



Burnsville Library included in national pilot program

The American Library Association has announced twelve artists and library staff teams selected for the pilot cohort for ALA's Civic Imagination Stations. The program is supported by The Estée Lauder Companies WRITING CHANGE initiative. Burnsville Public Library is one of the nationwide selections.

Quincy Potasnik will be the artist for the Burnsville Public Library. She will co-lead the program with BPL Librarian Beth Anderson.

WRITING CHANGE is a three-year global, literacy initiative in partnership with Amanda Gorman, the youngest inaugural poet in U.S. history, award-winning writer, and Estée Lauder Global Changemaker. Libraries will partner with local artists to implement arts programming that builds literacy and digital skills. Teams were selected from a national application process conducted in June and July 2022.

From August 2022 to March 2023, the cohort will participate together in workshops and coaching led by Civic Imagination Stations Lead Artists: Willa J. Taylor, Goodman Theatre's Walter Director of Educa-

tion and Engagement; and Michael Rohd, founding Artistic Director of Sojourn Theatre and Co-founder of the Center for Performance and Civic Practice. Civic Imagination Station cohort teams will culminate their work with the development and implementation of short-term original arts-based projects. In addition, the Civic Imagination Stations program will model processes by which other librarian/artist partnerships can work together to create locally appropriate and meaningful civic imagination projects.

"Libraries and artists are natural partners and have much to gain and learn from each other," said ALA Executive Director Tracie D. Hall. "I envision making library collections and services more visible to our communities as one of the key outcomes of this project. This initiative also seeks to direct the ingenuity of artists, librarians, and library staff on the issue of bridging the digital literacy divide which this current pandemic has starkly exposed."

Braxton gets \$1,000,000 grant for new ladder truck

U.S. Senators Joe Manchin and Shelley Moore Capito members of the Senate Appropriations Committee, announced last week \$8,121,688 for fire departments across in West Virginia through the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). This funding was made available through FEMA's Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) program and includes a \$1,000,000 award, in the name of the Sutton Volunteer Fire Department, which will bring a new ladder truck for the county.

"Our brave West Virginia firefighters risk their lives every day to protect our communities, and we must ensure they have the necessary equipment and resources to do their jobs safely and effectively," Senator Manchin said. "I am pleased FEMA is investing more than \$8.1 million to support fire departments, firefighters and additional first responders across the state, and I look forward to seeing the positive impacts of

the funding. As a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, I will continue advocating for resources to support our firefighters as they work tirelessly to protect West Virginians across the Mountain State."

"Our firefighters are on the front lines each and every day in West Virginia, and they courageously provide services that we rely on to keep our communities and residents safe. That's why it is essential that we continue to make sure that these men and women have the resources they need to do their job effectively and safely," Senator Capito said. "As Ranking Member of the Senate Homeland Security Appropriations Subcommittee, which oversees funding for FEMA, I have helped our fire departments utilize the AFG and SAFER programs to help better serve their communities, and I will continue to ensure our first responders have these necessary resources they need to safely serve West Virginians."

The grant to Braxton County only requires a

\$50,000 match which will be provided by the County Commission from ARP funding.

In addition to Braxton who received the largest single portion of the funds: \$715,733 was awarded to Moorefield Volunteer Fire Company (Hardy County), \$619,047 - Folsom Volunteer Fire Department (Wetzel County), \$488,985 - Winfield Volunteer Fire Department (Putnam County), \$476,190 - South Fork Volunteer Fire Department (Pendleton County), \$431,818 - Bedington Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department (Berkeley County), \$404,185 - Tyler Mountain Volunteer Fire Department (Kanawha County), \$338,009 - City of Wheeling (Ohio/Marshall County), \$320,388 - Jackson's Mill Volunteer Fire Department (Lewis County), \$237,580 - West Side Volunteer Fire Department (Kanawha County), \$204,761 - Ravenswood Volunteer Fire Department (Jackson County), \$200,380 - White Sulphur Springs

Sutton Council has busy session

The Sutton Town Council held a meeting on October 23th. The meeting was called to order at 6:00 pm by Mayor JD Hoover. He opened the meeting by speaking about the recent National Recognition that the Sutton Elementary received. He stated he would coordinate with the school to do recognition from the town as well.

Jon Crum spoke about lowering the wattage of the streetlights at the Elk River Hotel & Café. He said he would contact Mon Power.

