



- reducing extended outages on its copper network to a more reasonable
- reducing the increased number of customer complaints to a more reasonable level
- reducing batteryrelated issues, including ensuring batteries in remote terminals are kept in working order
- addressing installation of new batteries to resolve current issues in its service areas

Frontier also acknowledged the need to upgrade existing copper to fiber optics.
