

Board of Education Reviews Finances in Special Meeting

The Braxton County Board of Education conducted a special meeting for the financial review of 2021-2022. Board President Evelyn Post thanked Ginger Altizer, Treasurer, for her work on getting the report completed and ready for review by board members. The report is based on standards set by the state.

Altizer provided an overview of the financial report including expenditures, revenues, bonds, and the balance in the general fund at the end of the fiscal year of \$4,928,296.35. Once the budget was balanced the remaining funds were \$3,063,796.35, which is a drop of \$39,908.10 from the previous year.

Dr. Kenna Seal noted that the county used \$1.8 million of the previous year's unassigned fund balance for this past school year's budget and how if that continues, the excess funds could be depleted in just a few years. Altizer did note that the county does usually bring in some excess funds that are not part of the regular budget, but the funds could go quickly especially if major repairs or equipment replacements need to be made.

She also reviewed fund balances for other accounts including federal programs like Title I and she reviewed funds committed to projects and training.

Altizer stated almost

\$13 million was used for direct instruction and about \$2 million on support services for students. She also said that approximately 85% of the budget goes to personnel.

Dr. Seal asked about the effect of Amendment 2 that is to be on the ballot. Altizer noted it could cause a deficit as there is not guarantee legislators will have plans in place to make up for lost funds if the Amendment passes.

The board approved the financial report for the 2021-2022 school year on a motion by Dr. Seal with a second by Larry Hardway.

The next regular meeting is scheduled for October 4 at 6:00 pm.

Coach Sterling Beane to receive Wrestling Hall of Fame honors



Coach Sterling Beane is the only Wrestling Coach Braxton County High School has ever had. Under his guidance wrestling has become the winnesteing sport in BCHS history. His vast accomplishments have earned him a nomination into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame.

Sterling Beane first became involved in wrestling at the urging of his Glenville State College roommates to whom he refers as "the Mills brothers." The brothers were among those trying to start a wrestling team at GSC. He recently described how that went. "One evening they came into the room and asked me if I'd like to be on the wrestling team. 'We need a heavyweight,' they told me. I'd never wrestled, but they were persuasive so I decided I'd try it," he said. Nearly sixty years later, Coach Beane, who last season coached his 50th BCHS wrestling team, will be honored by the National Wrestling Hall of Fame, West Virginia Chapter. He and five other dedicated men will be honored at the

high-school wrestling coach began in 1972-73 when he asked the BCHS athletic director, Roy J. Brosius, if he could start a wrestling team at the high school. "He told me he'd buy uniforms for a team if I could earn money for a wrestling mat. I did and we began the wrestling program at the high school which will soon be in its 51st year," Beane said.

His accomplishments as a coach number many. These include 14 regional championships and seven runner-up finishes. His teams have finished in the top 10 in state tournaments 17 times and in 2020, the Eagles finished second in the state. In addition, his teams have won 15 conference championships, and he has had 101 state placers with six state champions and 20 runners-up.

Other honors include Conference Coach of the Year, Regional Coach of the Year, and WV Athletic Director's Coach of the Year several times. He was the NFHS Coach of the Year in 2003-04 and received the Kenny Wright Boys Coach of the Year award in 2016-17.

While Sterling Beane is proud of his achievements and the honors he has received during the past 50 years coaching wrestling, he maintains that those honors don't belong to him alone. "The wrestling program has been a family thing," he said. "In addition to Judy and Sterling and Monica, many people have worked hard as volunteers. This has not been a 'one-man show.' It has been the whole community. Any honors I receive also honor the county."

Legislative Update

Hurricane Ian and the devastation left in its wake is one that will take years from which to recover and rebuild across the Florida peninsula. Only now are we discovering the extent of the loss of life for those that failed to or were unable to heed warnings to evacuate. Most who died were drowned in the storm surge. I think of flooding as a gradual to a rapid rise in water levels, but the storm surge violently can blow doors and windows inward, trapping victims in place. I'm sure there will be many local churches and groups that will make the trip to Florida to help residents clean up. For those who are unable to physically go to the disaster scene, we can financially support legitimate relief groups and organizations to assist.

This storm also took on special concerns for Jean and me, as our grandson Collin is attending school in Orlando. Also, when it made a second landfall in South Carolina, Jessica and her family were directly affected, as well as Jean's mom, her brother's family, and many extended family members. Thankfully, all weathered the storm safely.

