

## Sutton Walgreens to close 2022 Bulltown Civil War Reenactment is This Weekend

The local Walgreens store has been identified as one of 200 stores the corporate giant will close. The announcement came August 6th. Local employees were notified that the Sutton location was included in the downsizing last week. Glenville's Walgreens will also be closed. According to informed sources, the two locations will close November 16. That same source stated that 83 Walgreens locations in this region were slated for closure in this wave.

On August 6, Walgreens announced that it would be closing 200 stores in the United States. These 200 store closures are in addition to parent company Walgreens Boot Alliance's plan - announced earlier this year - to close 200 stores in the

United Kingdom. In a statement shortly afterwards, Walgreens said that these store closures are part of "a transformational cost management program to accelerate the ongoing transformation of our business, enable investments in key areas and to become a more efficient enterprise." Walgreens' share price has dipped slightly since the announcement.

While this closure of 200 stores represents less than 3 percent of Walgreen's 10,000 locations in the United States, it signals a larger trend for the drugstore and pharmacy industry.

Walgreens was founded by Charles R. Walgreen, Sr. in 1901 as a neighborhood drugstore that measured only 50 feet by 20 feet. From that initial store

in 1901, Walgreen started to expand his company. Twelve years after opening his first store, the Walgreens company had four locations - all on the south side of Chicago. The company became an established fixture in Chicago's retail scene and later expanded to over 500 stores throughout the country by the 1930s.

Walgreens survived during the Great Depression and the company experienced decades of steady growth. The heart of Walgreens and the source of most of its profits has been through its prescription department. By 1975, there were more than 1,500 pharmacists filling 30 million prescriptions in 633 stores across the country. That growth continued until the recent downsizing.

Battle of Bulltown Civil War Reenactment will be held October 14, 15 and 16 at the Bulltown historic Area. The 3-day event will kick off with Kids Day from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. followed by registration and camp set up from 4:00 to 10:00 p.m. Reveille at 7:00 a.m. will begin the Saturday events. Camps will open to the public 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Field tactical maneuvers for troops will be from 11:00 a.m. to noon.

At 3:00 p.m. the Confederate Memorial Service will be held. The evening will conclude with the Civil War Ball from 8:00-10:00 p.m.

Sunday's festivities will include St Michael's Church services at 11:00 a.m. The actual Battle of Bulltown Reenactment will be from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m. followed by camp break up.

There is no charge for the event and the public is invited.

The Battle of Bulltown was a small skirmish fought during the American Civil War near Bulltown in Braxton County, West Virginia on October 13, 1863.

In the fall of 1863, William Lowther Jackson, the cousin of "Stonewall" Jackson, led a raiding party of 800 men into central West Virginia to capture the strategic "fort" at Bulltown which overlooked an important crossing of the Little Kanawha River. The goal was to cut Federal communications between the Greenbrier and Kanawha Valleys.

The Union garrison of roughly 400 men was commanded by Captain William Mattingly. The Union troops manned a "fort" of makeshift log barricades and shallow trenches which can still be seen today.

Jackson approached Bulltown secretly. He divided his forces in an attempt to converge on the Union position from two different directions. The Confederates advanced at 4:30am on October 13. They quickly captured the Federal pickets but failed to take the main garrison by surprise.

The Confederates advanced against the fort and a drawn-out skirmish lasted until about 4:30pm, almost twelve hours after the battle be-

gan. Twice, Jackson sent a flag of truce with a demand to surrender to which Captain Mattingly replied, "I will fight until Hell freezes over and then fight on the ice".

Jackson eventually retreated towards the Greenbrier Valley. Casualties were very light considering the length of the battle. On the Union side there were no fatalities. Captain Mattingly was wounded in the thigh and there were some other slight wounds in the Federal camp. The Confederates lost eight killed and a like number wounded.

One civilian, Moses Cunningham, who owned the farm on which the majority of the battle took place, was wounded when he ran out of his house shouting "Hurrah for Jeff Davis."

The battle was the last significant Confederate offensive in West Virginia and the Confederate goals of disrupting the Federal communications were thwarted.

