

BCHS Coach Sterling Beane to receive National Wrestling Hall of Fame honors

Sterling Beane first became involved in wrestling at the urging of his Glenville State College roommates to whom he refers as “the Mills brothers.” The brothers were among those trying to start a wrestling team at GSC. He recently described how that went. “One evening they came into the room and asked me if I’d like to be on the wrestling team. ‘We need a heavyweight,’

they told me. I’d never wrestled, but they were persuasive so I decided I’d try it,” he said. Nearly sixty years later, Coach Beane, who last season coached his 50th BCHS wrestling team, will be honored by the National Wrestling Hall of Fame, West Virginia Chapter. He and five other dedicated men will be honored at the “Hall of Fame” banquet and ceremony.

The purpose of this banquet, scheduled for 1

p.m. at Embassy Suites, “These individuals have g i v e n countless hours of their time instilling in y o u n g people the s k i l l s needed to succeed in all areas of life. They will be permanently recognized at the National Wrestling Hall of Fame and Mu-



seum in Stillwater, Oklahoma.” In addition to Beane, those being honored at the banquet include Mark Deligatti, Bobby Pruett, Arden Sansom, Pat Sole, and William Whittington.

Beane’s career as a high-school wrestling coach began in 1972-73 when he asked the BCHS athletic director, Roy J. Brosius, if he could start a wrestling team at the high school. “He told me he’d buy uniforms for a team if I

could earn money for a wrestling mat. I did and we began the wrestling program at the high school which will soon be in its 51st year,” Beane said.

His accomplishments as a coach number many. These include 14 regional championships and seven runner-up finishes. His teams have finished in the top 10 in state tournaments 17 times and in 2020,

I love social media. They keep me in touch with dozens of friends, whom I might otherwise have contact with just every few years, or every few decades.

They let me share articles that I think bring greater understanding of a subject, usually with a comment of my own, and enjoy similar sharing by others.

They let me share my own writing, reaching a wider audience than I did when I worked for newspapers, and be part of national, even international, conversations.

I hate social media. They have become the default sources of information for most Americans, and major sources of misinformation – even disinformation – that polarizes the country and drives us into media echo chambers.

They have added to the confusion between fact and opinion, and to our natural desire for information that confirms what we believe, rather than information that may challenge those beliefs.

They have led Americans to spend more time online in virtual communities instead of the geographic communities where we live, pay taxes and elect local leaders.

My love-hate relationship with social media stems mainly from the fact that I am a journalist who believes that freedom of information is essential to our democratic republic, and who has done most of my journalism for newspapers – which are the main fact-finders in our society.

Newspapers are finding it more difficult to perform that essential function, mainly because much of their audience and more of their advertisers now prefer social media.

Newspapers have as many readers as they ever did, but the audience is mainly online, and reached through social-media posts that bring them no income. There’s a bill in Congress to address that, called the Journalism Preservation Act, but what news media also

need is more citizens who appreciate and support their work.

Newspapers are not only the main fact-finders for citizens; they are institutions that speak truth to power and hold it accountable. That’s why our founders put the First Amendment into the Constitution, to guarantee freedom of speech, press, petition, assembly and religion.

Freedom of the press demands certain responsibilities of those who exercise it. Too many citizens don’t realize that journalists have a set of generally agreed-upon ethics, and that journalism is a collective enterprise, with editors and other colleagues who help each other deliver a fair report.

My favorite description of how journalism is supposed to be practiced is in *The Elements of Journalism*, a book by Bill Kovach and Tom Rosenstiel. They list 10 elements; here are the first five, which are the most fundamental:

Journalism’s first obligation is to the truth.

Its first loyalty is to citizens.

Its essence is a discipline of verification.

Its practitioners must maintain an independence from those they cover.

It must serve as an independent monitor of power.

The element I quote most often these days is No. 3, about the discipline of verification. It means that we tell readers how we know something, or we attribute it to someone.

Social media have no discipline and no verification.

