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Meeting regarding poor Frontier service termed "productive"

Nearly eighty local residents attended a meeting last Thursday at the Braxton County Senior Center to hear concerns regarding poor landline telephone service through Frontier Communications. The meeting, hosted by the Braxton County Commission, included commission members, representatives of the West

Virginia Public Service Commission and Frontier Communications and the public. Frontier was represented by John Tipton, Director of Operations and Local Area Manager Aaron Crowder. Terri Blake and Cindy Delaney represented the Public Service Commission. Commission Presi-

dent Lisa Godwin facilitated the meeting which allowed seventy-eight residents to voice their concerns. One of the major topics concerns dealt with customers not being able to use their phone service during power outages. Frontier representatives identified

Judy's Garden Club's native WV plant garden thrives

Saturday, members of Judy's Garden Club, Appalachian District, received a plaque from the West Virginia Master Gardeners Extension for their work on the native plant garden near the Sutton Dam. That garden came to be on a proposal from the local Corps of Engineers.

Two years ago, rangers from the Sutton Corps of Engineers approached Judy's Garden Club with a request. Members of that group granted the request; the result is the West Virginia native plant garden in the area of the Sutton dam. The Corps of Engineer asked for the garden as an attraction to bring more people to the area. Lisa Dennison, master gardener and native plant garden coordinator, described the situation and the members' reaction. "We ran with it," she said.

An example of the members' interest can be seen in what Dennison noted she began doing. "I went out in the woods," she said, "and dug up what I thought was common to West Virginia." Others did the same, and the garden reflects their efforts.

The garden, an oval which Dennison estimated measures 30 feet by 20 feet, contains over 100 native plants and pollinators. These include lungwort, wild geranium, rose mallard, obedient plant, witch

hazel, bee balm, and Solomon seal. Some of these were donated by a Braxton-Clay Master Gardener who is also a member of Judy's Garden Club.

Also growing in the native plant garden are more than 12 shrubs, including mountain laurel, along with six ferns. "We thought we'd plant what people might see when they're out in the woods and wonder about. Now they can go to the garden and identify whatever they've seen," Dennison said.

Seeing that the garden succeeds has not been easy. Members of Judy's Garden Club, led by president Pat McPherson, along with Braxton-Clay Master Gardeners face several problems. The area of the garden is shady, and the soil is moist. Most of the plants have survived although a few have had to be replaced. Deer and ground hogs also present a problem, but the members have come up with ways to winterize and prevent most of the damage these animals can cause. They wrap bird netting around separate plants and use metal baskets to protect some.

All this hard work has certainly been noticed. This project by the Corps of Engineers, Judy's Garden Club, and Braxton-Clay Master Gardeners has received many awards. In May 2020, the local garden club received a National Garden Community Garden

Club Award. In October of the same year, the Army Corps of Engineers presented a "Power Acknowledgement" to the club for their work creating the site. Also, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' publication, *Castle Comments*, featured the creation of this interesting area.

Among awards given to the group is the recent plaque from WVU Master Gardeners Program. In January 2021, Judy's Garden Club received a \$1000 grant from National Garden Plant Americana to continue the plant and pollinator project. Club members used the funds to purchase educational tools and additional diverse native plants and to print educational brochures. They also bought improved markers and offered site visits and demonstrations.

Members of Judy's Garden Club and the Braxton-Clay Master Gardeners continue to analyze growth of the plants to replace those not growing well and to purchase additional native plants. Currently, they are planning to pre-prepare seed packets to distribute to anyone who wants them in the spring. The garden has proved a "labor of love" as McPherson and Dennison, along with all the others who have worked there, can attest.

New BoE members set goals for coming year

The new members of the Braxton County Board of Education met on Wednesday, July 27 for a special meeting/work session to discuss goals for school system. The board members presented both short-term and long-term goals.

