WV Caring to Host Tree Lighting November 30

The public is invited to the West Virginia Caring's Annual Tree Lighting Ceremony which will be held on Wednesday, November 30th at 1:00 PM at Braxton Memorial Hospital.

The holiday season is upon us, and it is a very special opportunity to celebrate life. Area residents can remember loved ones who have passed away or honor those living and those who are suffering illnesses. WV Caring's annual "Light up a Life" event begins now and continues through the end of December.

"Light up a Life is a tradition and it's also one of our biggest fundraisers of the year. By supporting Light up a Life, you are making a significant difference in the lives of our families, friends, and neighbors, who need the expert care that we provide, and they deserve," said Cynthia Woodyard, Vice President of Public Affairs and Access.

It is easy to participate with several options; Individuals can purchase a the "Partridge in a Pear Tree" keepsake ornament for \$35, or the hand-blown, glass lace heart for \$20. The ornaments can be mailed directly to you or sent to anyone that could use a little "light" in their life. Several Head to Jail After Circuit Court Appearances

Several Braxton County Circuit Court hearings have been completed by the Honorable Judge Richard A. Facemire. Braxton County Prosecuting Attorney Jasmine R.H. Morton represented the state during the court proceedings. As a result, four individuals will be service jail time while a fifth awaits trial.

On September 19, Bailey James Fleming and attorney Kevin Hughart came before Judge Facemire for a sentencing hearing. The defense requested an alternative sentence stating Fleming had taken responsibility for his actions and was sorry for what had happened. The state remained silent per the plea agreement. The state, however did read a letter to the court from the victim and the victim's mother. The court stated the defendant had failed to take responsibility for his actions. Therefore, the court denied the motion. Bailey was sentenced to one to five years on the two felony counts of sexual assault in the third degree.

On September 15, Steven Dennis Deal came before the court with his

attorney Jonathan Fittro for a hearing on probation revocation. The defendant admitted to allegations contained in the petition. Judge Facemire revoked his probation based on his admission. The court stated he had failed to take responsibility for his actions. On the felony offense of driving while license revoked-3rd offense, Deal was sentenced to one to three years.

On September 12, Cameron Wade Crites appeared with his attorney David Karickhoff before Judge Facemire for probation revocation. Tyler Morlan was present on behalf of the Braxton County Probation Office. The court revoked the defendant's probation after he admitted to allegation contained in the petition for revocation. The defense requested he be given another opportunity on probation. The state recommended Crites be sentenced to the Anthony Center for Youthful Offenders. After reviewing the case, the court suspended the sentences for burglary and destruction of property. Crites is to be sent to the Anthony Center for a period of not less

than six months and is to successfully complete the program.

Dustan Brice Stewart came to court for a hearing on probation revocation. He was represented by Jonathan Fittro and Morlan was also present from the probation office. The defendant admitted to allegations in the petition for revocation. Stewart's probation was revoked by the court. Both the defense and the state agreed to allow the defendant to be re-admitted to probation, however the state asked he served 60 days incarceration. Judge Facemire suspended the sentence, with the exception of 60 days, for illegal possession of destructive devices, explosive materials or incendiary devices and placed Stewart on five years of probation.

On October 11, Hannibal Taft Ryan, IV appeared in court with his attorney Bernard Mauser for an arraignment hearing. The defendant entered a not guilty plea to the two counts in the indictment, fleeing with reckless indifference and fraudulent registration. A jury trial has been set for January 10.

Health Students Participate in Rural Community experience

Thirteen students pursuing various health professions degrees participated in an interdisciplinary rural immersion experience at the Normantown Historical Community Center on Friday, November 11 and the Mountaineer Food Bank on Saturday, November 12. The two-day experience was designed to immerse students in a rural community while gaining knowledge about a local topic. In partnership with WVU Extension, the students participated in hands-on learning activities related to food preservation (canning and freezing), food insecurity, chronic disease, and cooking on a budget.

NHCC volunteer, Sandra Beall, showcased the Center's opportunities including the sewing room, the free clothing closet, the food distribution site,

meeting rooms and endless options for residents to volunteer or utilize the Center. Friday evening, students traveled to Sutton and enjoyed dining on the river at the Elk River Café followed by axe throwing at the Bad Axe Bistro and lodging at the Days Inn.

On Saturday, November 12, students toured the Mountaineer Food Bank in Gassaway, a member of Feeding America. The Mountaineer Food Bank partners with feeding programs in 48 West Virginia counties to distribute over 23 million pounds of food annually to combat food insecurity. The students participated in Mountaineer Food Bank's Volunteer Saturday held on the second Saturday every month and packed 234 food boxes that will be distributed to seniors.

