Grand Jury indicts 11

Eleven individuals were indicted on June 7 during the June term of the grand jury on a total of 44 charges. Braxton County Prosecuting Attorney Jasmine R.H. Morton presented the state's evidence during the proceedings in front of Circuit Court Judge Richard A. Facemire.

Jerry Ray Hart, 32 of Sutton, and Bridgette Jayne Payne, 42 of Frametown were both indicted on three charges including two counts of possession with intent to deliver for methamphetamine and fentanyl and one count of conspiracy. Braxton County Sheriff's Department Deputy Andrew Groves presented the evidence obtained during a traffic stop on January 22. Hart was also indicted for escape after Deputy Groves located his ankle monitor, which was part of his bond, in the middle of his driveway on February 7.

Anthony Marino Paletti, 42 of Flatwoods, and Melissa Sue Thompson, 36 of Gassaway, were indicted on three felony counts, two for possession with intent to deliver for methamphetamine and fentanyl and one for conspiracy. Charges stemmed from a traffic stop on January 23. BCSD Deputy Cleve E. Westfall presented the evidence to the grand jury.

Samantha Brooke Starcher, 31 of Wallback is facing three felony counts of introducing contraband into regional jail. On January 24, the

defendant is alleged to have transported methamphetamine, alprazolam, and suboxone into the Central Regional Jail. West Virginia State Police CPL Phil A. Huff was the complaining officer who came before the grand jury.

Lamar Edward James, 40 of Carolina, was indicted by the grand jury on the felony charge of burglary and the misdemeanor charge of petit larceny. Deputy Groves was the investigating officer of a call for breaking and entering on Frame Drive in Gassaway leading to the charges on January 28.

Marquis Linell Williams, 26 of Sutton, is facing 14 felony counts, five each of forgery of a public document and uttering of a public document, and two counts each of forgery and uttering. WVSP TPR Edward W. Clark investigated the complaint of an inmate at CRJ who used a false name during his incarceration in January.

Jeremiah Scott Walker, 32 of Huntington, was indicted on two felony counts of inmate in possession of a controlled substance. On October 10, the defendant was found in possession of suboxone and methamphetamine at the CRJ. TPR Caleb Harper presented the evidence to the grand jury.

Derek Joel Stump, 22 of Normantown, is facing one count of burglary, one count of petit larceny, and two counts

of destruction of property. Deputy Groves investigated the call for a burglary complaint in Gassaway on December 26 leading to the charges.

Christina Marie Abel, 43 of Flatwoods, was indicted by the grand jury on three felony charges, entry of a building other than a dwelling, grand larceny, and escape, and one misdemeanor charge of destruction of property. TPR Harper presented the evidence from March 22 of an individual, Abel, taking a car from Mid-State Chevy. The escape charge stemmed from an incident on March 30 where the defendant cut off her ankle monitor.

David Aaron Cogar was directly indicted on the felony charges of wanton endangerment involving a firearm and malicious assault. TPR Harper presented to the grand jury.

(Editor's Note: The return of an indictment by a Grand Jury indicates that a person has been formally charged by the State with the commission of a crime or crimes. It is an accusation. The U.S. Constitution provides that a person is presumed innocent until proven guilty by the State. Upon entering a plea of innocent, persons accused of a crime are entitled to a trial by a jury of their peers. The guilt or innocence of the accused is determined by a Petit Jury, not by means of an indictment by a Grand Jury.)

A separate online auction what has been active for a week also concluded at 8:00 p.m. with a host of winners claiming a total of 84 prize packages donated by community businesses and individuals. "We can not thank our supporters enough for the host of fine prizes and gift certificates that made up the auction and raffle prizes," said Given. "Their generosity greatly contributed to our Club awarding \$12,000 in scholarships to BCHS graduates."

The evening began with a delicious meal prepared by Anita Miller and her crew. Sissy Price gave the invocation, followed by Given's welcome to those in attendance and Dylan Johnson's introduction

of Rotary guests.

Master of Ceremonies Jamie Oates began the elimination at 7:00 p.m. All the activities were broadcast live via Braxton Live courtesy of the Eric Campbell and his crew.

"We have had a lot of input regarding the two formats used to keep the Elimination Dinner alive during the pandemic. We like this year's combination which allows everyone to gather for fellowship and fun but gives those who live outside Braxton County or are otherwise unable to attend an opportunity to get in on the fun. We hope to improve on the new combination for future dinners. We also hope to return to our early spring date next year," concluded the President.

Council hears concern; Sutton Police Chief resigns

The Sutton Town Council held a meeting on June 9. Council member Beth Atkins was absent.

Mayor JD Hoover opened the meeting by welcoming the new Mexican restaurant, Maria's, to town. He also noted Main Street Coffee would be opening on June 11 but would be having their official ribbon cutting on June 13 at 1:00 pm.

Council member Jon Crum provided the council with an update on the Farmer's Market. There will be a Jeep Event held there on July 16. More details will come soon concerning the event. Nik Salvo, Manager, requests that more of the brush be removed from around the stage and the large tree next to the stage will need to be removed. The Market also has received the initial quotes for electrical work but is waiting for another estimate.