And they’re mainly about opinion, not facts.

Journalism, especially in newspapers, is mainly about facts, not opinion.

Opinions are the heartbeat of a democracy, but they should be based on facts. And for the facts, we need newspapers.

National CIS team will visit Sutton Elementary School SES exemplary of program model

A highly successful Communities in Schools program at Sutton Elementary School has gained the attention of the national organization. As a result, the national certification team of Communities in Schools will visit Sutton Elementary School in November. Cynthia Sorsaia, Coordinator of Office of Student Support and Well Being at the WV Department of Education, explained that the CIS program at Sutton Elementary was chosen “for their fidelity to the CIS model and for being ‘all in’ for the kids.”

CIS is a national program that works in over 2,900 schools across 26 states. WV

First Lady Cathy Justice was instrumental in bringing this non-profit education initiative to West Virginia.

The CIS mission is “to surround students with a community of support, empowering them to stay in school and achieve in life,” Susan Schiefer, Sutton Elementary’s Site Coordinator, explained. Schiefer continued to say that Braxton County “is fortunate to have site coordinators in every school.” Kimberly Dennison, the county’s Director of Elementary Education, acts as CIS liaison in the county. Braxton County was the first in the state to have site coordinators at all schools.

CIS teams work with community orga-

nizations and local businesses to provide needed supports for students and families, according to Schiefer. The CIS program at Sutton Elementary “provides weekend snack bags for students, Christmas gifts, clothing and hygiene items, incentive for student growth and more,” Schiefer noted. “Each of the site coordinators does unique things,” she added.

The four focus areas of the program are attendance, social and emotional support, academics, and behavior. At Sutton Elementary, Schiefer works with all students in Tier I (whole group) activities in attendance and academics. Among the activities she oversees are homeroom atten-

dance contests, 30 for 30 attendance challenges, Book Club with second grade, Shine Bright with iReady, assisting with the principal’s multiplication project, and more. Case-managed students receive Tier II and Tier III (small group and individual) services as they work in their goal areas.

“I’m grateful to have Mrs. Schiefer as our CIS coordinator at SES. She goes above and beyond to provide a variety of supports necessary for students and staff members to be successful,” Principal Flora Cox commented.

Regarding the recognition the SES Communities in Education has received, Schiefer said, “This is a huge honor, and I look forward to sharing our success with the national team.”

BCHS football field becomes venue for unique dog show

Last Tuesday afternoon, 27 dogs and their handlers paraded onto the high school football field for a dog show modeled somewhat on the American Kennel Club’s shows. The culmination of a project in instructor Josh Porto’s Companion Animals Class and instructor Jami Heavner’s Exceptional Eagles class, the show was declared a success by all who participated.

Allison Westfall, who shows her dog throughout much of the United States, judged the dogs, choosing a winner from each group and a Best of Show winner. Westfall commented that the results of the students’ work “showed a lot of time and effort put into their projects.” She added, “It was exciting for me to hear what they’d learned about their chosen breeds. What impressed me most was the spirit of the dog show. Most of the students were excited to participate. This was definitely a worthwhile project.”

“They really enjoyed it,” Hefner, teacher of the Exceptional Eagles, said of her students. These students, who

worked as a group, created a Commadore, a Maltese, and a bull terrier. “They were excited about putting the dogs together, especially the Commadore because they used mop heads for the fur. Those who like sensory learning really liked that,” she said. Heavner ended by saying that this was a good project for her students

because they not only enjoyed it but they also learned about public speaking skills.

Instructor Porto explained the procedures the students followed to create their dogs. After he introduced the unit on dogs, he gave the assignment. Students were divided into groups according to breed standards. Then they each

chose a particular breed from their group. That was followed by intense research so students could learn about their dogs.

Once the research was complete, each student was to find a picture of the chosen dog and trace the shape of the dog onto wood which their teacher provided. Next came cutting out the shape and “creating” a dog. Their instructor provided the wood and paint in primary colors (some secondary colors). The rest was up to the students, and many became highly creative.

