These last few days with night temperatures in the low twenties or teens killed everything in the garden that was not protected by tarps or blankets. When we cover crops we want to save for a little bit longer, it does not work to just throw a tarp or blankets over them, there needs to be an airspace in between. We use concrete reinforcement wire that we cut in pieces, so sections, then bending them into bows to stretch over the crop we intend to protect. Oak trees have not only Federal law requires an industrial value, but they are also an ecological powerhouse, producing acorns that nourish squirrels, turkeys, deer, bears, birds, leaves, and blossoms that insects depend on. In the past twenty years scientists have started to not just do research on the above-growth and development of trees but also on the area below the soil level. They found out that there are relationships between trees and fungi. Chanterelles are an example of a beneficial, symbiotic relationship of oaks and other hardwoods and the fungi. I find it fascinating that there are extensive networks underground that communicate with trees. Research shows that two different kinds of mycorrhizal networks connect to different trees. These underground networks that go by the name of mycorrhiza enhance nutrient and water intake and serve as extensions of the root system. 95% of all the world's plants form and depend on mycorrhiza. Arbuscular mycorrhiza is considered a scavenger and it connects maples, tulip poplars and black gum trees. Their leaves decompose faster in fall than other leaves, adding more nutrient rich

the Arbuscular mycorrhizal grow faster and bigger, posing a challenge to slower growing oaks.

The Ectomycorrhiza is associated with oaks and hickory. This network is the opposite of the one mentioned above. It slows down decomposition.

The trees "mine" out specific nutrients. This system is considered to be

eficial to maples and poplars, but are not in oaks' favor, they like it drier.