Jay Chidester requested the pot holes on his street on Town Hill be addressed.

Poncho White asked about the procedure for businesses to receive their license through the town. He questioned whether or not the town

was making sure the new businesses were meeting all state and requirements before opening, specifically if they were handicap accessible. White then asked about the continued water issue on his property. He stated that during heavy rains all of the water comes onto his porch. He also complained about the speeding on Town Hill and not seeing any law enforcement enforcing the stop signs. Chief Shane Boggs noted that he had been working with the deputies to target areas that he was receiving the most complaints from. Another issue is the lack of opportunities for contracting officers for patrols. Currently he is only able to use deputies on their days off and now he is competing with the Corps of Engineer and their dam patrols.

Chief Boggs submitted a letter of resignation to council effective June 15. He stated he felt it best he move on from the police department and thanked council for the opportunity. He also stated he had made his best attempts to move the department forward but unfortu-

nately did not believe the vision was shared with members of the council. He addressed the misinformation that he had cost the town a bunch of money. Chief Boggs discussed the outdated equipment and the use of grants to get the department up to code for any officer that comes into the department. He also noted he had not taken any salary from this town for his work. The town has only paid for the training however he paid for gas going to and from the trainings. He also paid for where he was staying as he traveled and his meals. Chief Boggs went on to say he was tired of the complaints as he was only volunteering his time to help the community but the misinformation was making it difficult to do his job. He noted he also stopped work on his doctorate in law enforcement chaplaincy to volunteer for this job. Chief Boggs ended by wishing the town the best for the police department.

AG warns consumers of Mystery Shopper scams

West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey is warning consumers to be cautious when responding to offers to become secret or mystery shoppers.

Mystery shopping is actually a legitimate endeavor. A company will offer you the opportunity to shop at your favorite stores and get paid for it. However, scammers have learned to take advantage of people's desire to be part of such a venture.

"Mystery shopping can be a valid way to make some extra money," Attorney General Morrisey said. "But consumers need to have their wits about them or they can

get ripped off."

Real secret shopper opportunities can be found through the mystery shopping trade group, Mystery Shopping Providers Association. Scammers, however, will set up fake websites, post newspaper ads, and use emails to convince consumers that the money is free and easy.

Typically, the fake mystery shopping company will send you a check to deposit and then ask you to "shop" for gift cards and send the company the cards or the PIN codes or ask the consumer to test a wire transfer service by sending the money to someone else. Then the check is identified

as fake and the consumer is responsible for the money they spent. Or the fake mystery shopping company will want interested parties to pay a program fee to be certified or to be guaranteed an assignment.

Legitimate companies won't require payment and won't pay upfront for shopping.

Steve Facemire also stated he had received a phone call concerning an issue with individuals stealing trees and plants out of the planters around town. Mayor Hoover discussed an email received from Lisa Conant from City National Bank about us-

News from our Capitol

As is well-deserved, we always congratulate high school grads each spring as they announce their future plans for college, post-secondary job training, or direct entry into the workforce. Sometimes lost in the announcements are those young men and women that opt to concentrate on one of the most important and honorable careers; one that has a profound effect on every American. I'm referencing those that received appointments to one of the service academies or enlisting in one of the service branches of the Armed Forces of the United States.

I want to take this opportunity to congratulate and thank each and every graduate that has or will soon be departing for their basic training locations around the nation for their particular branch of service. Whether your plans are enlisting for a specific time and plan to go on to other endeavors, or you're planning on making it your career, we thank you for

your decision, future service, and sacrifice. Please know that you will join the ranks of all those that are continually in our thoughts and prayers as you protect our freedoms, here and around the world.

As I write on this Sunday evening after church services, I've been to the Capitol for afternoon meetings, with a return to the Capitol for more meetings through Tuesday. While the Governor has not called us into session at the time of this writing, he has announced a joint assembly of the Legislature on Tuesday afternoon. Members have not received an agenda for the meeting and we've yet to receive a pre-speech transcript since he's been Governor, but it is widely anticipated that the topic will revolve around the critical issue of school safety.

Recent events confirm that we can no longer assume any school is in a category of "It can never happen here". That category no longer exists. Likewise, no community can affirm with certainty that their

schools are without risk. Public, private, church - no school is totally safe, unless updated security measures are imposed and continually reassessed, and revised accordingly.

It is widely anticipated that whatever Congress passes in response to the recent tragic events in schools and businesses, substantial funding for school safety measures will likely be included. That's why it is important for our state budget surplus to recognize that some matching funding may be necessary to assist counties in implementing enhanced school safety measures. Make no mistake, any new measures will be expensive.

Most schools and many businesses already require you to be "buzzed in" to gain initial access. However, a handful of WV schools have already constructed a "trap" that consists of a secure area with bulletproof glass and locks, between two remotely controlled doors. When an intruder enters the first door, they are trapped before proceeding further through a second locked door until their identity and security risk can be assessed.