For the actual show, Porto was the announcer. He called students and dogs onto the field by groups to be judged. Westfall, the judge, not only evaluated the appearance of the animals; she also spoke with handlers to evaluate what they knew about their dogs.

Some of the winners in different group expressed their views on their work and the results. Several also had

Predator Series... Coyotes - Part 2 of 2

Every Acre Counts – Predator Series – Raccoons & Opossums

In the last couple of articles, we focused on Coyotes and the effect they have on your property. Again, understanding your property goals is important when determining whether to remove Coyotes or not as they may be beneficial in keeping other smaller predators in check. Two such predators who are both opportunists are the Raccoon and the Opossum and they are living on or around your property.

Now I am not going to tell you that raccoons and opossums are reducing your deer herd, they are likely just cleaning up after the deer has died from any number of reasons. However, they can have an affect of other species you may be trying to support on your property like Ruffed Grouse, Woodcock, any number of songbirds, or Turkey. Let's look at these two predators and see what we can learn about them.

Raccoon (*Procyon lotor*)

The word "raccoon" is derived from Native American words "arakum" or "aracoun," meaning "he scratches with his hands."

If you have seen raccoons eating trash, dead animals or chowing down in your bird feeder, you understand they are omnivores. They have one litter once a year and give birth to 2-5 young. Making their home in old trees, attics, old barns and other up and out of the way areas, shows their adaptability.

Opossums (*Didelphis virginiana*)

Opossums are marsupials which, like kangaroos, have pouches and carry their young with them. Like the raccoon, opossums are omnivores, but prefer insects, carrion and fruit. Making their homes in old trees, attics and other holes, opossums are opportunity feeders and cleaning out a nest of eggs is right up their alley. With the ability to have two litters per year, they can reproduce quickly. Each female can have a litter of 7-10 young which could put as many as 20 new opossums on your property in a 12-month span – each new opossum searching for a new home and nutrition.

Good Ole Days of Coon Hunting

Based on data the

numbers of raccoons, opossums, and skunks present make today the "good ole days". Recent assessments show nearly a 4-fold increase in the number of these animals. Why are they increasing while other species are decreasing? This is the million-dollar question – but biologists are pointing to the fact that mature forests support these predators better than open successional forests. Both in terms of their survival and in terms of their ability to find food.

Mature Forest Wind-fall

The primary predators for these predators are coyotes, bobcats, and man. A raccoon and opossums best escape technique is to climb a tree (I know – or play dead) – mature forests have an abundance of trees so the opportunity to escape a bigger predator is high. Additionally, old snags and hollow trees make for excellent homes for the raccoon and opossum. Again, mature forests are ideal for their survival.

On the other hand, mature forests limit the nesting cover for grouse, turkey, and

other game birds as well as ground nesting songbirds. This provides easy picking for the predators due to the fact that most of the brushy, old treetops ridden area and brush piles are located along the access trails on the property where sunlight is hitting the forest floor. This means the predator can literally walk down the road or trail and find the nests versus having to travel through acres of successional growth where they may or may not stumble on a nest.

The lack of quality habitat is helping these predators and hurting your other species and science is pointing to the loss of quality successional habitat as the very reason we see the massive increase in their population. With some habitat work, you can expand the nesting opportunity areas and spread those locations across the landscape giving the game species an opportunity to survive those nightly patrols.

How to Stop the Invasion

Quality habitat is the key to reducing these

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News from our Capitol

Hurricane Ian and the devastation left in its wake is one that will take years from which to recover and rebuild across the Florida peninsula. Only now are we discovering the extent of the loss of life for those that failed to or were unable to heed warnings to evacuate. Most who died were drowned in the storm surge. I think of flooding as a gradual to a rapid rise in water levels, but the storm surge violently can blow doors and windows inward, trapping victims in place. I'm sure there will be many local churches and groups that will make the trip to Florida to help residents clean up. For those who are unable to physically go to the disaster scene, we can financially support legitimate relief groups and organizations to assist.

