly basis by my whitetails – not one stump of any variety is untouched. I have many that are in year 3 of growth and are still only knee high. So, I can attest to their effectiveness.

Again, our goal is to create as diverse a property as possible to support the entire ecosystem and our tree removal has several options with mineral stumps being one of them. If you would like more information on mineral stumps, you can search youtube to see several videos on the technique. Here is a link to the MSU Deer Labs video <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=EPa3t45uU&t=16s>.

MSU Deer Lab is a great place to learn about whitetail deer and we will discuss some of their research in the coming weeks.

Glenville State University Department of Land Resources students volunteer at Canaan Valley State Park

In late April, several Glenville State University Department of Land Resources students visited Canaan Valley Resort State Park for a volunteer opportunity. The opportunity was arranged by Tom Snyder, Glenville State's Academic Laboratory Instructional Assistant, and the Superintendent of Canaan Valley State Park, Don McFarlan.

In addition to Snyder, the students who volunteered included Chloe Richardson, Mark Radcliff, and Lexi Pletcher. Richardson is in the Natural Resource Management Wildlife Management program while Radcliff and Pletcher are both in the Natural Resource Management Forest Technology program.

"At Canaan, we used the cut-stump method when removing invasive species. For example, an autumn olive would be cut at the base with a chainsaw and glyphosate would be applied

to the sapwood on the face of the stump. This kills the root of the plant and prevents it from resprouting," Pletcher explained.

Removing invasive species from the park helps native species establish in the area by removing competition for resources. Native species are beneficial to wildlife and the overall ecosystem, nonnative invasive species are not.

Pletcher added that the students hope to visit Canaan Valley again in the future for another volunteer opportunity.

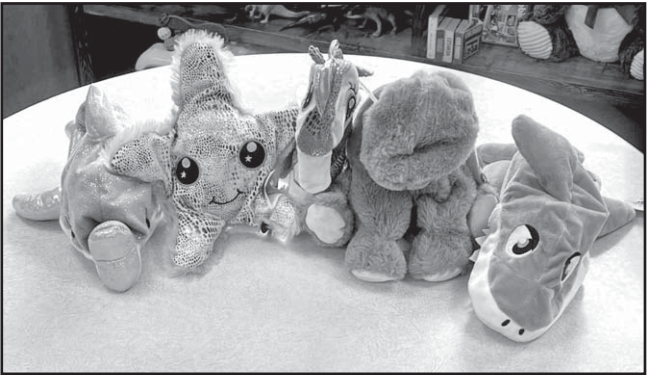

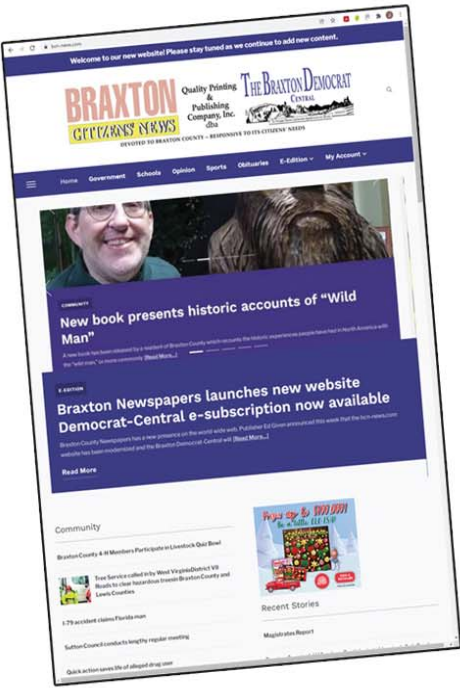

Rangers then led a water safety interpretive event in the downstream where students were able to throw a rescue bag and learn how to size and check lifejackets for proper fit.

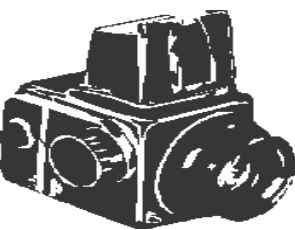

Affordable, Adoptable, Fixed Feline Friends

Just One Generation cat rescue was started in 2013 in response to the severe feline overpopulation in this area.

Our initial emphasis was on the Trap, Neuter, and Release (TNR) of feral cats as well as to facilitate the spay/neuter of domestic cats.

Adoption of ownerless cats and kittens came later, as was incorporated with the program because there was no place else for these animals to go.

But, due to previously made travel plans and family commitments, Just One Generation will NOT be available to take in new animals or to adopt cats and kittens during the months of June, July, and August 2022.

Our spay/neuter assistance program will continue during this time. If you have thoughtfully considered pet ownership, NOW may be the time to add a feline friend to your family.

Our program currently has multiple healthy, social cats and kittens that are available for a modest adoption fee, that includes immunizations, deworming, flea protection, as well as spay/neuter and rabies vaccine when the kittens are four months old.

Featured today are several kittens waiting for homes of their own. This will be a last chance to adopt from this group, as any listed that do not find local homes by June 5 will be sent to an out-of-state rescue for placement.