Speculation is that we may expect to see metal detectors, scanners, additional security personnel, more video surveillance,

and the employees trained to monitor and maintain all the systems, including trained law enforcement officers at entry points. I'm no security expert, but I do know that, based on recent events, I would not want to be the school administrator or official that must explain to the public why security measures were not in place.

Central West Virginia is a wonderful place to live, work and raise a family. However, we need to recognize the realities of today, whether in cities, towns, or rural regions of our nation. It's regrettable that a big outlay of funding likely will be needed, but unavoidable and necessary to protect the most precious and vulnerable among us - our kids. Let's make sure that we act proactively as opposed to a reactive response.

year. The motion passed.


Ginger Altizer, Director of Finance, and Kim Dennison, Director of Federal Programs, reported to board members on the Federal Pandemic Relief Funds. The funds were to be used to help with learning losses and for the health and safety of students. They first discussed the timeline of the reporting on both the state and federal levels. The report reflected not only what funds had been spent for but also the budget for future spending of those funds. Technology, food services, PPE, and cleaning supplies were purchased with the first round of funds. The One-to-One devices (laptops), the summer learning program, and losses at the gate for high school athletic events were supplemented by Pandemic Funds. Budget transfers will be presented to board members in the upcoming weeks as some rearranging of the funds will need to be made for those that expire first to meet the required parameters. The budget for the CIS (Community In Schools) will be dropped and transferred due to the state grant covering all eight schools until 2024. The report for the funds will be released for public review.

Under regular business, the following consent agenda items were approved by the board on a motion by Evelyn Post with a second by Dr. Martha Dean: approval of May 24 special meeting minutes, May 24 regular meeting minutes, and May 31, special meeting minutes; payment of bills; and budget transfers and supplements.

The board approved the following professional, service, and extra-curricular personnel recommendations on a motion by Evelyn Post with a second by Dr. Martha Dean: employment for Karl Michael Boyce, 2022 summer student tutor, Camden Lawrence, Grace Belknap, Margaret Moore, and Johnna Cable, tutors for libraries, Brittany White Conley, from physical education/health teacher, BCMS, to 5th grade, Frametown, Tashauna Chapman, from 1st grade, Frametown, to Special Education/Gifted (LD/BD/MI/AU)(Itinerant), Frametown, Mahala Petrulak, from math, BCMS, to physical education/health, BCMS, John McElwain, physical education/health, BCHS, Carla Mauser, from special education (LD/BD/MI/AU) 1/2 time, Sutton, to 3rd grade, Burnsville, Zackary Cyriacks, 5th grade coverage, Flatwoods, Ocie Allen, 1st grade, Flatwoods, Heather Arnold, from special education (LD/BD/MI/AU) Flatwoods, to special education (LD/BD/MI/AU), BCHS, April Ramsey-Boyce, English, BCHS, Deborah Doshier, math, BCHS, Randall Brown, from 6th grade social studies, BCMS to 7th grade social studies, Billy Rose and David McQuain, summer substitute mechanic, Marcy Hamilton, summer substitute bus operator, Helen Harper, Linda Lemon, Chasity Dawn Cutlip, and Donna Morris, summer substitute cook, Michall Sears, custodian, and Forrest Taylor, co-assistant football coach, BCHS; and resignations for Marcy Hamilton, summer bus operator, Folondi Shaver, volleyball coach, BCHS, and Deandre Williams, assistant athletic director.

The board went into executive session at 7:16 pm to discuss the cell tower lease on a motion by Dr. Martha Dean with a second by Dolores Wright. They reconvened at 7:48 pm with no decisions made.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:51 pm. The next regular meeting is scheduled for June 21. As always, members of the Braxton County community are encouraged to attend regular board meetings. Anyone wishing to speak as a delegate or with public concerns may do so by signing in up to 15 minutes prior to the start of the meeting.