## Commission Hears About Region VII Work; Sheriff to Hire Chief Deputy

Shane Whitehair, Executive Director of Region VII Planning and Development Council was one of the first to appear before the Braxton County Commission at their Regular meeting last Friday, October 14. Whitehair gave the Commissioners a rundown on the services his agency provides directly to Braxton County in lieu of the \$14,000 paid annually to the organization.

Sheriff Lou DellaMea also spoke to the Commission. He requested permission to advertise for the position of Chief Deputy Sheriff. He outlined the duties of the position saying, the successful applicant would be the direct supervisor of all subordinate deputy sheriffs. They would prepare work schedules and other reports for the Sheriff's approval. The applicant must be a certified policy officer with supervisory experience. DellaMea stated that the starting salary would be \$32,500 annually. A motion by Larry Clifton gave the Sheriff permission to begin the search.

Whitehair presented the Commission with reports detailing the activities of his agencies for the month of September. That report revealed that Braxton Control had fielded 2,253 calls during the time period. Of those, 496 were for law enforcement; 87 were fire related and 172 were for EMS assistance.

In other action, Melvin Gum made a motion to approve the probate appointment as presented by the Fiduciary Supervisor.

The Commission approved applications for correction of erroneous assessments for the following: Angela Bedunah, John McCoy, Alice or Brian White, Audra Starkey, Sue Toler and Emily Rogers.

A single purchase order request was approved on a motion by Melvin Gum. The 9-1-1 Center will pay Bay Power Solutions \$1,137.44 for emergency repairs to the facility's diesel generator.

The Commission approved the financial statement for the year ending July 30, 2022 as presented by the County Clerk.

Following a brief discussion Larry Clifton made a motion to in-

crease the contribution for county employees from one half to the full \$35 amount for the basic panel at the Rotary Blood Screening.

The Commission reviewed and approved a request to reappoint Jack Friend to a seat on the Board of Directors of the Flatwood-Canoe Run PSD Board.

After reviewing the commercial Dog Breeder Permit proposal, the Commission agreed to move forward with holding two public hearing regarding the proposal as required by State Code. The date and time of those hearing will be announced.

Following a review, Melvin Gum made a motion to pay the County and EMS bills as presented.

A separate motion approved the minutes of the Commission's regular meeting on September 19 and special meeting on September 28.

Being no further business to consider, the meeting adjourned at 9:18 a.m. The next regularly scheduled meeting will convene at 9:00 a.m. on October 21.

## Fourteen Individuals Indicted by Grand Jury

On Tuesday, October 4, the October term of the Braxton County Grand Jury convened with the Honorable Richard A. Facemire, Circuit Court Judge presiding. The jury returned indictments against 14 individuals on a total of 44 various charges. Braxton County Prosecuting Attorney Jasmine R.H. Morton presented the witnesses and evidence against the following individuals to the grand jury on behalf of the state.

Cody Earl Hinerman, 25 of Fairmont, was indicted on the felony charge of aiding escape and other offenses relating to adults in custody or confinement. On April 6, the defendant's cell mate at Central Regional Jail was transported to Braxton County Memorial Hospital with a possible overdose. After interviewing the cell mate, jail officials learned that Hinerman came into CRJ with three small black rubber glove fingers containing fentanyl in a body cavity. CPL P.A. Huff was the investigating officer.

Jennifer Trudy Malcomb, 34 of French Creek and Roy David Rhodes, 43 of Sutton are facing charges of possession of methamphetamine with intent to deliver and conspiracy. CPL J.D. Jordan, II was attempting to locate Malcomb on an escape warrant out of Lewis County on May 18. He located Malcomb and Rhodes at the Laurel Court Motel. While searching the room, officers found plastic bags and glass vials containing a white powdery substance that field tested positive for meth and a digital weight scale.

Jeremy Wayne Hudson, 44 of Charleston was indicted on attempt to commit grand larceny and destruction of property. SR TPR C.D. Harper responded to a complaint of an individual attempting to steal of vehicle. The trooper located the suspect on scene in the car with a broken driver's rear side window.

Brian Keith Louk, 50 of Burnsville was charged with driving while license revoked for driving under the influence, 3rd or subsequent offense. On May 28, Burnsville Patrolman Matthew M. Kesling initiated a traffic stop on a vehicle with malfunctioning brake lights on a trailer. The driver, Louk, admitted to the officer that his license was suspended.