Recorder Laurel Petolicchio discussed individuals coming to her with historic photos. She discussed continuing the work on making the council chambers a museum for the town.

Ann Gum asked about work on South Industrial. Robyn Dolan informed her that paving would start next and residents would be notified on Friday. She also asked that all council members get any issues they see with streets in town to her so she can get a complete list to discuss with WVDOH. Dolan also asked for a list of issues with street signs as well.

Artist Bill Hopen came and addressed the council about his recent trip to Idaho and brought greetings from their town mayor. The sculpture installation was a success. He updated the Council on his plans to acquire the burned out building next door to his and to turn it into a sculpture garden with a clear roof cover and secure front doors with a historical look. It will remain open during the day and be closed at night for security. He asked permission to cut the sidewalk to make a ramp where he can pull

in a truck to clean out the building and in the future to unload sculptures without obstructing the road. He is also going to replace the old boards in front of his studio with clear Plexiglas garage doors for a more eye appealing frontage. Recorder Petolicchio congratulated him on his success and his willingness to bring the old buildings back to life. She asked that the sidewalk cutout take into consideration handicap access to the sidewalk. The council asked Hopen to fill out a building permit and plan for the next meeting.

Catherine Hoover noted that since the riding mower was no longer functioning Ron Casto had mowed the lot above the school apartments and would do it again one more time before winter.

Council reviewed the two bids for salt spreaders. Jon Crum, with a second by Robyn Dolan made the motion to purchase the "Salt Dog" salt spreader on the condition that the bed of the truck be measured to make sure the new one would fit correctly.

Mayor Hoover requested to have a designated parking spot for law enforcement in front of the town building.

Jon Crum brought up the random trashcan that sits on corner of Third Street and Main Street. Municipal Clerk Robin Smith said she would contact the trash company and have it removed.

Council discussed the replacement of 19 ceiling tiles in the community building. Beth Atkins gave an update on the ongoing search for a stairlift or elevator for public access to the community building.

Recorder Laurel

Petolicchio reported on the recent State Auditor's meeting. All municipalities would need to transition into taking credit card payments in person and online by March. There were two proposals presented to the council. The ordinances would also have to be updated to reflect charges for fees. The issue was tabled until the following meeting.

Mayor Hoover asked if the council would make exceptions for the rental fees for the upstairs room for class reunions. It was decided that the price was already set to cover only water and electrical use so it would remain the same.

Beth Atkins mentioned that the Farmers Market banners had not been taken down for the season. The status of the Port-a-Potty the water winterization was also discussed. Jon Crum said he would check on that.

Beth Atkins and Catherine Hoover presented the purchased banners for the town. Plans are to start on Monday to get the banners up throughout town.

Beth Atkins made the motion to approve the minutes from September 22 and the special meeting on October 3, seconded by Catherine Hoover.

The payment of bills was approved on motion by Robyn Dolan with a second by Jon Crum.

Beth Atkins made the motion to accept the construction permits for 103 3rd Street and 703 N. 3rd Street.

Every Acre Counts

Predator Series... Raptors

The final group of predators we will take a look at in this series are Raptors. That's right birds of prey are predators to many of our local wildlife.

What birds of prey do we have locally? We have quite a list; Red-Tailed Hawk, Red-Shouldered Hawk, Sharp-Shinned Hawk, Broad Winged Hawk, Rough-Legged Hawk, Cooper Hawk, American Kestrel, Osprey, Northern Goshawk, Northern Harrier, and Bald Eagle. At night our species face raptors such as the Eastern Screech Owl, Great Horned Owl, Barn Owl, Northern Saw-whet Owl, and the Barred Owl.

The real question is "how do they affect

our wildlife?" For our small game species such as rabbits, squirrels, quail, grouse, and turkey, the raptors are a true predator. The number one predator for quail is hawks like the Red-Tail and Red-Shouldered Hawks. Turkey poults can also face challenges until they reach a mature age from these same raptors.

Raptors can have an indirect impact on deer as well. By competing with the coyote and bobcats for squirrels and rabbits, they can push those species toward fawns and taking on adult deer. I know on my property I regularly see a pair of Red-Shouldered Hawks and at least one Red-Tail Hawk. We also

have a Sharp-Shinned Hawk that zips through our woodlot looking for other birds to pick off for an easy meal.