Last week, I summarized the four constitutional amendments on the ballot this November for voters to decide. They are:

- Amendment 1: Impeachment
- Amendment 2: Property Tax Modernization
- Amendment 3: Incorporation of Churches or Religious Denominations
- Amendment 4: State Board of Education Rule-making

This week, I want to discuss Amendment 2. Already, commercials are flooding the airwaves in favor of Amendment 2 and my concern is what they are not saying in the spots. They are alleging that if Amendment 2 is approved by voters, (1) new jobs will come to West Virginia; (2) existing manufacturing jobs will stay in West Virginia; (3) the vehicle property tax could be eliminated. Take note of the "could be eliminated". That is not a certainty if it passes. It's only a maybe and it will be up to the next Legislature to decide.

This proposed amendment has been around for

years, pushed mostly by the WV Chamber of Commerce and the WV Manufacturers Association. Their goal is to phase out and eliminate the property taxes paid by manufacturers to counties on industrial manufacturing equipment. In previous years, this never gained enough traction to gain approval by the Legislature to have it placed on the ballot as an amendment to the WV Constitution. In those early versions, there was nothing for the average citizen, just a huge fiscal hit on county budgets, mostly in funding for our public schools. No mention of the elimination of the regressive inventory tax on small businesses, until now.

As the legislative balance of power shifted from a majority to a supermajority in 2020, it was apparent that the votes were in the House and Senate to pass the Joint Resolution needed to place the amendment on the upcoming 2022 general election ballot. Meanwhile, an amendment was offered and passed by the House and Senate to eliminate the personal property tax on vehicles – one selling point for residents.

If the Amendment passes, it will fall in the lap of the next Legislature to determine who gets the breaks and who will be left out. I want to mention a few important questions as you consider your vote.

- Passage does not assure that your vehicle property tax vehicles will be eliminated. It could happen if the amendment is approved by voters, but there is no guarantee it will occur.
- Little is being mentioned as to what benefit, if any, will be available for our small businesses. If so, what benefit can they expect? Repeal of the inventory tax? I hope so, but no guarantees.
- Passage of the amendment takes tax money out of counties – most of which is used to fund our schools, sending it to the state for whatever tax breaks the Legislature decides.
- Proponents claim that the Legislature will make county budgets "whole" to make up for the massive revenue loss. What happens when the state revenue surplus dries up when energy prices drop? Will property taxes eventually rise to make up for

caring, kindness, and love. We will never forget.

tax breaks for manufacturers that may not be in the county in which you reside?

These and others are important questions that must be considered by all West Virginia voters. There is more to the amendment than the possible car tax cut, which is a carrot on a stick.

One more point I'd like to make. I know most of those individuals featured in the current pro-Amendment 2 TV commercials. Some are paid lobbyists at the Legislature. The House and Senate majority is in favor of the passage of Amendment 2, with the Senate especially invested in its passage.

I've yet to hear the organized counterarguments to passage go statewide, but I suspect the airwaves will soon be filled with those spots soon. It's not exactly a level playing field, as those groups opposed do not have the deep financial pockets to fund a major statewide media blitz.

As stated previously, the WV Chamber of Commerce and the WV Manufacturers Association are in favor of passage. The WV Association of Counties and the WV County Commissioners Association are opposed. All are good organizations that I've worked with for over a quarter century. However, they each have their own reasons for passage or rejection.

Additionally, Governor Justice is traveling the state in opposition to Amendment 2, as he wants passage of his state income tax reduction plan instead. He's arguing correctly that the State cannot afford both Amendment 2 and his income tax cut. However, the tax plan the Governor has put forth thus far did not gain sufficient traction to even be considered in the State Senate. The income tax cut is currently geared heavily to benefit the wealthiest at the expense of the average working West Virginia family.

Amendment 2 could have a positive impact on small businesses and the average West Virginia taxpayer. Again, that depends on the Legislature. Only the prospect of the possible elimination of personal property tax on personal vehicles is the enticement for most West Virginians that proponents hope will help ensure passage. If passed, Amendment 2 will permanently inject the Legislature into county taxation matters and away from county and municipal governments.

I urge everyone to listen intently and carefully read all ads and pamphlets that will be appearing on the airwaves, in print media, and in your PO box. Likewise, candidates for the Legislature need to be clear in articulating what their vote and priorities will be when this comes before them in the Senate or the House in 2023. I'll be asking those questions and I hope each of you will, too.