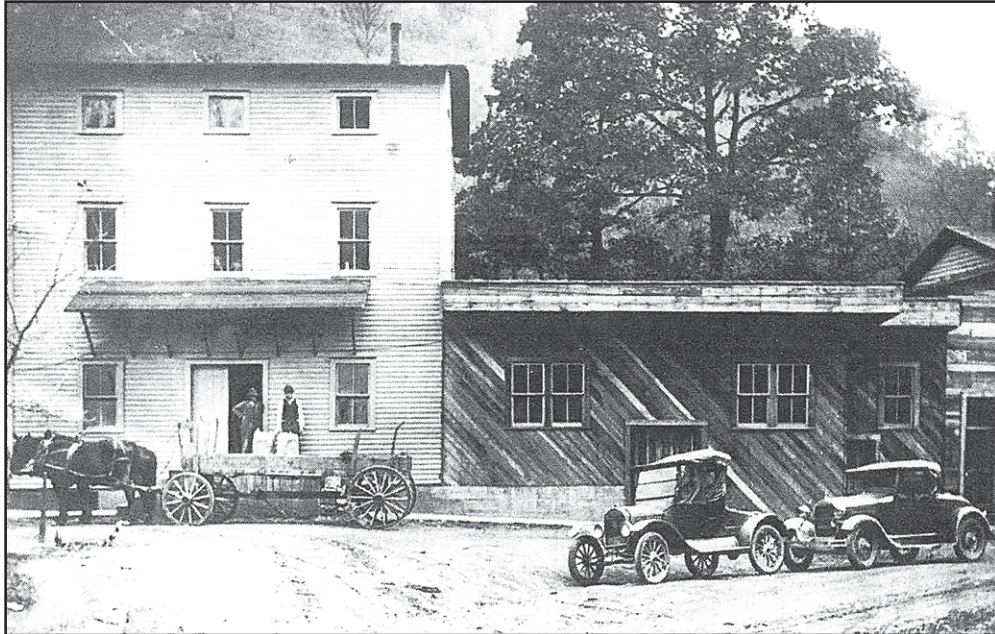

Exchange Mill...
This photo shows the popular Exchange Mill in the early 1920s. 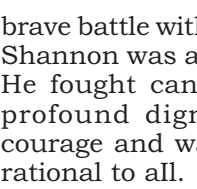

(This story has ap- peared several times and places on the inter- net in recent years. I am going to tell the story in three parts in separate posts this Easter sea- son. - Dick S)

I'll never forget Eas- ter 1946. I was 14, my little sister Ocy was 12, and my older sister Darlene 16. We lived at home with our mother, and the four of us knew what it was to do with- out many things. My dad had died five years before, leaving Mom with seven school kids to raise and no money.

By 1946 my older sisters were married and my brothers had left home. A month be- fore Easter the pastor of our church announced that a special Easter offering would be taken to help a poor family. He asked everyone to save and give sacrificially.

As we walked home after church, we sang all the way. At lunch, Mom had a surprise for us. She had bought a dozen eggs, and we had boiled Easter eggs with our fried potatoes! Late that afternoon the minister drove up in his car. Mom went to the door, talked with him for a moment, and then came back with an en- velope in her hand. We asked what it was, but she didn't say a word. She opened the enve-

lope and out fell a bunch of money. There were three crisp \$20 bills, one \$10 and seventeen \$1 bills.

Mom put the money back in the envelope. We didn't talk, just sat and stared at the floor. We had gone from feel- ing like millionaires to feeling like poor white trash. We kids had such a happy life that we felt sorry for anyone who didn't have our Mom and Dad for parents and a house full of brothers and sisters and other kids visiting constantly. We thought it was fun to share silverware and see whether we got the spoon or the fork that night.

We had two knives that we passed around to whoever needed them. I knew we didn't have a lot of things that other people had, but I'd never thought we were poor.

That Easter day I found out we were. The minister had brought us the money for the poor family, so we must be poor. I didn't like being poor. I looked at my dress and worn-out shoes and felt so ashamed—I didn't even want to go back to church. Everyone there probably already knew we were poor!

I thought about school. I was in the ninth

grade and at the top of my class of over 100 students. I wondered if the kids at school knew that we were poor. I de- cided that I could quit school since I had fin- ished the eighth grade. That was all the law re- quired at that time. We sat in silence for a long time. Then it got dark, and we went to bed. All that week, we girls went to school and came home, and no one talked much. Finally on Satur- day, Mom asked us what we wanted to do with the money. What did poor people do with the money? We didn't know. We'd never known we were poor. We didn't want to go to church on Sunday, but Mom said we had to. Although it was a sunny day, we didn't talk on the way.

Mom started to sing, but no one joined in and she only sang one verse. At church, we had a missionary speaker. He talked about how churches in Africa made buildings out of sun- dried bricks, but they needed money to buy roofs. He said \$100 would put a roof on a church. The minister said, "Can't we all sac- rifice to help these poor people?" We looked at each other and smiled for the first

LUCAS to offer lung cancer screening in Glenville

LUCAS, a first of its kind, state-of-the-art mobile lung cancer screening unit, will visit Gilmer and Calhoun counties offering low-dose computed tomography (LDCT) scans. LUCAS

A service of WVU Medicine-WVU Hospitals and the WVU Cancer Institute, LUCAS will be at:

Gilmer County Senior Center in Glenville from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on June 29. For an appointment, call Sallie Matthews at 304-462-5761.

Patient and staff safety is a top priority, and extra precautions will be taken during the pandemic. These include staff wearing masks, patients waiting in their car until their appointment time, and thorough

sanitization between patients.

The lung cancer screenings are billed to private insurance, Medicaid, or Medicare. Uninsured patients living in West Virginia who meet screening criteria can receive their lung cancer screening on LUCAS through the generosity of grant funding and donations. A physician's order and prior authorization from insurance are required to get screened. Appointments must be made 14 or more days in advance of the visit to allow time for insurance pre-authorizations.

LUCAS, an acronym for Lung Cancer Screening, builds upon the success and infrastructure established by Bonnie's

Bus. In West Virginia, more people die of lung cancer than colorectal, prostate, and breast cancer combined. LUCAS travels to the 42 counties in the state without easy access to lung cancer screening.