Hannibal Taft Ryan, IV, 25 of Spencer has been indicted on the charges of fleeing with reckless indifference and fraudulent registration. On July 14, Deputy Andrew Jordan tried to conduct a traffic stop on a vehicle with a defective exhaust and fraudulent registration. The vehicle failed to stop and went over 100 mph on I-79. The vehicle slid into a ditch after leaving the interstate before the deputy was able to get Ryan into custody.

Matthew Ben Hamrick, 38 of Gassaway was indicted on burglary and petit larceny charges. Deputy Luke Johnson responded to a burglary complaint in Gassaway on August 25. Video footage from a neighbor led to the suspect's arrest.

John Bradley Meadows, 50 of Exchange has been charged with wanton endangerment involving a firearm and robbery

or attempted robbery. On September 9, 2021, Deputy Cleve Westfall and other officer responded to a call for law enforcement by the defendant. Meadows stated a woman had come to his house at 10:30 pm to buy corn. When officers went to the woman's residence, she was visibly shaken. She told officers she had stopped to buy for her pigs when the suspect came out of his home shooting a gun. He then forced her to give him her wallet.

James Allen Stewart, 64 of Sutton was indicted on six charges, two counts of conspiracy, deliver of fentanyl, possession of fentanyl with intent to deliver, possession of methamphetamine with intent to deliver, and possession of suboxone with intent to deliver. On March 25, Deputy Andrew Groves and other law enforcement officers served a search warrant after officers had conducted several controlled buys from his residence. Fentanyl, meth and suboxone were found at the home. Also charged through this investigation, were Robert Ray Jones, 32 of Gassaway and Britney Marion McEvers, 33 of Sutton. Jones has been charged with two counts of conspiracy, two counts of delivery of heroin. McEvers was indicted on nine charges, four counts of conspiracy, two counts of delivery of fentanyl, and one count each of possession with intent to deliver for fen-

tanyl, methamphetamine, and suboxone.

Jessica Ann Taylor, 40 of Summersville was indicted on the charge of

aiding escape and other offenses relating to adults in custody or confinement after entering the jail with methamphetamine in early 2022. WVSP CPL George Jones presented the evidence to the grand jury.

Donald Lee Bowers, 45 of Napier has been indicted on the following charges, two counts each of burglary, grand larceny, and prohibited person in possession of a firearm, and one count of fleeing with reckless indifference. In June and July BCSD deputies responded to several calls referencing burglaries in the Napier area. The investigation led them to Bowers as the suspect after witnesses saw him with stolen items in his possession.

Michael Edward Neal, 28 of Chloe was indicted by the grand jury on grand larceny and conspiracy charges. On June 22, CPL F.L. Raynor was in the Duck area where he was stopped by an individual who informed him that he just had culverts stolen from his property. The investigation led the trooper to Neal who then admitted he had taken them to a residence in Calhoun County.

# Legislative Update

So, my favorite month of the year certainly lived up to my expectations last weekend in central West Virginia. It reminded me of what many of us had to memorize and recite in elementary school: October's Bright Blue Weather. In sixth grade at the old Davis Grade School, we were required to memorize and recite a different work each month, ranging from Lincoln's Gettysburg Address; the 23rd Psalm; 'Twas the Night Before Christmas, and other works our teacher, Mrs. Ressie Boggs Canfield, determined we needed to commit to memory. She was a wise and wonderful teacher and one of my favorites, but I never fully appreciated her until I became an adult. I had twelve years of outstanding and dedicated public school teachers, administrators, and staff, including many more amazing instructors and professors at Glenville State.

Also, this coming weekend is the Glenville State University Homecoming, with multiple events on campus and around Glenville. With graduates and friends coming home to GSU for the celebration, it's an exciting time to see old friends and take note of the great facilities, improvements, changes, and programs that are important to today's students of all ages.

I was excited to hear the news of Glenville State grad and long-time BCHS wrestling coach, Sterling Beane, being selected for induction into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame. I can think of no one more deserving or that has contributed more to coaching, mentoring, and encouraging our

BCHS athletes to achieve above and beyond. Sterling's accomplishments and accolades over his 50-year career are many and well-deserved. He is a legend among wrestlers and coaches across the state. Growing up in Gassaway, I've had the great privilege of knowing Coach Beane and his family for as long as I can remember. Along with the late Coach Jack White, he and Sterling looked after the kids in the community as lifeguards at the now-closed swimming pool.