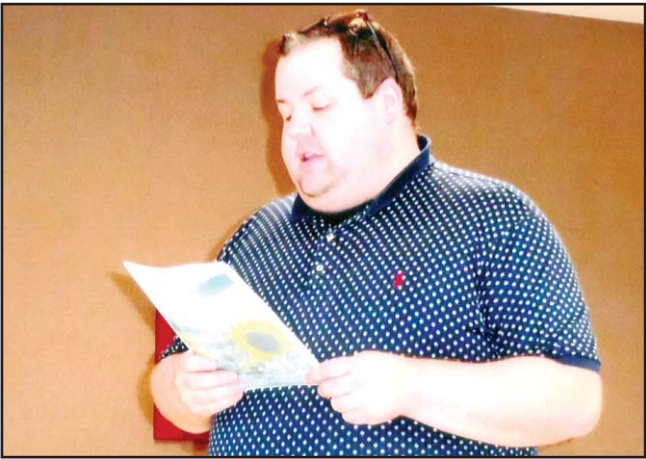
Braxton County Farm Bureau has September 2022 program speaker

The Elk AgEP Program is always evolving. The program guidelines and practices offers may change every fiscal year which depend a lot on funding. Soil samples must be collected and mailed in prior to signup.

New tests are required annually and labeled according to the field number that matches your



USDA Farm map. If you currently do not have this type of map, feel free to contact the NRCS or FSA office in the Mon Power building, near Gassaway. AgE’s mission is to assist the agricultural co-operators of WV Conservation Districts with the voluntary implementation of best management practices on agriculture lands in order to conserve and improve land and water quality. The program offers technical and

financial assistance as an incentive to implement suggest these practices. It is a user friendly program with several people who can assist you in starting out with one or more programs. We thank Dylan for his program and hope more people, farmers included to visit your local Conservation District on Airport Road to see what is available. 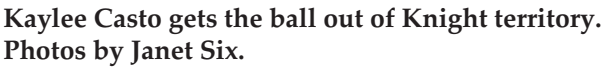

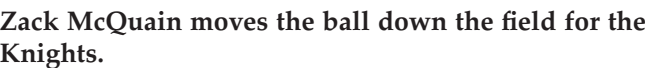

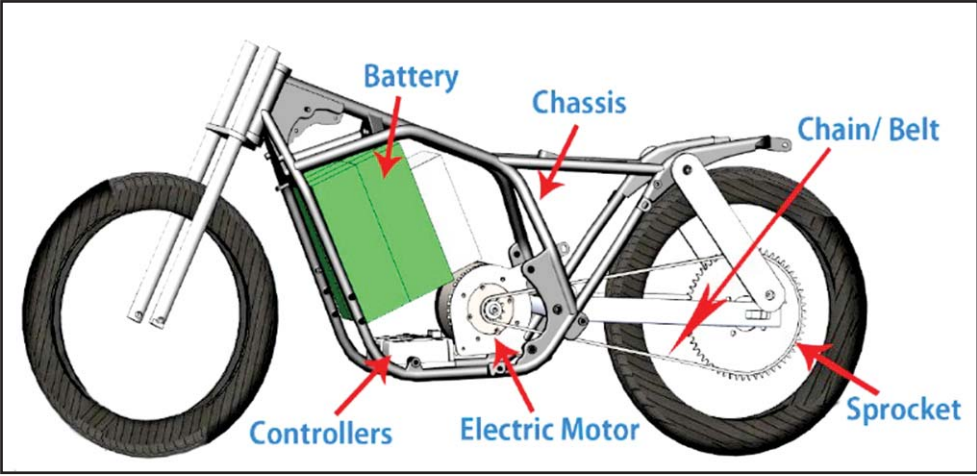

Anatomy of an electric motorcycle. Technologically complicated, mechanically simple. Very few moving parts, easy to maintain.

Electric Motorcycles???

...and scooters too, are no longer a vision of the future. Electric motorcycles and scooters are here now, and their presence will increase exponentially in the near future. Improvements to internal combustion engines is maxed out. Thermal inefficiencies and emissions and noise restrictions make it difficult for internal combustion engines to move forward. The development of e-motorcycles is cutting-edge technology, the doors are wide open for improvements, ergo, a lot of money is being poured into the development of e-motorcycles.