This event was hosted

by Northern West Virginia Rural Health Education Center, one of five regional Area Health Education Centers in West Virginia. The mission of the non-profit organization headquartered in Glenville and serving 23 counties is to train, recruit, and retain health care professionals in underserved areas.

School System Explains Procedure for Weather Related School Closing

One of the most difficult and least understood decisions facing the administrative staff of the Braxton County School System is deciding whether to close, dismiss, or delay school due to hazardous weather. Because weather and road conditions will sometimes change between the evening hours and the time that school commences, many times a decision cannot be made until 4:00-5:00 in the morning. What would appear to be hazardous conditions at 9:00 pm may change during the night depending on temperatures and the amount of work that the

department of highway crews can accomplish.

To make the decision, a definitive approach is taken. The weather is monitored through the National Weather Service, through local weather apps, and through communication with the department of highways, the office of emergency services, and the bus operators located in various positions throughout the county. The director of operations then shares this information with the superintendent and the decision is made by the two of them.

If the decision is made to close school, delay start, or dismiss early,

an announcement will be made as soon as possible on Braxton County Schools' calling system, social media sites, local radio and television stations, the board website (<https://boe.brax.k12.wv.us>) and on the West Virginia Department of Education website (<http://wvde.state.wv.us>).

Each bus is equipped with chains, and the operator is instructed, "When in doubt, chain up." The operator also has the option of deciding whether to make all sections of his or her run. If, in the operator's opinion, conditions in the area are hazardous, he or she is to notify families of the inclement

weather plan.

Finally, part of the decision must be made by the parent. Does the parent consider the conditions to be too dangerous? Is the length of time waiting for the school bus excessive? An absence due to parental discretion regarding inclement weather conditions shall be considered as an excused absence provided the parent submits a written excuse to the school. The school shall not penalize students but shall provide the opportunity for missing work to be made up.



Legislative Update

This Sunday evening is quite a contrast from last week's interim meetings at Cacapon State Park near Berkeley Springs. Monday morning is the opening day of deer season 2022, so I'm preparing to head to Bonnie with Justin and Carson. It's going to be a cold opening morning. Deer season and opening day are traditions in our family and one that's firmly established with our grandkids. Some of my best memories revolve around opportunities to spend time with family and friends afield hunting or on our beautiful lakes and streams fishing.

This week, there will be hundreds of thousands of hunters in the woods from across West Virginia and surrounding states that will be heading into some of the prime white-tail deer hunting counties, including all of central West Virginia. They will also be boosting our local economy in grocery stores, restaurants, and convenience stores throughout deer season — especially during the first week. And a good deer harvest is critical to effective game management and a healthy deer herd for the future.

If you're successful hunting this week, consider donating your harvest to one of the processing centers that work with Mountaineer Food Bank and the Hunters Helping the Hungry program. This wonderfully successful program is funded by donations from hunters and other benefactors to provide ground venison to individuals and families in need across West Virginia. A list of drop-off points can be accessed on-line at the WV DNR website or by calling Mountaineer Food Bank at 304-364-5518.

Since the inception of the program, hunters, financial contributors, and participating processors have enabled the processing of 28,145 deer. With their generosity and the assistance of two area food banks, 1,070,504 pounds of highly nutritious meat has been provided to needy families and individuals throughout West Virginia, distributed through their statewide network of 600 charitable food

pantries, soup kitchens, senior centers, shelters, community centers, orphanages, missions, and churches. That's a great way to share the blessing of a successful deer harvest with others.

The interim meeting schedule at Cacapon was packed with meetings and information in preparation for the 2023 Legislative session, set to begin at noon on January 11. One of the meetings having the most impact on our county governments was the last meeting last Tuesday evening with the information shared at the Joint Committee on Regional Jails and Correctional Facilities.

Since the transition decades ago away from county jails to the ten regional jails across West Virginia, counties have shouldered the greatest financial burden. While state and federal inmates are also housed in regional jails until space opens for transfers to their respective facilities, both the state and federal prisons reimburse regional jails at a higher per diem rate than municipalities and counties pay. However, many counties devote between ten and twenty percent of their county budgets to paying the per diem rate. Since regional jails are classified as special revenue facilities, the revenue generated by per diem payments pays to operate the facilities. Currently, the per diem rate for county prisoners is \$48.25 per day.