The American Kestrel is a pure bird hunter focusing on Starlings and Cowbirds, however, given the opportunity a young grouse or turkey poult might be on the menu. Other predators such as Raccoons and Opossums are not immune to attacks from predators such as the Barred Owl and the Great Horned Owl. Hunting at night, these birds of prey cruise our forests looking for the roosting grouse, the hapless opossum, or raccoon.

Raptor Control Options – Nature Handlings the Control Part

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News from our Capitol

It was a beautiful weekend for Homecoming activities in Glenville at GSU last weekend. While fall is my favorite time of year, with the beautiful weather comes some of the first signs of what's to come. With widespread freeze warnings this week, it looks like any remaining uncovered flowers and plants will be hit. Jean is readying her frost covers around the property, knowing it will only extend the inevitable. Meanwhile, the pontoon boat is out of the lake as we ready it for winter storage. On Wednesday, September 28th, Mountaineer Food Bank took advantage of the beautiful day to give back to their community at two different locations in Braxton County. Gassaway has been their home for their main warehouse for the past forty-one years, so they spent time aiding their hometown by cutting weeds, painting, cleaning sidewalks, and picking up trash. They were also hard at work at Holly Grey Park—

where they hold their Mobile Food Pantries in Braxton County—assisting with cutting weeds, cleaning walking trails and other areas, and picking up trash. Additionally, they also trimmed trees, repaired bleachers, and prepared the grounds for winter including the mud bog area.

None of this would have been possible without town partners who helped coordinate, like Harts Hardware who assisted with supplies; Sports Connection with the awesome signage; Volunteers from Gassaway Baptist Church and residents for preparing and serving a delicious lunch; Piccadilly's with coffee and hot chocolate; and the Gassaway Area Improvement Council who helped organize all the tasks. A big thanks to Mountaineer Food Bank and each one who took part in this day. It was a great opportunity for teamwork and made a positive impact!

All our communities and facilities across central West Virginia have unmet needs and local officials that I'm sure are ready and

willing to welcome assistance from businesses, groups and organizations who want to give back in making our great communities even better.

Having discussed the possible pitfalls and potential benefits of Amendment 2 and Amendment 4 on the November ballot over the past two columns, it's time to delve into the remaining constitutional change that will be up to voters in November: Amendment 1 and Amendment 3

Amendment 1 Summary: Adoption of this amendment would clarify/that/courts have no authority or jurisdiction to intercede or intervene in or interfere with impeachment proceedings of the House of Delegates or the Senate. It would also specify that a judgment rendered by the Senate following an impeachment trial is not reviewable by any court of this state.

Background: The removal of the judicial branch from review of any impeachment proceedings conducted by the Legislature is current leadership's reaction to the West Virginia Supreme Court decision Workman v. Carmichael disapproving the process that was used to impeach the five then state supreme court justices a few years ago. The WV Constitution reserves the sole right to

impeach with the House and trial with the Senate. The fundamental question of this amendment is whether there is ever a circumstance when a Court should review the actions of the legislature in the impeachment process.

One opinion holds the constitutional amendment does harm to the Constitution and can create unfairness and potentially trample a governmental official's constitutional rights to hold office. In retrospect, there were flaws in the procedure utilized by the House of Delegates in the judicial impeachment. There are criticisms about how the process was conducted in the House Judiciary Committee, where they chose to impeach all the justices in a single resolution. Since each supreme court member is elected to a separate office, this should have required separate resolutions. Also, each was charged with different facts/allegations.

The appointed justices hearing the case said government officials undergoing impeachment are still entitled to basic rules of fairness, and there are times when the courts have a limited right to review, not of the Legislature's decision, but their process, to assure that the constitutional Please turn to **CAPITOL** page 3

Jon Crum updated the council on the status of the ordinances. He went over changes that needed to be considered. This is still a rough draft and nothing was voted on.

The previous winning sealed bid for the surplus police cruiser was a practical joke by a disgruntled person. The notice of accepting bids was placed back in the paper. Recorder Laurel Petolicchio said that this must be the last as the state requires an in person auction only.

Recorder Laurel Petolicchio reiterated the need for a building for the town to secure town vehicles and equipment due to recent vandalism.

Gary Beamer was

absent again for his presentation on the Christmas Parade. Municipal Clerk Robin Smith gave an update to council members.