Electric motorcycles, scooters, and bicycles are vehicles that plug in to recharge with two or three wheels. Electric scooters differ from an electric motorcycle in having a step-through frame, instead of having to straddle. Most e-scooters and all e-bicycles are limited as to where they can be ridden

type vehicles are not a new concept. According to Wikipedia, two patent applications for an “electric bicycle” were filed in 1895. In 1911, the October issue of Popular Mechanics published information on an electric motorcycle, claiming to have a range of 75-100 miles per charge. In the years since then, advances made include the invention of an electric motorcycle that towed a trailer during WWII, a fuel cell-Nickel-cadmium battery motorcycle, an electric drag racer motorcycle, running an 11-12 second quarter mile at Bonneville, to be bested later with another electric drag racer record of 7.824 seconds at 168 miles per hour, a land speed record of 216.8 mph, and the first all-electric street motorcycle race, which took place at the Isle of Man in 2009. Many electric motorcycle manufacturers have come into the scene since then, and a few of the internal combustion motorcycle manufacturer-

ers are adding e-motorcycles to their lineup. . This column will focus on e-motorcycles, the reasons to get or not get one, and their pros and cons.

Number one reason, for me, is the obvious absence of air and noise pollution. E-motorcycles don’t use gas, oil, or other chemicals needed for internal combustion engines. Since there is no exhaust system, no gears to shift, and no noise, I find it easier to feel more connected to the environment.

Second reason, instant torque. No warming up needed. The throttle smoothly controls the increase in speed. Internal combustion engines build up torque, an electric motor provides its maximum torque the second the power from the battery is applied. This is great for your wheelie freaks!

Number three, no gears. The majority of the e-bikes use direct drive. As you read in reason number two, you twist the throttle, the

bike instantly jumps for joy, and keeps on going without having to shift or downshift. In addition, e-motorcycles utilize regenerative braking. In simple terms, regenerative braking is a feature that recharges the battery when the brakes are applied and uses the motor to slow you down. Not so simple, regenerative braking utilizes the kinetic energy and converts it into electrical energy before supplying it back into the main traction battery. With regenerative braking, you drastically reduce the wear and tear on your hydraulic disc brakes.

Fourth reason, you may charge your e-motorcycle at home. It costs about ten cents per charge on a Level One charger. The cost of charging on the road varies, even within the same companies at separate locations. Some companies offer a monthly membership for discounted charging.

The fifth reason is a boon to the maintenance-challenged rider. The biggest maintenance chore on an electric motorcycle is regular cleaning! It helps to keep the dirt, dust, and debris from getting into the motor. Other requirements include brake pads, battery care, tire pressure, and checking the bolts on the bike. Easy peasy!

Last but not least, number six reason. Since there is no hot exhaust, there are no burns to legs and other limbs, or heat wafting up into your butt and other parts of your body. Also, no oil means no drips, no messes. Your partner will not oppose your parking the bike in your living room.

I have covered most of the major pros of owning an electric motorcycle. I found very few cons. The major one is the entry cost of electric motorcycles. For example, the prices for each of the four top ranked electric motorcycles are as follows: Energica EGO+ / RS \$25,880; The Zero SR/S

\$15,495; Harley-Davidson LiveWire \$22,799; and the Lightning LS-218, the fastest production electric motorcycle, costs \$38,888.

The transition from an internal combustion engine motorcycle to an electric motorcycle is the most difficult for me. I will make concessions solely on the lack of environmental im-

pacts offered by an electric motorcycle, however, the feel of the vibes and rumbles, and the need for coordination and awareness needed to ride an internal combustion engine motorcycle will be very difficult for me to give up. I can see me using an electric bike for in town and short rides, but when I go to Alaska or California, I want my Beemer!

On the Other Side of the Mountain

For the duration of the pandemic, we had very little contact with friends. There were occasional visits but very few compared to pre-Covid. We had some nice encounters with young folks, I guess around their late twenties, early thirties, the past month. I call them kids, like the old timers called us when we first moved here, “ the kids in the holler”. It was not derogatory, more endearing, and inclusive.

Having been so isolated, we did not realize that young people have a different reality from us. It is an encounter of the Tik-Tok-, the Facebook-, the Twitter-world with the dinosaurs. One of the visitors explored the farm by taking extensive walks and when he came back, he was amazed by how many huge rock piles he had encountered in remote areas of our farm. He noticed two places with big garbage dumps, mostly glass and some rusty buckets. He guessed that the rock piles were grave markers, but he could not figure out why anybody would bother to walk so far to dump their garbage. We told him that old grave sites in our area were well taken care of, with sometimes just a field rock at the head of the grave, sometimes a wooden cross. The rock piles he had

seen were there, where people had planted corn, then picked up rocks that were in the way. The dumps were there from people who lived in the vicinity.