Each board member had the opportunity to present their goals to the public one at a time. Many of the goals presented were comparable in nature, including improving student achievement, updating policies, and school safety. Other items discussed by various members were expanding the CTE program, increasing career and academic readiness, updating sports facilities, getting PRO officers in schools, establishing committees, and collaboration with local businesses.

Board President Evelyn Post noted the goals presented were

very similar. "I believe this board and our new superintendent are committed to making sure that a lot of these goals come to fruition," Post stated. The goals will be compiled and be presented to the public once they are in a more cohesion document. They will also be posted on the Braxton County Schools website.

Under regular business, the board approved the payment of bills on a motion by Dr. Kenna Seal with a second by Larry Hardway.

After an executive session from 6:04 pm to 8:02 pm, the board approved the following personnel recommendations and permission to post for two 1/2 time cook positions on a motion by Kevin Gregory and a second by Lisa Ratliff: employment of Lindsey Morris, preschool special needs teacher, Flatwoods,

Janice Bane, preschool special needs teacher, Flatwoods, Aaron Chenoweth, PE/planning, Flatwoods, Zachary Cyriacks, from 5th grade overage teacher, Flatwoods, to 6th grade science teacher, BCMS, Lisa Allen, from custodian, BCMS/BOE (2-10 shift) to custodian, part-time BCMS/BOE, Veronica Frame, substitute bus operator, and Addi Facemire, substitute aide.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:18 pm. The next regular meeting is set for this evening, August 2 at 6:00 pm. As always, members of the Braxton County community are encouraged to attend regular board meetings. Any parent or concerned community member wishing to speak as a delegate or with public concerns may do so by signing in up to 15 minutes prior to the start of the meeting.

Sutton Council discusses standing committees & more

The Sutton Town Council conducted their most recent meeting on July 28. Absent from the meeting were three council members, Steve Facemire, Beth Atkins, and Jon Crum.

Recorder Laurel Petolicchio asked Mayor JD Hoover if Facemire or Atkins had said anything about the quotes for a chair lift or elevator for the community building. Mayor Hoover stated he had not heard anything from either of them concerning those quotes.

Two community members, Joe Gates and Janet Six, requested the opportunity to participate on one of the standing committees. Under the town ordinances, it is at the discretion of the mayor whether or not to approve local indi-

viduals for committees. He informed them he would like the time to confer with the full council before making that decision.

The standing committees consist of Finance-Recorder Laurel Petolicchio, chair, Beth Atkins and Jon Crum; Roads, Streets, Sewers, and Street Drains-Steve Facemire, chair, Robyn Dolan, and Catherine Hoover; Public Safety and Health-Robyn Dolan, chair, Steve Facemire, Catherine Hoover; Police and Fire Protection and Municipal Court-Jon Crum, chair, Recorder Laurel Petolicchio, and Beth Atkins; Garbage and Recycling-Catherine Hoover, chair, Robyn Dolan, and Steve Facemire; and City Property and Community Building-Beth Atkins,

chair, Recorder Laurel Petolicchio, and Jon Crum. The council approved these committee appointments on a motion by Recorder Petolicchio with a second by Robyn Dolan.

Recorder Petolicchio requested the rental of the community for the second Saturday in December for the WV Bigfoot Museum and Mountain Laurel County Store Annual Yeti/Christmas Expo. Those council members present stated the use would be acceptable.

Police Chief Shane Boggs provided council members with an update. He has hired Jonathan Sergeant as a town officer. Officer Sergeant is already a certified officer through the state. He is also a certified fire fighter and has

driven for EMS in Nicholas County. Since July 14, the police department has issued a total of 21 citations with only four being from residents of Braxton County. Most of the citations were from Webster and Boone Counties. Four of the citations issued were for possession of controlled substance and they have impounded two vehicles. He discussed speaking with council the possibility of hiring another officer in executive session.