Hundreds of student-athletes owe him a debt of gratitude through teaching, coaching, and driving the athletic bus, which played a great part in kids being able to participate in sports in a rural county. Congratulations Coach Beane. We are so proud and appreciative of what you have done and continue to do for students, athletes, and our citizens in Braxton County and across the State.

Having discussed the possible pitfalls and potential benefits of Amendment 2 on the November ballot last week, it's time to delve into another constitutional change that will be up to voters in November.

Amendment 4. Here is a brief summary: In 1982, the modern West Virginia Administrative Procedure Act was enacted and required the State Board of Education to comply with the rulemaking requirements along with most state agencies. A W.Va. Supreme Court decision found based on the language in this section that provided that the Board supervise state schools, that the rulemaking authority of the Board was not subject to legislative review. In 1988, the Leg-

islature enacted W.Va. §29B-1-1 to establish an alternative process where the Legislature reviewed but did not authorize Board of Education rules.

Adoption of Amendment 4 would allow the Legislature to bring the Board's rulemaking authority under the purview of the Legislature to an expanded level of oversight.

Amendment 4 would give – for the first time – the Legislature the ability to approve, reject or modify policies of the WV State Board of Education. Like Amendment 2, this change gives me great pause for concern. While I do not necessarily agree with every decision made by the State Board of Education or the WV Department of Education, giving the Legislature the last word on all things educational may well be a major overreach. This would give the legislative branch far too much power over an area that I believe should be made by educators and parents, not a partisan legislative body that may have an agenda not in line with those of local boards of education and parents, grandparents, and guardians for our students.

As with Amendment 2 providing the ability to circumvent local control over property taxation, Amendment 4 will likewise diminish the decision-making by the State Board of Education and wrest some local control away from local school boards. Everyone needs to assess the possible ramifications of Amendment 4. Handing over the final word on all things educational to one hundred thirty-four legislators may be popular today but no guarantee of your voice will be heard down the road.

# On the Other Side of the Mountain

We all are familiar with the saying that we should walk a mile in the moccasins of another person in order to understand him or her. The saying means that before you judge another man or woman, you should walk in his or her shoes for a mile. It is a call for empathy. The word "shoes" at some time replaced the original word "moccasins" when this pearl of wisdom was attributed to various Indian tribes, but its true source comes from a poem written by Mary T. Lathrop in 1895. Its original title was "Judge Softly". If you are interested, you can search for her poem on the net, it is truly beautiful. We need to learn again, the content of this poem and try to practice it, more than any other time.

I have always thought that I can only understand another person's behavior if I had the same experience in my life. Our actions depend on what happens to us. The experiences determine who we become and who we are. Only then can we realize what others go through and hopefully we will find empathy and sensibility with our fellow human being. There is one situation where walking the mile or ten miles in somebody else's shoes does not work. As much as a man can try, he has absolutely no idea what it means to be a woman. He never had monthly menstrual cycles for at least 30 years where hormones play havoc with some women's lives. A man cannot get pregnant, give birth, and again become flooded with bonding hormones. Nothing is more complex, multifaceted and personal as being pregnant. I am so fed up with all the commentaries about abortion. Everybody has their own beliefs and that is fine with me, but don't impose your beliefs or ideology on me. If we cannot decide what is happening with our body and health, be it male or female, it becomes a human rights issue.

It is time to order flowers (bulbs) for next year. There is nothing like discovering snowdrops and early crocuses in late February and early march to lift our spirits and to celebrate the end of winter. It is magical. I usually don't see the leaves appearing, but when the first flowers turn the ground into an enchanting purple carpet or a secret white corner, the world seems wondrous. Bulbs that need to be planted in spring can be bought anywhere right now, in hardware, dollar stores and garden centers, but this is one time I prefer to have access to catalogs that offer the greatest choice of varieties. Brecks, Jung's, van Bourgondien, Michigan bulbs, Gurneys and Scheepers, are just some that come to mind. It is best to plant these fall bulbs in late October, or early November while the soil temperatures are around 40 to 50 degrees, about 6 weeks before the ground freezes. They need cool, moist autumn soil to awaken their dormancy, which starts by growing roots to be ready for the marvelous spring bloom. There should be good drainage. The bulbs you purchase should be fresh and firm, not showing any mold or soft or rotten spots. These will be the first spring flowers providing pollen and nectar for our local polli-

nators.