To assist in helping with the county payments, various methods were put in place to lessen the burden, including supplementing operating revenues to keep the per diem rate artificially low.

However, that is set to expire in July 2023, at which time the rate will increase to \$54.48 per day as calculated by the State Budget Director. While that does not sound like a major increase, consider the following: The average days of incarceration between pretrial status and convicted status currently is 251 days, with the financial burden passed to the state after conviction. Further, officials from DCR have calculated that approximately 80% of the pretrial detainees are arrested because of a substance abuse disorder or co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorder. It is worth noting that Regional Jails are detention facilities and not substance abuse or mental health treatment facilities.

There are several potential ways to ease the financial burden on counties without endangering public safety by releasing dangerous pretrial detainees on bond for violent crimes. One way would be to shift the staff pay and benefits away from special revenue and over to general revenue. This alone would save millions to counties. And with the high revenue surpluses at record levels, there is no reason why this cannot be accomplished. It certainly makes more sense than some of the suggestions I've seen floated recently.

Other areas that can be better utilized: bond reforms; cost-sharing measures; increased use of community corrections and work release for non-violent offenders; elimination of excessive pretrial delays; more emphasis on substance use disorders and treatment.

These are real dollars that directly impact the ability of our counties to fund services and needs. I hope this administration and legislative leadership will not delay in seeking to implement many of the recommendations by the interim committee report.

Argyle was a 1948 graduate of Sutton High School and received a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree from West Virginia University.

Argyle, after a long career as a banker, later worked selling supplies to his banker friends, and as a real estate agent and co-owner of Kaufman Real Estate, Inc. Argyle was an accomplished musician, a Braves fan, and a lifelong lover of learning, who often referred to himself as a "repository of useless information." He loved meeting new people and made friends easily; he often gave people he met his "business card" that stated his business to be, among other things, Russian history, ragtime piano, and barbershop singing. In his teens and twenties, he performed in and around Braxton County in a band called The Dixiecats. Later in life, he appeared on a recording of old-time fiddle tunes, acted in amateur productions, and performed with and directed barbershop choruses and quartets locally, and in both Cleveland and Chattanooga, Tennessee. In his late sixties, while keeping his Bridgeport home, he also maintained an apartment in Chattanooga so that he could sing there.

Argyle is survived by his daughter, Kelly Anne Kaufman; his son Kevin Scott Kaufman and his wife Wanda; his step-grandson Brad McPherson, Brad's wife, April, and their children Bethany, Sean, Joshua, and Patrick; his step-grandson Adam McPherson, Adam's wife Lena, and their children Emily, Lucas, and Chelsea; his older brother, Robert G. 

The weather has been unpredictable this fall. We had a few fires going in October, but a warm spell set in, making the broccoli grow again and triggering the blueberry bushes and azaleas to sprout like it would be spring. Great to experience chilly conditions at the moment, but as the saying goes there is no such thing as bad weather, you dress accordingly. I am not quite ready for all the bulky stuff to keep me from freezing when doing morning chores, but there comes a point when my stubbornness gives in.

Thanksgiving is just a few days away as I am writing this with a roasted turkey, Brussels sprouts, sweet potatoes, green beans, pumpkin and apple pie being prepared for the yearly feasts. This is the culinary part of Thanksgiving, but we should not forget that it is meant to give thanks. I have learned over the years that being thankful invokes a feeling of contentment, gratitude for what we have and experience. I am thankful to have Greg, to have friends, to have a roof over our head, to have enough to eat, to have goats, sheep and Sandor to make an emotional connection, to be able to tend to a garden, to admire beautiful flowers when in season, to live in a state as beautiful as West Virginia. It is special as far as beauty is concerned and every season evokes new marvel and adulation for the differences how it presents itself. I left my country because I married Greg. I felt familiar with European culture and Switzerland had a lot to offer, opportunity, familiarity, excellent educational system, security and phenomenal, natural beauty. I had no reason to leave, but Greg became that reason. If one does not emigrate as a family or part of a family, one enters a complete new situation, new language, new social behaviors and one is separated from all the family in the "old" country, trying hard to communicate and to fit in. As I have gotten older, my family in Switzerland passed away, one by one and I started feeling kind of "lost", at least not having any family. Of course I am aware that family can have many aspects, interfering with each other, there can be jealousy, disconnection, dispute. Family is not this marvelous, heavenly unit we all imagine it to be.