Chief Boggs presented the council with a proposal for SWAT I and MACTAC (Multi-Assault, Counter Terrorism Action Capabilities) training to take place in the town of Sutton. The training would be open to officers from around the state and nationwide. He

currently has officers from Florida, Georgia, and the Choctaw nation in Oklahoma interested in participating. The training will take place August 22-26 and he has already secured a vacant building as well as some locals to participate in the training. The SWAT training will also take place in collaboration with the Braxton County School System and the Braxton County Office of Emergency Services. At the end of the training, the department will have a fully developed active shooter plan for Sutton Elementary School. The town will have two free spots for officers with being the host town for the training. On a motion by Recorder Laurel Petolicchio with a second by Robyn Dolan, the council ap-

proved his request to move forward with the training.

Robyn Dolan mentioned she had spoken with the gas company concerning the natural gas odor near the Y intersection. They informed her they were aware of the issue and would be correcting the leak.

Council members discussed meeting with the paving company the following week to review the quote for paving of the alley next to Sutton Elementary. Council will make a decision concerning the paving at the next meeting in order to try to get the alley paving down before

August Habitat Chores

It is August! 7 weeks until bow season opens and I feel like I am running behind with my hunting preparations. Hopefully you have been shooting all summer getting ready with your equipment tuned up, but what remains in habitat preparations for August and in preparation for bow season.

In the July Habitat Chore article, we discussed on the need for late summer nutrition for your deer herd and other wildlife. Plants which have finished growing are losing nutritional value and this time of year can be one of the most stressful for your deer herd. Everyone looks around and sees mountains of green, but most of the understory has stopped growing and therefore lost its value as food.

In the deer's world, August is a tough month. Hot conditions, flies and gnats swarming the deer and low food quality on the landscape. The bucks are in

prime antler growth season and does are still lactating to feed their fawns. Fawns are learning the way of the whitetail and eating a lot of stuff – good and bad. Nutrition is critical to a healthy deer herd going into the fall and winter.

August chores can be difficult given the temperatures. However, if you can brave the temps, it is a good time to continue your **invasive species treatments**. It is also important to keep your mineral sites filled, start **fall food plots** or prepare the area, and start tracking your whitetail from the **trail camera photos**.

Invasive species is still a concern for almost everyone these days doing habitat work. In August, Japanese Stilt Grass begins to seed out and Japanese Knotweed is seeding out now. If you have been following my articles, you know stilt grass is my biggest challenge. To eliminate the seed-

ing process, I spray the existing plants with herbicide in mid-August. This takes some work and numerous trips with the backpack sprayer, but I use it as a workout for my fall hunting endeavors. Autumn Olive, Bush Honeysuckle, Japanese Barberry, respond well to foliar treatments or basal treatments this time of the year. Cut stump treatments can be effective this time of the year but check with your county extension office to verify the best method to use and with the price of

herbicide, save you some time and money.

If you are running a **rotational food plot program**, this is the month to prep for your fall hunting plots. I left two areas in cereal rye to seed out for the turkeys, squirrel, and doves. The wildlife is about done with those plots so it is time to move on to my next planting. I use a no-till planting method so I will roll down the remaining cereal rye after seeding in my early fall mix of turnips and radishes. If I see weed competition, I will use glyphosate in a light dose to add to the thatch layer for my fall seeds.

Finally, with bucks' racks in full velvet, start running your **camera surveys** to see what bucks are on the landscape for the fall seasons. Keeping a couple of the bucks from dispersing with quality habitat is a focus of mine so I stay tuned into their needs on an annual basis.

Make these chores a family endeavor and get your kids out to help you on the projects. Help them identify trees, flowers, plants, and while your out there, see what birds are using your property. You may be assisting vulnerable species such as the **Golden Winged Warbler** or the **Cerulean Warbler** and not even know it!

Of course, everyone likes the idea of a tax cut, but this 10% is a token. I heard a news report that outlined what the cut would mean to various taxpayers depending on their income. The bottom line is that only the rich really see any substantial savings.

The last report that I heard was that the issue is dead, but the Senate may produce their own version... West Virginia politics at its best.