Laurel Petolicchio requested permission from the council to close down 4th street on December 10 for the Yeti Festival as last year's event brought in around 400 people even in the bad weather. Jon Crum asked what the protocol for closing streets is. Petolicchio explained that with any road closure, the town, fire department, police department and county should all clear it. She has been doing this with both festivals. The Mayor suggested that there be some changes and better communication regarding port-a-potties for festival. Laurel said that due to the fact this was a private organization, the town couldn't provide them and the committee had ordered five which was sufficient with the other bathrooms available including the two handicap accessible ones built for the summer event. Plans were made months in advance and the event had a positive impact on the town. Beth Atkins made a motion that 4th Street be closed for the event. Robyn Dolan seconded the motion. The motion passed with Recorder Petolicchio abstaining due to personal involvement with the event.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:12pm. The next regular meeting is scheduled for October 27 at 6:00 pm.

rights of the public official are not violated.

For example, under this amendment, if the Senate drafted and adopted their own articles of impeachment without the House, neither the Court nor anyone else has the right to intercede in the Senate's action. This alone makes me uncomfortable and gives me pause for concern over some future impeachment action that does

not follow the rules.

Finally, here's the limited discussion on Amendment 3, which would repeal the prohibition on churches and religious groups to incorporate.

Amendment 3 Summary: The prohibition for allowing religious organizations to incorporate is from the 1851 Virginia Constitution which we adopted after WV statehood. The State of Virginia deleted this provision several years ago due to concerns that the provisions violate the federal Constitution's First Amendment Free Exercise Clause. The changes proposed by Amendment 3 would allow the Legislature to adopt laws authorizing incorporation of churches and religious denominations.

To date, I've had no pastor, church official or group contact me about this proposed change in our constitution, including groups on the political far right and far left. The federal District Court in Virginia found that religious originations should be treated the same as others wishing to incorporate. One attorney pointed out to me that the suggested change to this language fails to do that. The last sentence in the amendment allows the Legislature to adopt general laws authorizing religious institutions to incorporate. Thus, the Legislature "may" if it chooses, create disparity in the treatment of these organizations. Because of this language, it may fail to do what the amendment intends- to create a level playing field. Also, the incorporation laws of this state already authorize religious organizations to incorporate, so this whole effort likely changes nothing.

Well, there you have it. Three weeks' worth of my attempt to decipher the confusing language used in the constitutional amendments on the ballot. Amending the State Constitution is serious, and the consequences are not easily reversed. Early voting begins on October 26 through November 5, with General Election Day on Tuesday, November 8th. Choose wisely.

predators, Raptors have a high mortality rate on their own. Very few Red-Tailed Hawks live more than 2 years in the wild. If you have watched a hawk fly into the brush pile after rabbit or a thick treetop for a squirrel, you understand how hard their life is. One broken wing or damaged beak and they are likely going to die of starvation. All raptors suffer from the same types of life ending injuries, a bad squirrel bite, or copperhead strike and usually the bird is dead within hours or days.

Additionally, it is illegal to kill hawks in WV so that method of control is out of the question. However,

what our inability to control these raptors brings us back to is having or creating quality habitat. If the hawk or owl has to dive into an old tree top or brush pile to catch his or her quarry, the odds of success are greatly diminished and the birds' odds of a life ending injury just increased. Like a coyote hunting in a large patch of quality fawning habitat, a bird of prey searching and trying to cover acres of habitat and catch a squirrel is difficult for them and benefits the prey.

I watched a Red-tail Hawk make 11 attempts as squirrels and missed every opportunity due to thick ground cover. The hawk lost several feathers in the process and the squirrels were still running around the woodlot.

A few simple tasks and some quality habitat work will have your raptors searching for

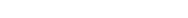

You had to yell to talk to somebody so they could hear you. We loved going to Lockney. Someone brought a record player for square dance music and for refreshments we kids got homemade cupcakes and Kool Aid. I think there was coffee there for the adults. Mom was a liberal arts person and she loved dancing, music, and singing. That was right up her alley.

I remember them pulling up carrots out of her garden in summer. She got rid of them. It took a whole vegetable dish full of banty eggs to make a skillet full of scrambled eggs for breakfast. I will close for this week.

It has been several weeks since I have written a Chat or anything else since my most recent fall when I broke my sacrum. I am not going to bore you with the misery of pain, but today is really the first time I have sat down at my computer. I hated not writing you all and letting you in on the news, but I physically could not do it.