I have to admit that we experienced "family" in the best sense one can think of. This coming Thanksgiving will be the best one we ever celebrated. Greg was in the hospital and all our friends offered help and assistance with anything, at anytime. These were not just empty offers, but I learned that we have family, true family like the one we dream of. I cant thank all of them enough for caring and showing love. I thought this was rare today, but we were taught differently. We are deeply thankful to each one of you.

Benefits of joining some organizations



That be me at Daytona Bike Week. I was Treasurer of ABATE of Florida, Southeast Chapter.

Thanksgiving week column. I have everything to be grateful for in my life. My parents taught me to understand that no matter how bad a situation is, it can always be worse. Accepting this thought keeps me humble, in addition to grateful. According to Psychology Today, there are seven scientifically proven benefits as to why we should be grateful everyday, not just on Thanksgiving Day. 1- Gratitude opens the door to more relationships; 2- Gratitude improves physical health; 3- Gratitude improves psychological health; 4- Gratitude enhances empathy and reduces aggression; 5- Grateful individuals sleep better;

6- Gratitude improves self-esteem; and 7- Gratitude increases mental strength. Turn gratitude into a daily habit. Appreciation requires not taking everything for granted. On to motorcycle organizations we are grateful to have around. First on my list is the American Automobile Association, (AAA); Surely you've heard of it. AAA offers services which include towing, gas delivery, locksmith, discounts and

rewards, insurance, financial, and travel agency services, and so much more. I have the AAA Premier RV/Motorcycle Roadside assistance membership which covers one tow a year of up to 200 miles and other tows up to 100 miles, one-day car rental with a tow, 24-hour concierge service, motorcycle towing, extrication, and winching; and up to \$500 per motorcycle service call. The standard benefits apply to cars also. I have been a member of AAA for 44 years. Thankfully, have not used it much, except for the trip planning service, which has been available online for a while now. However, when I had the unfortunate opportunity to use it, it was a Godsend.

The American Motorcyclist Association is my next pick. I like the AMA because of their involvement in protecting our freedom to ride. The AMA has an online Action Center where "you can find legislative report portals at all levels of government to review, make an informed decision and then take action all in one place. Read our position statements, subscribe to action alerts, review our legislative scorecard, and then join in the discussion on our social media sites." There are more than 1,200 AMA Clubs nationwide. It also offers roadside assistance which includes towing, lock-out, dead battery, flat tire, and fluid delivery. In addition, one gets a monthly American Motorcyclist Magazine, members-only discounts on parts, gear, and accessories, and members-only online access, where one may find the latest motorcycle industry news, buy and sell motorcycles, and read gear reviews. The AMA sponsors

many events including the AMA Motorcycle Hall of Fame Bike Nights, AMA Vintage Motorcycle Days, AMA Motorcycle Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony, and the Mission Foods AMA Flat Track Grand Championship. The AMA also sponsors many racing activities including Enduro, Off-Road, and Flat Track Racing. The AMA maintains the Motorcycle Hall of Fame Museum in Pickerington, Ohio "recognizing individuals who have contributed to motorcycle sport, motorcycle construction, or motorcycling in general. It also displays motorcycles, riding gear, and memorabilia."

There are SMROs, State Motorcyclists' Rights Organizations in about 32 states. About 25 of these SMROs are called ABATE. ABATE is an acronym which originally stood for "A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments" and alternatively stands for "American Bikers Against Totalitarian Enactments", "A Brotherhood Aimed Towards Education", "American Bikers for Awareness, Training & Education", "American Bikers Aimed Towards Education", "American Bikers Advocating Training & Education" with other combination used. I prefer the "American Bikers Aimed Towards Education" because it emphasizes the education of all vehicle operators to co-exist with, or to share the road with motorcycles. ABATE serves as an advocate for motorcyclists' rights and to monitor legislation that might restrict the sport of motorcycling. For a while, I served as Treasurer for the ABATE of Florida, Southeast Chapter. Though a monthly magazine, the chapter keeps the members informed of changing legislation, events, and rides. Our chapter taught motorcycle awareness in High School driver education classes. We also held events to benefit many local charities, toy runs, weekend rides, and supported many local motorcycle clubs.

There are many other brand-specific motorcycle clubs and organizations, including the Christian Motorcyclists Association, the Harley Owner's Group (H.O.G.), BMW Motorcycle Owners of America (BMW-MOA), the Honda Riders Club of America, the British Motorcycle Owners Association, Yamaha Owners Club, Kawasaki Motorcycle Clubs, and so on.

In addition to receiving the benefits that are part of membership, one gets a chance to share experiences with fellow riders, become interactive in support groups, and promote the safe and enjoyable sport of motorcycling.