Similar to mammography, regular lung cancer screening can detect cancer early, when it is easier to treat and cure. Both units are part of the WVU Cancer Institute Mobile Cancer Screening Program and work in collaboration with a statewide partnership of clinicians, public health professionals, and other community leaders to reduce the number of deaths from breast and lung cancer in West Virginia.

DHHR to issue special payment to TANF recipients

The payment is funded through the TANF Pandemic Emergency Assistance Fund and will assist families with the rising cost of healthy food, beverages, and household goods. It will also assist with the rising cost of transportation for families seeking em-

ployment, attending work, or continuing their education.

This payment will be credited to the recipient's Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) card. Payments will occur on the EBT card around June 9, 2022.

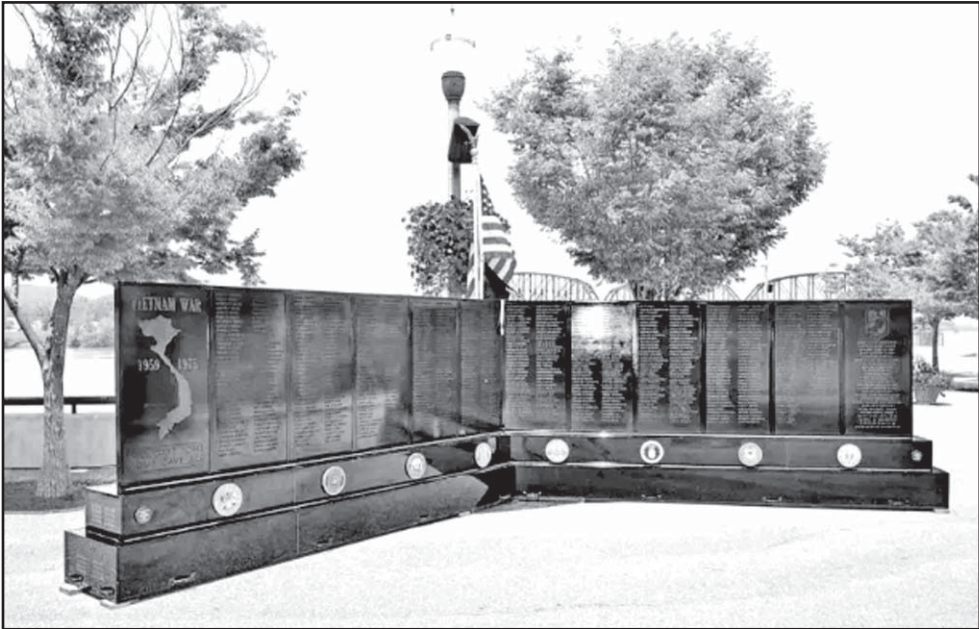

The Burnsville Freedom Festival and the Town of Burnsville is honored to host the Mobile Wall July 1st and 2nd, 2022. This replica of the Vietnam War Memorial will be on display at the Burnsville Dam along with the Modern Wall which features conflicts from 1975-2017.

The West Virginia State Council, Vietnam Veterans of America are introducing a very important display for all the Veterans, families, friends, and communities in West Virginia. The Mobile Wall is the result of many hours of work and the generosity of so many West Virginians. The Wall includes all of the 732 who members of the Armed Forces from West Virginia who lost their lives in Vietnam. Also included on the Wall are the Prisoners of War, and those still Missing in Action on the soil of South Vietnam, North Vietnam, its seaways and theater of operation. This list of brave West Virginians is a list of true heroes

that gave their lives in Vietnam for their country and this proud state.

The West Virginia State Council Mobile Wall is currently traveling throughout the state and will, in time, visit every county. The Mobile wall does not have a permanent home. Our intention is to display it in as many communities as possible. For these who have never visited the "Wall" in Washington, D.C. or have never had the opportunity to see the "Moving Wall" that has traveled across the United States, this will be a chance to see the names of the loss that West Virginia suffered in Vietnam and will so many a chance to pay homage to those who gave their all.

We have published the names of individuals, members of the business community, Veterans Service Organizations, other Community Service Organizations and local government agencies who have made contributions to this project in our refer-

ence and information book that will be available wherever our Mobile Wall is displayed. We will be pleased to accept any donations to help with the cost of moving the wall and its maintenance.

The Wall is made up of twelve panels depicting Seven-hundred and thirty-two West Virginians who were killed, held as POW's and those listed as MIA's. The panels are two feet wide by four feet in height, made of a light composite material. The length of the wall is thirteen feet on each of the two sided sections bringing the total length of the wall to twenty-six feet. On the face of the upper tier the logo's of the following are displayed: Veitnam Veterans of America, Associates of Vietnam Veterans of America, United States Army, United States Marine Corps, Unites States Navy, United States Coast Guard, United States Air Force, Unites States Merchant Marines.

