

Back to my present thoughts - what do I need to do to prepare my habitat for next spring. What chores or plans do I need to complete prior to next springs green up. In the way of assessing my habitat work this year, did my invasive treatment strategies work? Did my food plots produce and how did they work for the wildlife. Are my native areas around my house providing cover and food for the local wildlife?

In this two-part series we will look at assessing our progress and plans for next spring. Ok, I will admit that I am a total geek in terms of tracking this stuff and probably am way over the top on what is needed. Since I am a career military man, I tend to use my experiences in my consulting, planning/execution and in my assessments. But here we go on how I go about assessing my wins and loses this year to date.

Goal 1 – Create a diverse habitat where all species can utilize throughout their life cycle by providing cover and nutrition on the landscape year around.

Goal 2 – Increase the wildlife carrying capacity of my property by restoring a successional forest on 40+ acres of woodland. Goal 3 – Increase the whitetail buck age structure and retain mature (3.5 years and older) on *Please turn to* **EVERY ACRE** page 3







This Week in West Virginia History


The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www. wvencvclopedia.org.

Sept. 7, 1808: Peter Godwin Van Winkle was born in New York City. Van Winkle was elected as one of the first two U.S. senators from the new state of West Virginia.



Sept. 7, 1848: Christopher Harrison Payne was born in Monroe County. In 1896, Payne became the state's first black legislator when he was elected to the House of Delegates from Fayette County.

Sept. 7, 1937: Photographer Arnout "Sonny" Hyde Jr. was born in Bluefield. His images of nature and people have appeared in magazines, books, and calendars throughout the U.S. and Europe.



Sept. 8, 1862: Raiders led by Confederate Gen. Albert G. Jenkins, a Cabell County native, rode into Barboursville. They skirmished with the enemy, then rode into Wayne, Logan, and Raleigh counties.



Sept. 9, 1839: Anderson "Devil Anse" Hatfield was born in Mingo County. He was the patriarch of the Hatfield family and their leader during the Hatfield-McCoy feud.

Sept. 10, 1782: Frontier heroine Betty Zane is credited with saving Fort Henry in Wheeling during an attack by the British and Indians. According to one account, Zane sprinted across a field to retrieve gunpowder from the Zane family cabin.

Battle of Carnifex Ferry took place on the Gauley River. Union General William Rosecrans sent in brigades one at a time as they arrived at the ney "J. R." Clifford was battlefield, allowing the outnumbered Confederates to repulse the piecemeal attacks. During the night, the Confederates decided to retreat before they could be defeated in Court of Appeals. He was the morning.

Sept. 12, 1872: The Era. Great Bend Tunnel was completed. The tunnel, also known as Big Bend

Sept. 13, 1844: Milton Humphreys was born in Greenbrier County. During the Civil War, he enlisted in the Confederate service as a sergeant. At the battle of Fayetteville, Humphreys fired his cannon at Union artillery from behind Sept. 10, 1861: The an intervening forest. This demonstration set a precedent for modern warfare by the use of indirect fire.