The abortion issue is a whole, much bigger, can of worms. Obviously, there will be lots of people unhappy regardless of what is or isn't done. I'm not encouraging your opinion, nor do I want to debate the issue. I defend your right to disagree with my opinion, but it's still my opinion. So, here are a few things that I think... I believe in women's rights. They should definitely have a voice at this table but obviously those making the decision don't feel that way. I do not believe that abortion should be allowed to be a from of birth control. Either way, there has to be limitations and restrictions.

I could probably live with most of the proposals that have been brought forth in this special session, eventhough they are not ideal in my way of thinking. The exception is the way they have treated rape and incest. I think it is a crime to force a child to have a child. How many lives have to be ruined or lost in these types of situations? Once again, politics is the driving factor. Elected officials are too concerned with supporting their party's platforms... to the letter. Common sense doesn't fit in their equations. 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News from our Capitol

To begin this week, we need to keep our neighbors in eastern Kentucky in our prayers and be willing to step up with donations and, if possible, boots on the ground. As I write this Sunday night, the rains are still falling, even after record rainfall and flooding has occurred. Already the death and destruction are beyond comprehension, and the waters have yet to recede. When our State experienced a similar event in 2016, rebuilding is still ongoing. Eastern Kentucky will need help for months and years to come, just like we did, to recover and rebuild.

In twenty-six years in the Legislature and having served during the terms of five governors, one long standing axiom has proven to be good advice, time and time again. If you are calling a special session of the Legislature, you need to have some consensus on (a) the agenda and (b) consensus on any bills placed on the special call.

Otherwise, it often becomes unproductive and not the best use of time and taxpayer dollars.

That unwritten bit of guidance was never more relevant than it was last week, when a special session to address one single issue – a slight reduction in state income tax rates – morphed into a six-day debacle that included a bill to clarify abortion law in West Virginia. It ended in the late-night last Friday with no bills sent to the Governor, including his tax reduction bill. The only agreement was a resolution passed by both bodies that adjourned until the legislative leadership determines a date to reconvene.

While the Governor did have a plan on taxes, it was apparently not vetted, or consensus reached beforehand with both houses. His bill (HB 301) was first taken up in the House of Delegates and was passed and communicated to the Senate. Whereupon the Senate opted not to consider the bill, eventually only passing a non-binding resolution in

support of some future tax reduction. Thus, the bill that was the purpose of calling the Legislature into session during July interim meetings was dead.

Meanwhile, late Monday, the Governor amended his original call to include taking up the abortion issue. However, he did not propose a bill, leaving it up to the House and Senate to individually come up with a plan with no advance notice. In hurried fashion, the House Health & Human Resources Committee originated a bill (HB 302) and advanced it to the Judiciary Committee. It passed Judiciary; a public hearing was held on Wednesday and eventually passed the House by a vote of 69-23. The bill was amended in the Senate and passed late last Friday evening, sending it back to the House, which refused to accept the Senate version, predominately over physician liability.

As a result, both the House and Senate adjourned, subject to the "call of the chair". At some point, we will reconvene, a conference committee will be appointed to attempt to work out the differences in the bills, but there is no guarantee that will occur in a timely manner. Eventually, a bill will pass, but it is not clear at this point what a final version will contain.

Some bills are simple and require minimal debate. Others are more complex and must be researched beforehand to obtain consensus in a timely manner. Still others are both complex and emotionally charged, such as HB 302. These bills are better suited for the regular session, where concerns can be vetted beforehand, all sides can make their case in multiple committees, and members can make informed decisions on amendments, based on the information attained from research, debate, and the principles of each member.

There is no doubt in my mind that a bill will eventually end up on the Governor's desk for his action, whether it's sooner or later. But what happened last week was akin to someone deciding to build a house. Then, with no advance notice or planning they decided to build a high-rise building. They had no specific plan or blueprints; no list of materials; no preliminary preparations. Despite the lack of planning, one hundred thirty-four builders were called in without advance notice to the worksite with no coordination beforehand. Not a productive way to proceed on an important project.