This storm also took on special concerns for Jean and me, as our grandson Collin is attending school in Orlando. Also, when it made a

second landfall in South Carolina, Jessica and her family were directly affected, as well as Jean's mom, her brother's family, and many extended family members. Thankfully, all weathered the storm safely.

Last week, I summarized the four constitutional amendments on the ballot this November for voters to decide. They are:

Amendment 1: Impeachment

Amendment 2: Property Tax Modernization

Amendment 3: Incorporation of Churches or Religious Denominations

Amendment 4: State Board of Education Rulemaking

This week, I want to discuss Amendment 2. Already, commercials are flooding the airwaves in favor of Amendment 2 and my concern is what they are not saying in the spots. They are alleging that if Amendment 2 is approved by voters, (1) new jobs will come to West Virginia; (2) existing manufacturing jobs will stay in West Virginia; (3) the vehicle property tax

could be eliminated. Take note of the "could be eliminated". That is not a certainty if it passes. It's only a maybe and it will be up to the next Legislature to decide.

This proposed amendment has been around for years, pushed mostly by the WV Chamber of Commerce and the WV Manufacturers Association. Their goal is to phase out and eliminate the property taxes paid by manufacturers to counties on industrial manufacturing equipment. In previous years, this never gained enough traction to gain approval by the Legislature to have it placed on the ballot as an amendment to the WV Constitution. In those early versions, there was nothing for the average citizen, just a huge fiscal hit on county budgets, mostly in funding for our public schools. No mention of the elimination of the regressive inventory tax on small businesses, until now.

As the legislative balance of power shifted from a majority to a supermajority in 2020, it was apparent that the votes were in the House and Senate to pass the Joint Resolution needed to place the amendment on the upcoming 2022 general election ballot. Meanwhile, an amendment was

offered and passed by the House and Senate to eliminate the personal property tax on vehicles – one selling point for residents.

If the Amendment passes, it will fall in the lap of the next Legislature to determine who gets the breaks and who will be left out. I want to mention a few important questions as you consider your vote.

Passage does not assure that your vehicle property tax vehicles will be eliminated. It could happen if the amendment is approved by voters, but there is no guarantee it will occur.

Little is being mentioned as to what benefit, if any, will be available for our small businesses. If so, what benefit can they expect? Repeal of the inventory tax? I hope so, but no guarantees.

Passage of the amendment takes tax money out of counties – most of which is used to fund our schools, sending it to the state for whatever tax breaks the Legislature decides.

Proponents claim that the Legislature will make county budgets "whole" to make up for the massive revenue loss. What happens when the state revenue surplus dries up when energy prices drop?

the Eagles finished second in the state. In addition, his teams have won 15 conference championships, and he has had 101 state placers with six state champions and 20 runners-up.

Other honors include Conference Coach of the Year, Regional Coach of the Year, and WV Athletic Director's Coach of the Year several times. He was the NFHS Coach of the Year in 2003-04 and received the Kenny Wright Boys Coach of the Year award in 2016-17.

While Sterling Beane is proud of his achievements and the honors he has received during the past 50 years coaching wrestling, he maintains that those honors don't belong to him alone. "The wrestling program has been a family thing," he said. "In addition to Judy and Sterling and Monica, many people have worked hard as volunteers. This has not been a 'one-man show.' It has been the whole community. Any honors I receive also honor the county."

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Will property taxes eventually rise to make up for tax breaks for manufacturers that may not be in the county in which you reside?

These and others are important questions that must be considered by all West Virginia voters. There is more to the amendment than the possible car tax cut, which is a carrot on a stick.

One more point I'd like to make. I know most of those individuals featured in the current pro-Amendment 2 TV commercials. Some are paid lobbyists at the Legislature. The House and Senate majority is in favor of the passage of Amendment 2, with the Senate especially invested in its passage.

