## Legislative Update

I enjoy celebrating the birthdays of others, but growing up, my parents always kept birthdays in the immediate family a low-key event. That changed for me when I married Jean. She grew up with birthdays being a celebration and always has made my birthday, those of our kids and grandkids, and our family a special time. She's also great at sending cards and greetings to extended family, neighbors, and friends throughout central West Virginia.

Last Wednesday, my dad celebrated his ninetysecond birthday and Jean did a great job in making it special for him throughout the week, since family was unable to get together mid-week. And, as our family has a reunion in late August annually, both dad and mom were able to enjoy several special days, an hour or two at a time. These days, they tire easily and don't venture out for very long. When I watch my grandkids

walking beside them, my mind quickly drifts back to seeing them as I did in my youth. But despite all the ongoing challenges they face, I never cease to give thanks for still having both my parents

I also want to thank everyone that made time to wish Dad a happy birthday through my social media account. Dad isn't on Facebook, but he was humbled and amazed that hundreds of messages of well-wishes were sent his

Now that school is officially underway throughout the State and we have our first week of high school football in the books, everyone is hopeful for a year that isn't interrupted by COVID. Students and our communities need an uninterrupted school year but make no mistake – we're not out of the woods yet with COVID and the evolving variants.

Meanwhile, school security is on everyone's mind after the tragic events that have plagued

our nation in recent years; most recently the unspeakable tragedy in a Texas elementary school a few months ago. I've written and spoken about school safety on several occasions. I am concerned that excluded from the many conversations and plans that Governor Justice has for surplus revenue, he fails to put forth a comprehensive plan for securing our schools. Not just some schools and not just superficial upgrades, but a tight, secure, and meaningful security plan that is tailored to each school. This would also include safeguards from emergency exits being left propped open, broken, or

inadequately secured. A few interim meetings ago, then School Building Authority Executive Director, David Roach, met with both the Finance and Education Committees to discuss the need to fully secure our schools from the threats of today and tomorrow. I'm sure all the communities that have experienced mass casualty events never dreamed their school would be one that was affected. Our citizens now realize that we can ill afford to assume it cannot happen in West Virginia or anywhere else. Preliminary estimates indicate that it will cost in the neighborhood of \$500,000 per school. Some may not require that much expense, but in some, the cost may run into the millions of dollars. And, with hundreds of schools in our State, you can do some quick math to know this will not be an inexpensive initiative.

During the legislative session, many of us felt that this is of such importance to protect our students, staff, and teachers that a portion of the budget surplus should be set aside to begin the plan-




Aug. 31, 1945: The USS West Virginia led American battleships into Tokyo Bay two days before the formal surrender of Japan on September 2, 1945.







We quickly and cause a significant number of deaths and have an impact on at least a million people. Scientists of atmospheric research all over the world are trying to figure out if and how weather whiplash is related to global warming.

extreme heat waves and drought in Europe, in China, the Horn of Africa, fire storms in CA, floods in Kentucky and Texas, I am sometimes wondering if we have reached the tipping point that we have heard so much about or if these weather events are just a freak occurrence this year? We have had weather whiplash in our state in the past, but this year we have been spared for what ever reason and we are very thankful for it. The high temperatures this summer were all within the expected range. According to the national weather service we had 14" more rain than average since January first this year. We never had to water our garden, everything grew well. The pastures stayed green all summer long and regrew quickly when we rotated the animals. We never harvested as many wild mushrooms as this year and they keep on popping up in places. One drawback of the wet conditions

preserve them by drying nd canning. When we dry them, I apply some olive oil on the trays where we dry them. I slice the tomatoes into quarter inch wedges, carefully place them evenly on the tray, never over-lapping them, then put the trays on the When I read about the drier. It usually takes 2 days for them to shrivel up and dry. We use dried tomatoes in many different ways. We break them into small pieces and add them to salads. If we use canned tomatoes, we add some dried ones to intensify the flavor. They can be used to make a delicious dip by reconstituting (softening) them in some hot water. I never use a recipe, I just taste what I concoct and add a little more of this or that. Once the tomatoes are soft, I put them in a food processor, add a handful or more of black olives, 5 cloves of garlic, a tiny bit of salt and a good amount of pepper. I you like it hot, addsome hot pepper. My recipe free style of cooking does not work for baking goods, that's where Greg's exact measuring of all ingredients pays off in a perfect end result.

Follow the directions of your canner. I use a pressure canner and I set it at 10 pounds for 10 minutes, setting the timer when the weight starts jiggling. Never add any herbs or other vegetables which would require a much longer canning time, like for low acid foods. The tomatoes can be

used in a pizza, on spaghetti, as a soup, on top of a meat loaf, in lasagna and probably more recipes. For pizzas I drain the liquid before placing the tomatoes on the prebaked crust, then add broccoli florets, red peppers, onions, garlic, and Gruyere cheese to make it especially tasty, but if you prefer mozzarella, that's Gruyere just gives it

Put it in a place where you can observe it. This is a fermentation process that kills seed and soil born diseases present in the gel. On the third day pour off carefully the extra water in the pint jar. Don't worry about losing the seeds that float on top, they are nonviable. It's the ones on the bottom that you want to save. Rinse the remaining seeds a few times, then pour them on a paper towel to dry. Make sure you identify them by writing their name with a magic marker on the towel. Once they are dry, put

them in an envelope or plastic bag and keep them in the freezer. They keep for at least 6 years. Another method is to simply put the scraped-out seeds on a paper towel to let them dry, skipping the fermenting process. I read that these seeds don't keep as long, but I really don't know. Make sure when you save seeds that they come from an open-pollinated plant. Of course, you can use a hybrid, but you don't know what you will get as next year's crop. Talking about toma-