Until they leave, our usual adoption fee has been reduced to \$40 each of two for \$65, which includes the spay/neuter/rabies vaccine at Central WV Animal Hospital in Gas-saway when they are four months old.

DHHR extends application period for Emergency Energy Assistance Program until June 17

The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR) extended the deadline for applications for the Emergency Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) to June 17, 2022, or until funds are exhausted. The federally funded program assists eligible state residents in paying home heating bills.

Residents whose primary source of heat is either gas or electricity must provide their disconnection notice or past due utility bill when applying for Emergency LIEAP. Those using other primary heating sources or bulk fuel may qualify for assistance if their heating fuel is at a low level during the application period.

Households that received direct payment of regular LIEAP benefits must verify that the payment was used for home heating by submitting a current receipt with the Emergency LIEAP application. Failure to submit verification of payment may result in a denial of the application.

Eligibility for LIEAP benefits is based on income, household size and whether the household is responsible for paying its heating bill. The income limit is 60% of the state median income. In situations where a heating emergency exists, applicants must be seen by a DHHR worker.

To qualify, households must meet all program guidelines and be in an emergency that will disrupt the primary heating source if not addressed.

The maximum allowable gross income levels for Emergency LIEAP FY 2022 are listed below:

THIS WEEK IN WEST VIRGINIA HISTORY

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.



June 1, 1880: The bare-knuckle prize fight for the championship of the world was held in the Brooke County town of Colliers, between defending champion Joe Goss and challenger Paddy Ryan. Boxing was illegal in every state, and matches were often held in railroad villages to avoid big city police.



June 1, 1935: Musician Hazel Dickens was born in Mercer County, the eighth of 11 children. She was a pioneering old-time and bluegrass musician, known for preserving the traditional vocal styles of West Virginia.

June 2, 1951: Cornelius Charlton died of the wounds he received in battle during the Korean War. Charlton, a Raleigh County native, was awarded the Medal of Honor posthumously.



June 3, 1856: Harriet B. Jones was born in Pennsylvania. After attending Wheeling Female College and graduating from the Women's Medical College of Baltimore, she opened a private practice in Wheeling, becoming the first woman licensed to practice medicine in West Virginia.

June 3, 1936: The first Strawberry Festival was held in Buckhannon. More than 6,000 spectators attended the festivities, which also included a parade of 30 princesses down Main Street.



June 4, 1975: Clark Kessinger died in St. Albans, Kanawha County. Kessinger was among the most prolific and influential fiddlers of the 20th century, and one of West Virginia's most important traditional musicians.

June 5, 1859: A

great frost killed crops in the Preston County fields. The fields were replanted with hardy buckwheat, which was successful and became a staple crop, celebrated in the annual Buckwheat Festival in Kingwood.



June 6, 1919: Historian Otis Rice was born in Hugheston, Kanawha County. Rice was named West Virginia's first Historian Laureate in 2003.

June 6, 1989: During the Pittston strike, about 60 miners embarked on a four-day march from Logan County to Charleston, retracing the path of the 1921 Armed March on Logan.



June 7, 1899: Congresswoman Elizabeth Kee was born in Radford, Virginia. She became West Virginia's first female member of Congress in 1951.

June 7, 1926: An explosion at a sand mining operation in Morgan County killed six men. Their deaths were the inspiration for the ballad "The Miner's Doom."

Local Psychologist, Don Worth, Ph.D., to host recovery workshop on June 4

Don Worth, Ph.D. and local psychologist, will be hosting a workshop on recovery on Saturday, June 4 at 6 PM at the Mon Health Recovery Care Center next to Mon Health Stonewall Jackson Memorial Hospital in Weston.

The public is invited to join the event, titled "Recovery in the 21st Century...not just for substance usage anymore."

Dr. Worth has an extensive background on recovery and has written the book, "Opioid-Free 1-2-3 A Self Help Guide for Recovery." During his career, he has created programs with the theme of "Wellness is We-ness," and developed tools to help with recovery and wellness. Dr. Worth is a practicing marriage and family counselor and

psychologist, with over 40 years of experience. He and his wife, Neelam, are owners of the Family and Marital Counseling Center in Weston.

"Don is a really genuine, intelligent and strong advocate and clinician for those with substance abuse disorder," said Dr. Bruce Gorby, addiction treatment specialist at Mon Health Recovery Care Center. "I consider him a friend and an ally in our fight against addiction."

Dr. Worth explained that in recovery, a person lives on a scale from illness to wellness. His program is outlined in three steps and his June 4 presentation will focus on the third step – the maintenance phase.

"The first step is to understand opioids; the

second step is to recuperate and rebuild mind and body wellness; and the third step is a maintenance phase during which you will develop directional gauges for wellness that will aid in continuing on a path of recovery," he said.

Currently, Dr. Worth is finishing an anthology documenting the pandemic and has authored a self-help recovery guide. He is also scheduled to present on "Relationship Recovery in These Times" at the American Mental Health Counselors Association Conference in Las Vegas later this June.