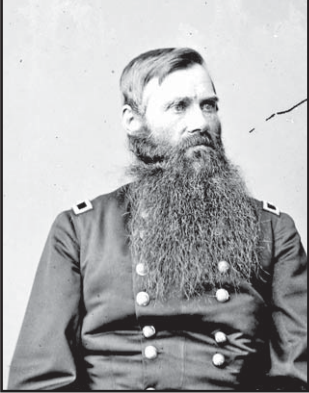
June 15, 1876: Attorney and civil right activist T. G. Nutter was born. The first African-American delegate from Kanawha County, he helped establish Lakin State



Hospital and crafted an anti-lynching law.

June 15, 1880: Musician Blind Alfred Reed was born in Floyd County, Virginia, though he spent most of his life in West Virginia. He composed and recorded some of the most creative topical country songs on Victor Records between 1927 and 1929.

June 16, 1842: Margaret Agnew Blennerhassett, wife of Harman Blennerhassett, died in poverty in New York City. She lived from 1800 to 1806 in a grand 16-room mansion she and her husband had constructed on an Ohio River island near present Parkersburg. She



and her son, Harman Jr., were reburied on Blennerhassett Island in 1996.

June 17, 1813: General Thomas Maley Harris was born at present Harrisville. He rose to prominence after the Civil War, when he served on the military commission that tried conspirators who acted with John Wilkes Booth in the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln.

June 17, 1961: A Wayne County bridge was named in honor of TV newsman David Brinkley. The condition of the bridge had become a news item during the 1960 presidential primary; state officials closed the bridge, repaired it, and invited Brinkley to return for the ceremony to officially name it the "Brinkley Bridge."

June 18, 1937: Jay Rockefeller was born in New York City. He became West Virginia's 29th governor in 1977, and in 1984, he was elected to the U.S. Senate.

June 18, 1944: It's Wheeling Steel aired its last program. A half-hour musical variety radio program that drew upon talented Wheeling Steel employees and families, the show ran eight years and was



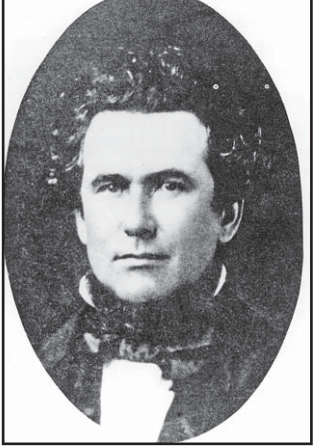
broadcast nationally.

June 19, 1905: Senator Rush Dew Holt was born in Weston. At 29, Holt was the youngest person ever elected to the U.S. Senate, earning him the nickname "Boy Senator." Since the Constitution sets 30 as the minimum age for senators, Holt had to wait until his birthday in June 1935



to take his seat, nearly six months into the 74th Congress.

June 19, 1909: Oak Park, an amusement park in Preston County, opened. The park was an easy ride from Morgantown, and helped to fill up trains on weekends and holidays. On one summer



day in 1909, 14 trains brought more than 4,000 people to the park.

June 20, 1861: Francis Pierpont was unanimously elected as governor of the

unionist Reorganized State of Virginia, which sat at Wheeling until West Virginia entered the Union two years later.

June 20, 1863: West Virginia became the 35th state. Arthur Boreman was the state's first governor.

June 20, 1932: The West Virginia capitol was officially dedicated. Construction had begun in 1924.



the 100th birthday of West Virginia, President John F. Kennedy made his last appearance in West Virginia. Speaking in Charleston in a pouring rain, he said "The sun does not always shine in West Virginia, but the people always do."

June 21, 1920: Wheeling Steel Corporation was organized when La Belle Iron Works, Whitaker-Glessner Company, and Wheeling Steel & Iron Works combined. In the 1920s, Wheeling Steel employed more than 17,000 workers and ranked as the nation's third-largest steelmaker.



June 21, 1959: Musician Kathy Mattea was born in South Charleston but grew up in nearby Cross Lanes. In junior high school she learned to play the guitar, and in high school she practiced her vocal skills singing classical music in choir class.

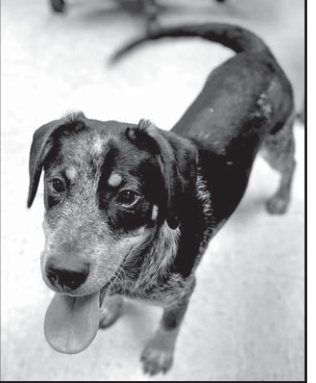

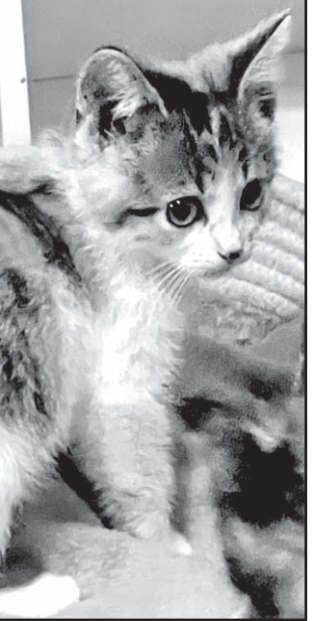
Our spay/neuter assistance program will continue during this time. If you have thoughtfully considered pet ownership, NOW may be the time to add a feline friend to your family.