Garbage pick-up did not exist. Even if you had a bag full of glass where would you bring it? We knew all these families who lived there when we moved here. They were a prime example of toughness and self sufficiency to make it. In today’s world they would not believe in what stupidity some of us are involved.

October 15th is our date to plant garlic. We eat garlic every day, raw and chopped in a salad, mashed, and cooked in a tomato sauce or in a pizza, raw and mashed in a dip with cheese or avocado. A few people can’t tolerate garlic. Some have acid reflux, others have digestive issues. Some folks claim that it causes us to have garlic breath, which I think can’t be the worst thing that happens to us. At least it keeps any sort of vampires away, maybe even politicians. Garlic helps the immune system to be more resilient, it lowers high blood pressure, it has antibiotic properties and it helps fight cancer.

We use garlic from our own patch that we harvested in July and spread out in the upstairs of a barn to dry. We have kept two varieties go-

ing for many years, one with a reddish tint, Music, the other one a white one, we call Mondreas, named after the dear friends, Chris and Rose Mondreas, who gave us a start many years ago. We eat the Music first, then the Mondreas type which lasts longer (till July) and keeps firm and fresh till a new crop of garlic becomes available . You can ask other gardeners for a start, buy garlic from a catalog or get it from the supermarket, but if it is not sold as organic, it might be sprayed with a sprout inhibitor and you will have problems to get it to grow.

When planting garlic, separate the bulb into the individual cloves.

Don’t use the small side or inner rows of cloves, only the full, big ones, mostly from the outside of the bulb. Don’t discard the ones you can’t plant, use them for cooking. Garlic requires a soil pH of 6.0 to 7.0, so on the fairly neutral side. Before we till the bed for garlic, we apply about 2” of compost. Don’t use fresh manure. If your pH meter shows values below 6.0, add some garden lime. After raking the bed, make some furrows with a hoe and plant the cloves you prepared a good 2” deep and 5” apart, cover the rows carefully with the rake as not to dig up the newly planted cloves. Plant the cloves with the

pointy side up.

Soon the garlic will start to sprout. I try to weed it in November when the new growth is plainly visible. After weeding I spread corn gluten over the whole area. Corn gluten has been used as a supplement for hog feed but now has found a new use as an organic alternative to synthetic chemical herbicides. It is very effective as a pre-emergent herbicide.

The weed that tries to germinate cannot form roots when corn gluten is applied. By decomposing it works as a fertilizer, adding nitrogen to the crop growing there. Of course, come spring corn gluten has disintegrated into the soil. I weed again and apply another course of corn gluten. I want to emphasize that it only works on newly germinating weeds. Never use it on seeds you want to germinate.

Garlic grows well and when it starts to form scapes (flowers) in June, we cut them off to let the plant concentrate on forming nice big bulbs instead of spending energy on producing seeds. We use the scapes in cooking. Around middle of July the long leaves of the plant are starting to turn yellow. This is the time to pull the garlic or dig it up with a fork, trying not injure it. We shake off as much dirt

as possible. We transport the bulbs to the upper part of a barn where they can dry. We leave them there till October when we pick out the best bulbs for replanting the new generation. For the rest we either braid them, using baling twine to hold them together, then hang them up in a dry cool place. Sometimes we tie them in bunches, sometimes we cut off the stems close to the bulb and store them in mesh bags. It is important that there is airflow among the braids, bunches, or bags. Once cold temperatures with a frost set in, store them in a cool room in the house.

I think Music has a pretty long life “shelf-life” when we think that we harvest it in July of one year and it holds re-till July of the following

year.

When we think of the young people we met recently, all of them very amiable, engaging, we dinosaurs forget that they were small kids when 9-11 happened. They have never experienced a time before that attack and we wanted at that time to protect our young ones from this threat to our country. They all just know the craziness that is going on since then.

When we mentioned “Sandy” in a conversation, it conjured up more an image of an attractive young woman and not a storm that inflicted a lot of damage. The experiences we have, shape our lives, and explains how we understand others. The encounters with the “kids” of today were revealing and fun.