Needless to say, the

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the problem as being deficient backup batteries that power vital equipment during outages. Company officials stated that each person who spoke would be personally contacted with information pertaining to their situation as a follow-up.

Commission President Lisa Godwin summed up the meeting saying it was productive. "I believe Frontier and the PSC have a better understanding of what the problems in our area are. They have stated that corrective action will be taken. Overall, I think the meeting was very productive."

The Commission will summarize the oral testimony given at Thursday's meeting and reduce it to written form along with approximately two dozen complaints that came to the Commission office by phone and forward the documents to both agencies this week.

Recorder Petolicchio brought up the issue with HVAC on the second floor of the town building freezing up and requested bringing in someone to inspect the system.

Council tabled the discussion on the ordinance updates on a motion by Laurel Petolicchio and a second by Catherine Hoover until other members could be present.

Council went into executive session at 6:54 pm to discuss possible hiring of another officer and reconvened at 7:16 pm with no decisions made.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:16 pm. The next regular meeting will be August 11 at 6:00 pm.

Antique Corn Sheller

We were watching Modern Marvels on big screen TV and saw an antique corn sheller this past week.

My husband said he had shelled a lot of corn on one of those. When he was growing up, that was one of his jobs. He used it to shell field corn that was grown on their farm for the livestock. I asked him if he liked that job and he said he didn't mind doing it. It was just another job. It had a crank on one side of it and a heavy fly wheel on the other side. That crank turned the fly wheel. The fly wheel turned the shelling mechanism on the inside. You dropped an ear of corn in the top of it and the cob came out on the side. The corn came out in a bucket or whatever you had to catch it in on the bottom. He said the biggest job was trying to keep chickens out of the corn crib when he was trying to shell corn. I

asked him where that antique came from and he said it was there as far back as he could remember. He doesn't know who it had originally belonged to. The first people to live on the farm were Alexander and Eliza Stump Shock. We heard that they built the Shock cabin in 1838. There were many others who lived there through the years.

I was fascinated by all the antiques that were there and still in use, when I married him. The old time Victrola that you had to crank up to hear the records was amusing. When it started winding down and needed cranked up again, it sounded like the singers were dying. We all got a laugh out of that. I wish I had a picture of the corn sheller but I don't. We just saw it on TV. It was a show of how equipment has been improved through

the years.

Dad had to shell his field corn by hand. He grew white corn for meal and took it to a grist mill up at Normantown. Audey Turner had one and Audey took what they called a toll of the meal for his pay. Some folks took a half gallon jar and filled it up out of your meal and that was their pay. They didn't have to buy cornmeal if they ground for several people. So, we had our own cornmeal for cornbread. It sure was good. People used the yellow corn to feed their livestock and made their own cornmeal out of the white corn. Funny how things change. We prefer the yellow cornmeal for our cornbread. There is still more white in the grocery stores than yellow. I will close for this time.

World War I Vet Grave Found



West Virginia school clothing allowance application period extended

Due to a statewide system outage affecting multiple state agencies and services, the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources' (DHHR) Bureau for Family Assistance has extended the deadline for accepting School Clothing Allowance applications for eligible children enrolled in West Virginia schools.

Families may apply online at www.wv-path.org. Applications through WV PATH must be received by 5:00 p.m., on August 12, 2022. A paper application may be requested by contacting a local DHHR office or by calling 1-877-716-1212. Paper applications must be postmarked by August 12, 2022 to qualify.

Each eligible child will receive a \$200 benefit that may be used toward the purchase of school clothing or piece goods for families who sew clothing for their children.

The following groups will automatically receive School Clothing

Allowance benefits for each school-age child in the home by the end of June:

Families with school-age children who currently receive WV WORKS cash assistance Parents or guardians of children in foster care Children ages 4-18 who receive Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits, are enrolled in school and whose household income is under 130% of the Federal Poverty Level

Families who received School Clothing Allowance in 2021 and currently have Medicaid coverage should have received a School Clothing Allowance application by U.S. Mail in late June.