This is second try to write a chat and hope that I can remember a few things. It will be short and if you have questions, maybe I can satisfy your curiosity... I hurt my knee a few years or so ago and I learned from x-rays that I have bone-on-bone in my right knee and arthritis, and I was given an appointment for 6 months later, on February 18. I am on a list to get an earlier appointment if there is ever a cancellation, but so far the surgery is still set for February 18th.

The pain has been awful, and I had to learn to walk with a walker. I had some good physical therapy at St. Joseph's and then most recently a couple of weeks of therapy at the beautiful Encompass site.

My biggest problem now is that I have fallen three times. I have been hospitalized three times and been going for health therapy, at a place that is as beautifully situated as any spa or scenic site, at UHC Encompass. My room on the seventh floor there faced toward the West and this was soon after IAN hurricane had gone through. The skies were so beautiful, especially the sunsets. It was heavenly. I am now doing ongoing therapy with West Virginia Health Care a couple of days a week in my home and the kids make sure I do all the exercises a couple of times a day when no therapist is there to help.

My church has ongoing activities that you are welcome to learn about and attend, if you look up The Buckhannon

Seventh-day Adventist Church website. The number for their programs is 96120157208 on Zoom. They have activities to which you are invited. I thoroughly enjoyed a talk yesterday by our Pastor's wife, Samantha about abuse in our modern-day society. I was interested that she said to be sure to tell the victim of abuse that, "It is not YOUR fault." She had us all repeat the phrases that she suggested several times. And then she said with few exceptions, you should never repeat what you are told until the victim is ready to report it. You can hear this talk if you go on Zoom or The Buckhannon Seventh-day Adventist web site and look for October 15th program.

God has answered many of your prayers for me. I no longer have pain all the nights, in fact mostly none.

Maybe next week I can be more 'with it' to write a better Chat. I have missed you.

Steve gave an update on the leak at the Community Center.

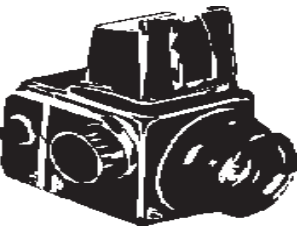

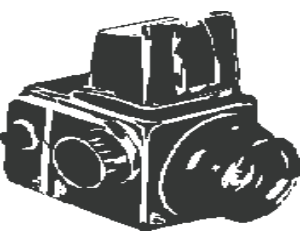

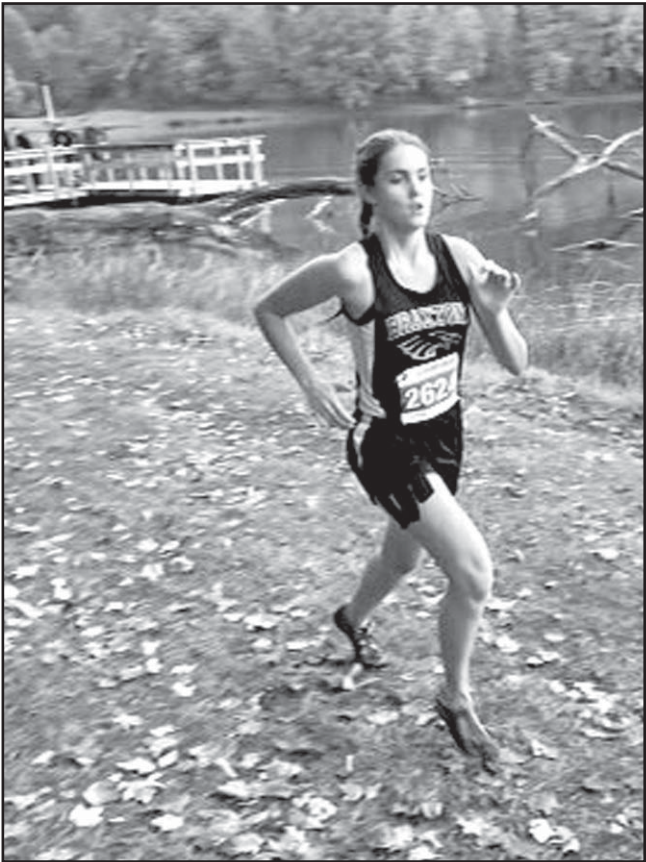