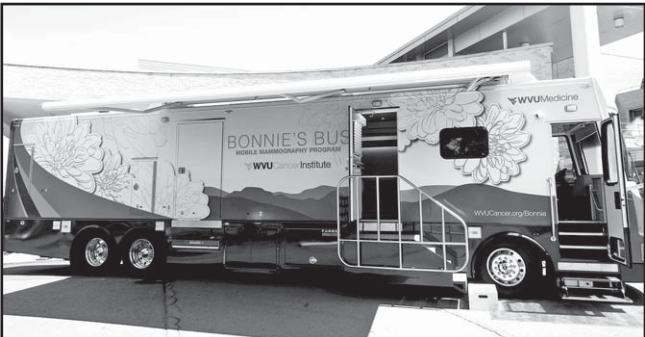

Patient and staff safety is a top priority, and extra precautions will be taken during the pandemic. These include staff wearing masks, patients waiting in their car until their appointment time, and thorough sanitization between patients.

The screening mammograms are billed to private insurance, Medicaid, or Medicare, if

available. Patients who are underinsured or uninsured and meet enrollment criteria will be assisted in enrolling in the West Virginia Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Program (WVBCCSP) to cover the cost of their screening mammogram. Uninsured women living in West Virginia who are 40 and older can receive a free screening mammogram on the Bus through the generosity of grant funding and donations. A physician’s order is needed for a mammogram.

Bonnie’s Bus has provided more than 25,000 mammograms for women throughout West Virginia and led to the detection of more than 125 cases of breast cancer since 2009. Many of those screened are

underinsured or uninsured and qualify for screening through the WVBCCSP.

Bonnie’s Bus works in collaboration with a statewide partnership of clinicians, public health professionals, women’s groups, and other community leaders working to help reduce the number of deaths from breast cancer in West Virginia.

Made possible by a generous gift from West Virginia natives Jo and Ben Statler to the Cancer Institute, Bonnie’s Bus is operated in partnership with WVU Hospitals. The Bus is named after Jo Statler’s late mother, Bonnie Wells Wilson.

Manchin announces \$468K to combat food insecurity in West Virginia

U.S. Senator Joe Manchin (D-WV), member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, announced \$468,829 from the U.S. Department of Agriculture’s (USDA) Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) to the West Virginia Department of Agriculture. The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) funding was made possible through the American Rescue Plan to provide emergency food assistance and bolster local food distribution infrastructure in rural and underserved communities across the country. The West Virginia Department of Agriculture will distribute the majority of the funding to the Facing Hunger Food Bank in Huntington and the Mountaineer Food Bank in Gas-saway.

“Every West Virginian should have access to quality, affordable food and a roof over their head each night.

Addressing food insecurity continues to be one of my top priorities, and I am pleased USDA is investing in the West Virginia Department of Agriculture to support our local food organizations like the Facing Hunger Food Bank and the Mountaineer Food Bank to provide emergency food assistance for West Virginians in need,” said Senator Manchin. “I look forward to seeing the positive impacts of this funding and as a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, I will continue to advocate for resources to combat food insecurity and feed West Virginians in need.”

States receiving TEFAP Reach and Resiliency Grants will use the funds to implement unique and creative solutions to address potential gaps in TEFAP coverage, and to make critical investments in food distribution infrastructure in underserved areas.

Through the grants, USDA is empowering State agencies to better serve those in need of emergency food assistance, especially in communities facing barriers to access. TEFAP helps supplement the diets of low-income Americans by providing them with emergency food assistance at no cost. Through TEFAP, USDA purchases a variety of nutritious, high-quality USDA Foods, and makes those foods available to State agencies. States provide the food to local agencies that they have selected, usually food banks, which in turn distribute the food to local organizations, such as soup kitchens and food pantries that directly serve the public. These local organizations then distribute the USDA Foods to eligible recipients for household consumption or use them to prepare and serve meals in congregate settings.

DMV issues expiration extension on mobility impaired placards to August 31st

Due to a supply issue, the West Virginia Division of Motor Vehicles has announced today that they will extend the expiration dates of all mobility impaired placards to August 31, 2022.

Renewal of a permanent mobility impaired placard occurs every five years, and the new cycle historically begins on July 1st. However, with supply chain issues, and in an effort to provide seamless, convenient customer service, DMV

Commissioner Everett Frazier announced the extension to August 31st to make sure new placards are ready for customers.

“I believe in making sure our customers are taken care of. Unfortunately, due to COVID and other supply chain issues, some of our materials are not available. We don’t want our customers to be inconvenienced, so extending the expiration date, on my authority, makes the best sense,” he said.

Beef Quality Assurance training workshop scheduled

Beef Quality Assurance (BQA) is a national program that raises consumer confidence through offering proper management techniques and a commitment to quality within every segment of the beef industry. This includes cow/calf and stocker producers, so anyone that keeps any beef cattle should be interested.