I've yet to hear the organized counter ar-

guments to passage go statewide, but I suspect the airwaves will soon be filled with those spots soon. It's not exactly a level playing field, as those groups opposed do not have the deep financial pockets to fund a major statewide media blitz.

As stated previously, the WV Chamber of Commerce and the WV Manufacturers Association are in favor of passage. The WV Association of Counties and the WV County Commissioners Association are opposed. All are good organizations that I've worked with for over a quarter century. However, they each have their own reasons for passage or rejection.

Additionally, Governor Justice is traveling the state in opposition to Amendment 2, as he wants passage of his state income tax reduction plan instead. He's arguing correctly that the State cannot afford both Amendment 2 and his income tax cut. However, the tax plan the Governor has put forth thus far did not gain sufficient traction to even be considered in the State Senate. The income tax cut is currently geared heavily to benefit the wealthiest at the expense of the average working West Virginia family.

Amendment 2 could have a positive impact on small businesses and the average West Virginia taxpayer. Again, that depends on the Legislature. Only the prospect of the possible elimination of personal property tax on personal vehicles is the enticement for most West Virginians that proponents hope will help ensure passage. If passed, Amendment 2 will permanently inject the Legislature into county taxation matters and away from county and municipal governments.

I urge everyone to listen intently and carefully read all ads and pamphlets that will be appearing on the airwaves, in print media, and in your PO box. Likewise, candidates for the Legislature need to be clear in articulat-

ing what their vote and priorities will be when this comes before them in the Senate or the House in 2023. I'll be asking those questions and I hope each of you will, too.

predators. If you limit their nest raiding and feeding opportunities and increase the opportunity for other predators to feed on them before they make it up a tree, then you are making an impact on their numbers. Additionally, trapping and shooting are also options as seasons exist for both sports. By removing food sources around your home, you can also push those predators to better hunting grounds. Some examples of how to limit home food sources -

coon proof your bird feeders, pick up any remaining dog or cat food outside, keep household scrapes in a sealed container along with your trash bags until garbage pick-up.

Quality Successional Growth Creating Cover for Wildlife

A few simple tasks and some quality habitat work will have your raccoons and opossums searching for better (easier) hunting grounds and giving your grouse, turkey, and other small game a fighting chance. Once again quality habitat is a major benefit to all our species and even if you can only manage habitat on one acre - **Every Acre Counts!**

On July 29, 2022, Mountaineer Gas Company (Mountaineer) filed its annual Application for approval of an Infrastructure Replacement and Expansion Program for 2023 (2023 IREP) with revised IREP rates for 2023, pursuant to W. Va. Code § 24-2-1k, which authorizes the Public Service Commission of West Virginia to approve cost recovery of projects to replace, upgrade and expand natural gas utility infrastructure that are deemed to be just and reasonable and in the public interest.

In its Application, Mountaineer forecasts capital investment for calendar year 2023 of \$64.2 million as part of its multi-year plan. The 2023 IREP covers several categories of plant asset replacements and improvements, including mains, service lines, measurement and regulator stations, and house regulators. These plant investments are proposed to be made in Mountaineer service territories throughout the State. These investments are identified in the Application, which is on file and available for public inspection at the Commission's offices at 201 Brooks Street, Charleston, West Virginia and which may be viewed on the Commission's website, www.psc.state.wv.us.

Mountaineer proposes to recover costs associated with these investments through an additional increment within the fixed or volumetric base rate component of its rates, depending on the applicable rate schedule under which service is rendered, to be effective on January 1, 2023. Mountaineer projects that if the program and rate increase are approved as requested, the average monthly bill for its various classes of customers will be changed on January 1, 2023 as follows:

The increases shown above are compared to the rates currently in place and are based on averages of all customers in the indicated class. Each class may receive an increase greater or less than stated here. Individual customers may receive increases that are greater or less than average. Furthermore, the requested rates and charges are only a proposal and are subject to change (increase or decrease) by the Public Service Commission in its review of this filing. Any increase in rates and charges will not become effective until authorized and approved by the Public Service Commission.