Others may be eligible for School Clothing Allowance benefits based on the monthly income limits by household size as listed below. Verification of income for July must be submitted with the application.

School Clothing Allowance recipients will receive an Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) card in place of the traditional paper voucher. This system change was implemented in 2021 to allow for both online transactions and increased choice of vendors when purchasing school clothing or piece goods. The EBT card will operate like a debit card and can be used at any retailer who accepts EBT cash transactions. If the merchant does not accept EBT cash transactions, the benefit can be withdrawn as cash at a QUEST ATM to complete the purchase. Parents or guardians of children in foster care will receive the School Clothing Allowance benefit as a check.

WV Sales Tax Holiday August 5-8

When is West Virginia's Sales Tax Holiday?

If you're needing to buy back-to-school supplies or just want to stock up on some clothes or electronics, you might want to put it off just a little longer until West Virginia's tax-free weekend.

According to the West Virginia State Tax Department, the Sales Tax Holiday in 2022 will begin at midnight on Friday, Aug. 5, and continue until 11:59 p.m. on Monday, Aug. 8. West Virginia's sales tax is 6%, so while you won't be saving a huge amount on the dollar, you can expect to save \$30 on \$500 worth of purchases.

Items that are tax exempt during the weekend include:

- Clothing items (\$125 or less per item)
- School supplies (\$50 or less per item)
- School instructions material (\$20 or less per item)

- Laptop and tablet computers (\$500 or less per item)
- Sports equipment (\$150 or less per item)

While there is no limit on the total amount of tax-exempt purchases during the weekend, the West Virginia State Tax Department compiled a list of items that are not included, so you don't have a realization in the checkout line.

No items purchased for use in trade or business are tax-exempt on the holiday.

Clothing items that will not be tax-exempt include:

- Clothing accessories (Such as bags and hair accessories)
- Protective equipment (Such as breathing masks, ear and hearing protectors, face shields, hard hats, helmets, paint or dust respirators, protective gloves, safety glasses and goggles, safety belts, tool belts and welder's gloves)

and masks)

- Sewing equipment and supplies
- Sports or recreational equipment (Such as sport-specific shoes, goggles, etc.)
- Belt buckles sold separately
- Costume masks sold separately
- Patches and emblems sold separately

Some unconventional items such as wedding apparel and diapers are also included in the tax exemption, but keep in mind that tax will be applied to items that cost more than \$125. Tax-free purchases can also be made online during the weekend. See the West Virginia State Tax Department website for more information about online purchases or for answers to other FAQs.

You can also do your back-to-school shopping in neighboring states during their Sales Tax Holidays, although the requirements are different from West Virginia.



Raptors Visit Holly River State Park

Wendy Perrone, Executive Director, and Ron Perrone, Education Director of the Three Rivers Avian Center brought their Wings of Wonder: WV Birds of Prey program to a well attended event at Holly River State Park. The free program, which travels to many different State Park venues, aims to familiarize

the audience with West Virginia raptors, namely owls, hawks, falcons, and eagles. By the end of the presentation, we learned about the habitat, diet, and behavior of each bird presented, common causes of injuries to each species, and the laws protecting these unique birds. The visiting birds are non-releasable into the wild due to varying

degrees of injuries. The Three Rivers Avian Center provides emergency care, surgery, hospitalization, and physical therapy treatments for over 110 species of non-game and endangered wild birds. A State-wide network of veterinarians, volunteers, and on-site staff provide care of the birds. The Raptor Ambassadors, as the birds are called, hope to instill an appreciation of the wild birds' priceless and crucial contribution to our ecosystem as well as educating the public on how to help wild birds.

