After returning from the third special session of the Legislature and July interim meetings, early last week I tested positive for COVID. As for the Governor's third extraordinary session, we have heard no news as to when we will return to Charleston to continue work. There are no scheduled interim meetings for August, but the session ended by the House and Senate leadership adjourning until recalled by the presiding officers of each legislative body. Technically, either the House or Senate could opt to return to the Capitol independent of the other legislative house to continue work. Still, unless leadership is working under the radar to forge an agreement, it's anyone's guess when the session will resume.

The Senate effectively shelved any action on the Governor's tax plan, but that could change. Speculation is the Senate may be delaying until after the general election to see the outcome of the