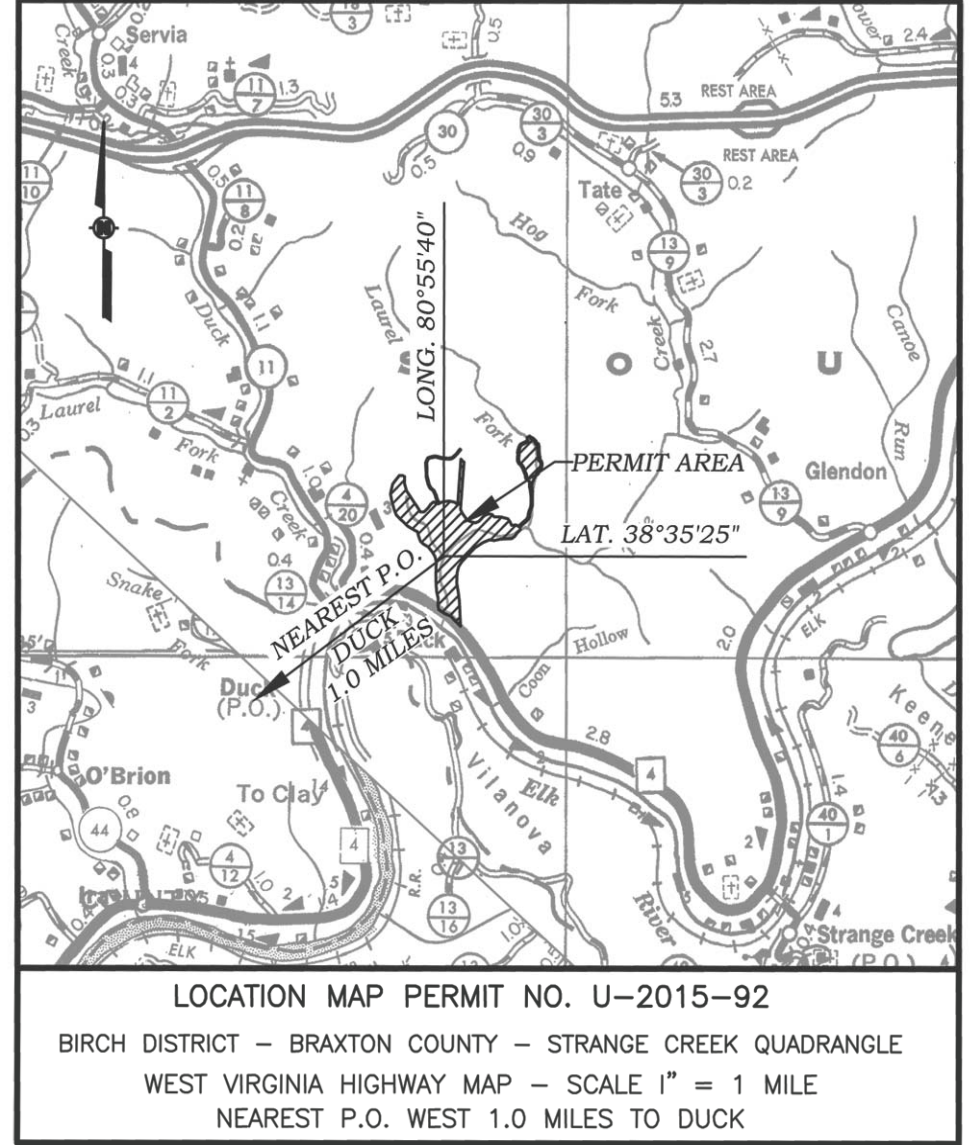

Dylan Johnson-Conservation Special-ist for Elk Conser-vation District was the Guest Speaker for the Braxton County Farm Bureau at their September 19, 2022 meeting. Dylan covers Elk District as well as Capital District pro-moting West Virginia Agricultural Enhance-ment Programs.

