



Argyle, after a long career as a banker, later worked selling supplies to his banker friends, and as a real estate agent and coowner of Kaufman Real Estate, Inc. Argyle was an accomplished musician, a Braves fan, and a lifelong lover of learning, who often referred to himself as a "repository of useless information." He loved meeting new people and made friends easily; he often gave people he met his "business card" that stated his business to be, among other things, Russian history, ragtime piano, and barbershop singing. In his teens and twenties, he pertormed in and around Braxton County in a band called The Dixiecats. Later in life, he appeared on a recording of old-time fiddle tunes, acted in amateur formed with and directed barbershop choruses and quartets locally, and in both Cleveland and Chattanooga, Tennesee. In his late sixties, while keeping his Bridgeport home, he also maintained an apartment in Chattanooga so that he could sing there. Argyle is survived by



Of course I am aware that family can have many aspects, interfering with each other, there can be jealousy, disconnection, dispute. 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
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