Let's start with the earliest candidates, the snowdrops and the early crocuses. Plant them 3" to 4" deep in a sunny location. Set out several bulbs within the same location, kind of in a circle. It has a greater effect when they start blooming in a bunch. Keep in mind, that they will multiply over the years. Snowdrops are deer and vole resistant while crocuses are a favorite for deer above ground and for squirrels and voles underground. If the crocuses seem to move around from season to season, the squirrels and voles eat some corms and move some around. Be prepared for surprises. Crocuses sprout from corms, not bulbs, but that is just a minor detail.

Late crocuses, tulips and daffodils are the next generation of spring flowers (true bulbs) to intoxicate our senses. Both should be planted at a depth of 6". Nothing ever bothers our daffodils, but I have given up on tulips, since squirrels and voles consider them the tastiest item on the all you can eat buffet. The next flowers are Irises. They grow from rhizomes. They are hardy, prolific, and beautiful. They usually bloom at the same time as grape hyacinths and alliums (ornamental onions). We have some of them along the driveway near the house and they have

been here long before we moved in with them. It is not just the oak-maple-poplar-and cherry trees that will outlive us here, the allium is just as tough and persistent, even when much smaller and disappearing for a season.

Do not feed bulbs high nitrogen fertilizer. In spring, after they finish blooming, sprinkle some bone meal around the plants. Let them turn yellow and die down naturally. During this time, they should accumulate nutrients in their bulbs to burst out into their beauty the following spring.

The hellebore plant can also be planted in fall, but only as long as the ground is not frozen. Hellebores can also be planted in early spring. While many spring bulbs are fairly affordable, hellebore plants are pretty expensive but worth every penny for their stunning beauty.

# WV WIC Announces Increase in Cash-Value Benefits

West Virginia's Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WV WIC), within the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources' Bureau for Public Health, announced a monthly increase in Cash-Value Benefits (CVB) for WV WIC participants. The increase is funded to states by the United States Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service through a federal continuing resolution.

Effective October 1, 2022, WV WIC will issue the following increased CVB benefits per month:

Pregnant women (single child) and non-breastfeeding, postpartum women will receive \$44.00.

Pregnant women of twins will receive

\$49.00.

Fully and partially breastfeeding women (single child) will receive \$49.00.

Fully breastfeeding women (multiple children) will receive \$73.50.

Partially breastfeeding women (multiple children) will receive \$49.00.

Minimally breastfeeding and non-breastfeeding postpartum women will receive \$44.00.

A child 12 months through age five will receive \$25.00.

"The increase in benefits prioritizes consistent access to nutritious foods for all WIC participants," said Heidi Staats, director of the West Virginia WIC program. "As our state continues to navigate increased costs and supply chain issues, this vital assistance en-

ures that new parents can introduce their children to new varieties of foods at a critical time for the development of taste preferences."

Aside from nutrition benefits, WIC also provides nutrition counseling, parenting advice, breastfeeding support, food assistance and referral support to help families live healthier lives. # Why I Ride



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## The miracle motorcycle

Let me go back in time and give you information that will help explain the mystery behind my miracle bike.

Back in July 2010, BMW Motorrad unveiled at the Internet Motorcycle show in Cologne, the BMW K1600GT and K1600GTL models, each equipped with a 1649cc, 160-horsepower in-line six engine, one of the greatest production motorcycle engines ever produced. Meant to replace the K1200LT, and compete with the Honda Goldwing, the features and prices of the bikes were not revealed until sometime in February 2011. The rumors and news leaks made the anticipation and hunger for these bikes fly off the scale. Once this information was made available to the public, the demand for the bikes was so great that BMW established a

presale program to ensure that dealers would be able to fill the pre-orders. Here's the deal, you put your deposit down, and then wait and hope that you actually get a bike sometime in the near future. BMW aimed to produce a very limited number of these bikes. The motorcycles destined for customers that backed out of the deal were to be shipped back to other dealers for sale to those that had placed a deposit by the February 28, 2011 deadline. Remember this because it is a key piece of information that will come into play later.