He gave us an overview of these pro-grams: Nutrient Man-agement which covers lime and fertilizer; Division/Exclusion Fencing; Urban Ag as well as a few others.

The Elk AgEP Program is always evolving. The pro-gram guidelines and practices offers may change every fiscal year which depend a lot on funding. Soil samples must be col-lected and mailed in prior to signup.

New tests are re-quired annually and labeled according to the field number that



matches your USDA Farm map. If you cur-rently do not have this type of map, feel free to contact the NRCS or FSA office in the Mon Power building, near Gassaway.

AgE's mission is to assist the agricultur-al cooperators of WV Conservation Districts with the voluntary im-plementation of best management practices on agriculture lands in order to conserve and improve land and water quality. The pro-gram offers technical

and financial assis-tance as an incentive to implement suggest these practices. It is a user friendly program with several people who can assist you in starting out with one or more programs.

We thank Dylan for his program and hope more people, farmers included to visit your local Conservation District on Airport Road to see what is available. Remember you don't have to own a farm to be conserva-tion savvy.

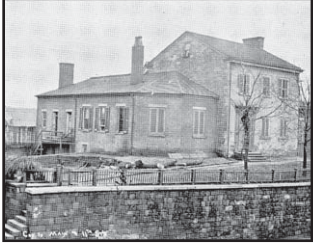

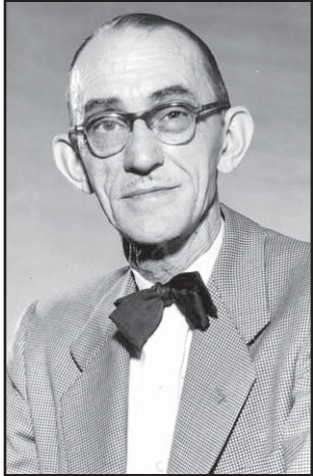
Oct. 5, 1992: Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton was designated as a National Historic Landmark, one of only 16 in the state. The first Mother's Day observance took place at the church on May 10, 1908.



Oct. 6, 1864: Labor activist Sarah "Mother" Blizzard was born in Edmond, Fayette County. Blizzard was deeply involved in the United Mine Workers of America from the organiza-tion's early beginnings in the late 19th century.



Oct. 7, 1747: Pio-neer Ebenezer Zane, the founder of Wheel-ing, was born on the South Branch of the Po-tomac River near pres-ent Moorefield in Hardy County.



Oct. 7, 1900: Poet Roy Lee Harmon was born in Boone County. He was the founder of the West Virginia Poetry Society and served as

the state's poet laureate for 38 years.



Oct. 8, 1993: The Rev. Bernard Coffindaffer died unexpectedly of a heart attack. Starting in 1984, Coffindaffer began erecting clusters of crosses in West Virginia and other states. He was buried in Nicholas County, just across the highway from a set of his crosses.

Oct. 9, 1877: The Episcopal Church created the Diocese of West Virginia. The initial convention of the new diocese met at St. John's Episcopal in Charleston, with 14 clergy and 16 lay delegates.

Oct. 9, 2014: Follow-ing court rulings and announcements by the governor and the attorney general, same-sex marriage was effectively legalized in West Vir-ginia.

Oct. 10, 1774: Shaw-nee warriors led by Cornstalk were defeated at the Battle of Point Pleasant. It was the only major engagement of Dunmore's War and the most important battle ever fought in present West Virginia.

interesting reasons for their choices of breeds. For example, Morgan Whitney, winner in the herding group, chose to create a Malinois because she had become acquainted with the breed earlier. “When I was younger, my uncle left this dog, a Malinois, in my care, and I enjoyed it.” She went on to explain that the Malinois was originally used to herd cattle and for the military and protective work. Her uncle’s dog was trained to sniff out narcotics. Of the project, Whitney called it “worthwhile.” She added, “I had a good time, and it was definitely a learning

