I'm no security expert, but I do know that, based on recent events, I would not want to be the school administrator or official that must explain to the public why security measures were not in place.



Cabbage worms are caterpillars hatched from eggs laid by the cabbage looper (moth) or the white butterfly with black spots on its wings. These butterflies vary in size but belong all to the same family.




