If you are running a month to prep for your fall hunting plots. I left two areas in cereal rye to seed out for the turkeys, squirrel, and doves. The wildlife is about done with those plots so it is time to move on to my next planting. I use a notill planting method so I will roll down the remaining cereal rye after seeding in my early fall mix of turnips and radishes. If I see weed competition, I will use glyphosate in a light dose to add to the thatch layer for my fall

Finally, with bucks' racks in full velvet, start running your camera surveys to see what bucks are on the landscape for the fall seasons. Keeping a couple of the bucks from dispersing with quality habitat is a focus of mine so I stay tuned into their needs on an annual basis.

Make these chores a family endeavor and get your kids out to help you on the projects. Help them identify trees, flowers, plants, and while your out there, see what birds are using your property. You may be assisting vulnerable species such as the Golden Winged Warbler or the Cerulean Warbler and not even know it!

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News from our Capitol

To begin this week, we need to keep our neighbors in eastern Kentucky in our prayers and be willing to step up with donations and, if possible, boots on the ground. As I write this Sunday night, the rains are still falling, even after record rainfall and flooding has occurred. Already the death and destruction are beyond comprehension, and the waters have yet to recede. When our State experienced a similar event in 2016, rebuilding is still ongoing. Eastern Kentucky will need help for months and years to come, just like we did, to recover and rebuild.

In twenty-six years in the Legislature and having served during the terms of five governors, one long standing axiom has proven to be good advice, time and time again. If you are calling a special session of the Legislature, you need to have some consensus on (a) the agenda and (b)

consensus on any bills

placed on the special call.

Otherwise, it often becomes unproductive and not the best use of time and taxpayer

That unwritten bit of guidance was never more relevant than it was last week, when a special session to address one single issue – a slight reduction in state income tax rates morphed into a six-day debacle that included a bill to clarify abortion law in West Virginia. It ended in the late-night last Friday with no bills sent to the Governor, including his tax reduction bill. The only agreement was a resolution passed by both bodies that adjourned until the legislative leadership determines a date to reconvene. While the Governor did

have a plan on taxes, it was apparently not vetted, or consensus reached beforehand with both houses. His bill (HB 301) was first taken up in the House of Delegates and was passed and communicated to the Senate. Whereupon the Senate opted not to consider the bill, eventually only passing a

non-binding resolution in

support of some future tax reduction. Thus, the bill that was the purpose of calling the Legislature into session during July interim meetings was dead.

Meanwhile, late Monday, the Governor amended his original call to include taking up the abortion issue. However, he did not propose a bill, leaving it up to the House and Senate to individually come up with a plan with no advance notice. In hurried fashion, the House Health & Human Resources Committee originated a bill (HB 302) and advanced it to the Judiciary Committee. It passed Judiciary; a public hearing was held on Wednesday and eventually passed the House by a vote of 69-23. The bill was amended in the Senate and passed late last Friday evening, sending it back to the House, which refused to accept the Senate version, predominately over physician liability.

As a result, both the House and Senate adjourned, subject to the "call of the chair". At some point, we will reconvene, a conference committee will be appointed to attempt to work out the differences in

guarantee that will occur in a timely manner. Eventually, a bill will pass, but it is not clear at this point what

Some bills are simple and require minimal debate. Others are more complex and must be researched beforehand to obtain consensus in a timely manner. Still others are both complex and emotionally charged, such as HB 302. These bills are better suited for the regular session, where concerns can be vetted beforehand, all sides can make their case in multiple committees, and members can make informed decisions on amendments, based on the information attained from research, debate, and the principles of each member.

There is no doubt in my mind that a bill will eventually end up on the Governor's desk for his action, whether it's sooner or later. But what happened last week was akin to someone deciding to build a house. Then, with no advance notice or planning they decided to build a highrise building. They had no specific plan or blueprints; no list of materials; no preliminary preparations. Despite the lack of planning, one hundred thirtyfour builders were called in without advance notice to the worksite with no coordination beforehand. Not a productive way to proceed on an important project.