In addition to Environmental Education and Veterinary and Rehabilitative care, TRAC also provides data for research and conservation projects focused on native bird populations and avian habitats, including location found, blood samples, feather and tissue samples, cause of injury or illness, and observed physical and behavioral details. Since their founding in 1990,

the TRAC has treated more than 5,500 patients representing over 110 native wild bird species through 2021. Bear in mind, that, according to a study by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, the population of all birds has gone down by more than three billion birds since 1970, and forty percent of all songbirds have disappeared within the same time span! how can you help?



A preliminary permit does not authorize the permit holder to perform any land-disturbing activities or otherwise enter upon lands or waters owned by others without the owners' express permission. The proposed Sutton Dam Hydroelectric Project would consist of the following: (1) a new 40-foot-wide, 60-foot-long powerhouse to be located downstream of the Corps dam along the southern bank; (2) a new multiple-port intake structure against the upstream face of the dam; (3) a new 12-foot-diameter, approximately 300-foot-long steel penstock; (4) two turbine-generator units with a total generating capacity of 6 megawatts; (5) a new 100-foot-wide by 300-foot-long tailrace; (6) a new substation with a step-up transformer; (7) a new 550-foot-long, 12-kilovolt transmission line; and (8) appurtenant facilities. The proposed project would have an estimated annual generation of 24,000 megawatt-hours.



Vouchers will be good for 30 days. BCAS reserves the right to deny financial assistance for any reason.

These free spay surgeries must be scheduled by the voucher recipient at Central WV Animal Hospital.

Just One Generation cat rescue was started in 2013 in response to the severe feline overpopulation in this area. Our initial emphasis was on the Trap, Neuter, and Release (TNR) of feral cats as well as to facilitate the spay/neuter of domestic cats.

Adoption of ownerless cats and kittens came later, as was incorporated with the program because there was no place else for these animals to go. But, due to previously made travel plans and family commitments, Sally Stewart, program director of Just One Generation, will NOT be available to take in new animals or to adopt cats and kittens until after Labor Day.


THIS WEEK IN WEST VIRGINIA HISTORY

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

Aug. 3, 1897: Fire destroyed much of downtown Lewisburg. The town rebuilt and evolved in the next century into the hub of one of the state's major farming areas and a center for education and the arts.



Aug. 3, 1907: Harley Orrin Staggers Sr. was born in Keyser. Staggers served in the U.S. House of Representatives for 32 years.



Aug. 4, 1824: John Jay Jackson Jr. was born near Parkersburg. Jackson was a prominent judge who became notorious among those trying to organize labor unions in West Virginia. He blocked an effort by Mother Jones and United Mine Workers leaders to organize the miners of northern West Virginia.

Aug. 4, 1897: Musician William Jennings "Billy" Cox was born near Charleston. Cox, known as the "Dixie Songbird," ranked as



one of West Virginia's premier country music vocalists and songwriters during the 1930s.



Aug. 5, 1958: Jennings Randolph defeated former governor William Marland in the Democratic primary for U.S. Senate. Randolph went on to become the senior senator from West Virginia.



Aug. 6, 1864: Delayed three times by the Civil War, Sisters of the Visitation of Holy Mary finally arrived in Parkersburg, where they later founded DeSales Heights boarding school for young women.

Aug. 7, 1864: In what became known as the Battle of Moorefield, Union troops under Gen. William W. Averell attacked the headquarters of Gen. Bradley Johnson. The Confederates were routed and

fled south into the town; the Union captured 500 men and 400 horses.

Aug. 7, 1877: West Virginia voters chose Charleston as the state capital over Clarksburg and Martinsburg.



Aug. 8, 1915: Businessman Alex Schoenbaum was born in Richmond, Va. After settling in Charleston in 1943, he went into the restaurant business. His restaurants were named Shoney's when Schoenbaum's nickname was selected in an employee contest.

Aug. 9, 1916: A storm front from the northwest dumped nearly six inches of rain in less than five hours on the headwaters of Cabin Creek in eastern Kanawha County. 71 people died and 900 homes were destroyed in the flood.