When I moved to Sutton in 2007, I brought my 1988 HD Heritage Classic Softail. Loved that bike. I lived in Miami previous to moving here, so I rode the bike nearly every day. Took it to my first trip to Sturgis in 2000. Did the Iron Butt SaddleSore 1000 in 2001.

Loved the bike.

Caught BMW fever from Mike Gioulis, who has owned a long lists of BMW motorcycles. The sickness led me to purchase a 2004 BMW R1200 CLC, one of BMW's first cruisers, manufactured from 1997-2004. Got it at a dealership in Pennsylvania and trailered it to Sutton. This bike was a workhorse of a motorcycle. It felt glued to the highway, and its 60 horsepower, 1170 cc Oil-Head Boxer motor could reach a top speed of 102.5 mph. Loved this bike too. Felt as though I owned the road while riding it. Travel everywhere with it. Where am I going with this you say? Now the plot thickens. I promise you it will all come together soon.

Sunday, August 14, 2011, a clear, sunny, beautiful West-by-God Virginia morning, I leave Sutton on one of my long-ass trips which will make a loop from WV to South Dakota, Colorado, Arizona, Florida, and many points in between before looping back to Sutton. Perfect riding weather: eight-hour-plus trip to a Best Western in Fairview Heights, IL, to continue Monday to Missouri to visit some friends from Miami. Getting off I64 exit 12 for Fairview

Heights, I feel the back of the loaded bike fishtailing. Thinking I got a flat, I slowed the heck down and hobbled over to the hotel, a couple of hundred feet off the exit. After parking at the hotel, a quick view reveals a back tire full of gear oil. The CLC is a shaft-driven bike, so, the differential had gone wacko. Not so bad. I didn't crash, especially since I was doing over 80 on the highway, and the hotel was close to the exit. So, I checked in, ate, and it's Sunday, so nothing moves. I found Gateway BMW, a mere 13 miles away in St. Louis, MO, and guess what? Also closed on Monday! Spent Monday watching TV, talking to the hotel staff, and booking a tow truck for Tuesday morning.

Now comes my very favorite part. Tow the bike to Gateway, unload it at the service bay, and go inside to talk. On my way in, I see about six giant crates lined up outside the service area. Curious me asks what they contain, and the person informed me that they were freshly delivered K1600GTLs, destined for some lucky buyers. I did not aim to buy a new bike, not for a while anyway. So, I grunted and moved on. The service department was gracious enough to take care of me now since I was traveling through. About 45 minutes later, a service tech comes out to see me holding a bucket full of oil and a bunch of metal gears. He advised me that I had blown the rear end and needed replacing. After the initial shock, I asked what that entails, to which he replied, "let me check." He comes back the second time and says: "I located one in Germany, it will


cost \$1500, and I can have it here in 15 days." Now my mouth is really wide open. 15 days??? My choices included having someone come pick me up from Sutton, or rent a car, continue the trip as planned, and pick up the bike on the return trip. I went for a walk inside the sales floor. Now remember what I said about buying a K1600 earlier, one bike, one buyer. As I moped around the floor thinking, the General Sales Manager, Bob Honz, really cool Dude, asks me if there was anything he could do to help me. I looked up at him, smiled, and jokingly said: "yes, do you have a K1600GTL that I can buy?" He thought for a second and said: "As a matter of fact, I do." In disbelief, I looked straight into his eyes and said: "Don't f--- with me now! Are you serious?" He said, "yea, one of the buyers is going through a divorce and cannot buy the bike." I said: "well, what about having to return the bike to BMW?" "You don't have to worry about that" he said. We sat down, worked out the details. Gave me a good trade-in price on my damaged bike, split the cost of the \$800 GPS with me, (not a good time for me to barter!). He loaned me a brand-new R1200GS to go back to the hotel and told me to come back tomorrow afternoon and

pickup my new 2012 Silver K1600GTL.


I keep repeating to everyone about how blessed I am. Not only did I not get killed on the highway, but I also ride out on a bike that was impossible to get!

I took the long way back to the hotel. The GS is a really fun bike to ride. It's the type of bike that everyone suggested I take to Alaska. It's an adventure bike, at home on or off the road.