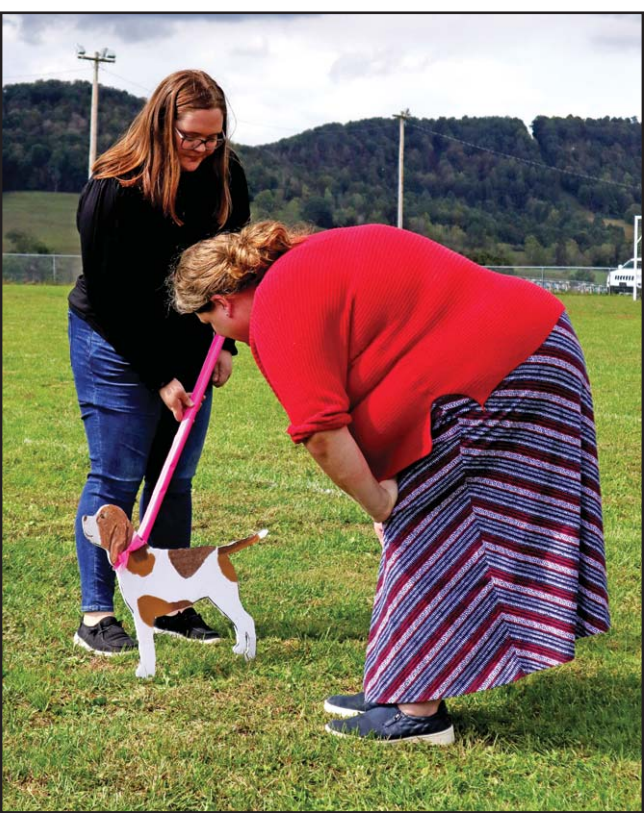
experience.” “My brother has four beagles, and I love them,” Braylin Robinson gave as her reason for choosing a beagle for the dog show. Robinson, winner in the hound group, explained that she learned much more about the beagle through the research they did in class. This young woman was so excited about the project that she started getting her dog ready before other students did. She used her brother’s dogs as models. Asked what she liked best about the project, Robinson answered, “Getting my dog ready for the show. It was exciting for me to be a part of it. This has been my favorite project. It was definitely worthwhile.” Winner of Best of

Show and of the terrier group, Montana Wade was one of those who went beyond the fundamental project to create an Airedale. Wade said she chose the Airedale because “it is the type of dog I’ve always liked.” This dog handler explained how she created her dog. “I made the frame out of cardboard boxes and used masking tape to hold it together. Since the Airedale is wiry, I glued cotton balls on the frame for the coat. Then I sprayed it to make it wiry. I painted the eyes myself.” All of this took several evenings of work in addition to the allotted class time. Wade’s reaction to receiving Best of Show was surprise. “I wasn’t really expecting to win because there were so many good

dogs,” she said. She feels the project was “a really good bonding experience,” and said that they learned about the dogs through the research. The other group winners include Kenzie Belknap for the Non-sporting group, Stephanie Singleton—Sporting Group, Exceptional Eagles—Working Group, and Emma Rose—Toy Group. Two weeks of classroom work—with more for some students, plus careful planning on the part of instructor Porto, created an interesting and, as the students agreed, worthwhile project. Liberty’s defense held Braxton to 76 yards rushing, but Bennett passed for 185 yards and two touchdowns. The Mountaineers’ ground game netted 248 and quarterback Jace Bartley passed for 94.

Defensively, Leegan led the Eagles with 10 tackles. Jaxon Short recorded nine, while Bennett and Andrew Brandt each had five. Braxton had a total of 49 tackles against the Mountaineers.

This week the Eagles travel to Nicholas County to take on the Grizzlies.

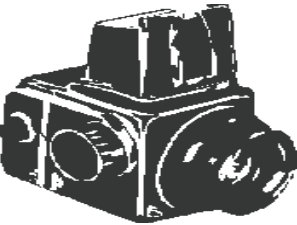