Beginning January 1, 2019, major beef buyers, including Wendy’s and Tyson required the farmers they purchase from to be BQA certified and the expectation is other major buyers will follow suit. There are already markets in surrounding states that require BQA certification to sell. It’s

only a matter of time until buyers at our local markets will be looking for cattle from BQA certified producers.

BQA training and certification has been around in West Virginia for nearly 30 years. Two options for training are available. First, producers can be certified by going online at <https://bqa.beeflearningcenter.org/> and doing the training at their own pace. Training will take 2-3 hours. If you want to use this option but don’t have internet access, you can come to the WVU-Braxton County Extension Office and use a computer. Just call ahead to setup a time (304-765-2809).

The second option is

attending a certification workshop. These trainings will use similar materials as the online program. The training program will be offered on June 20, 7:00 p.m. at the Flatwoods Community Building. Braxton County Farm Bureau is hosting the training that will be held after their brief meeting.

There is no cost for the online or face-to-face training programs. BQA certification is not difficult but will become increasingly important for market access. All beef producers should consider becoming BQA certified. For more information, please contact the WVU-Braxton County Extension Office at 304-765-2809.

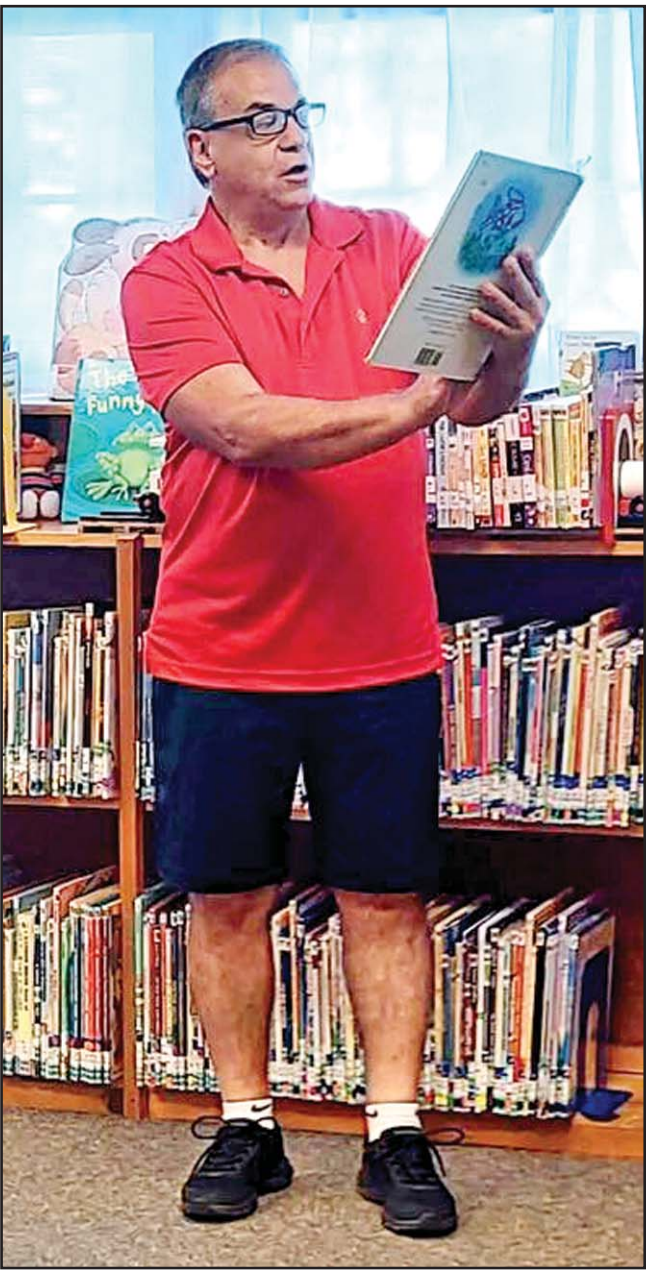

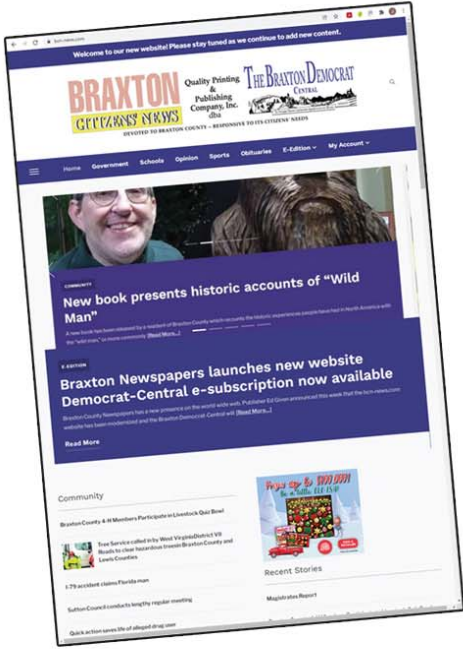
