Legislative Update

With only days until Christmas, I hope everyone is enjoying the holiday season. While we've not had any meaningful winter weather thus far, I'm sure it's not far away. However, our grandkids are skeptical of our stories of significant snowfall at Thanksgiving and Christmas. We had a great weekend with family and friends for my birthday and I'd like to thank everyone that called, emailed, texted or messaged birthday greetings and well-wishes.

I also had a great surprise this afternoon when oldest grandson Collin and one of his buddies traveled up from South Carolina on Sunday to spend a few days with us. Collin loves the farm and I'm sure I'll be spending quite a bit of time at Bonnie this week before he heads back south all too soon.

Last Thursday, was a special day at Braxton County High School as a school assembly was held to honor one of their own, Tyler Baldwin. Recently,

Tyler was credited with saving the life of an elderly neighbor by rescuing him from a burning home. In addition to my representing the House of Delegates and presenting a citation, Fire Chiefs and members of several Braxton County Volunteer Fire Departments, Board of Education President Whipkey, Braxton County Commissioner Gum and representatives of both Senator Manchin and Congressman Mooney were in attendance and for several special presentations. Additionally, a special presentation was made by the WV Fire Marshall Ken Tyree and Deputy Fire Marshall Robert Bailey on behalf of their office and the WV Fire Commission.

Thank you to BCHS Principal Dr. Tony Minney, Superintendent Kathy Hypes and the teachers, staff, and students for planning the program and for taking time to honor Tyler for his heroic and selfless action.

The issue of broadband has been with us nearly as long as I've been in the Legislature. Initially, no

one thought this would be an in-demand service. However, as technology has grown by leaps and bounds, broadband has turned into a must-have for homes and businesses. Quite simply, the lack of broadband is viewed as a major liability to economic growth and bolstering our declining population and school enrollment in West Virginia. To our credit in Gilmer and Braxton Counties, we were light years ahead of other rural areas of the state, going head-to-head with former headline provider Verizon as we prevailed in setting up a first-of-its-kind non-profit entity (Gilmer-Braxton Technology Research Zone) in conjunction with Glenville State College. While we were successful in some limited wireless deployments, there was not enough available funding at the time to finish the job. If we'd had access to the funds now available, we'd have had nearly all of both counties covered with broadband coverage today.

Now it seems the rest of the State is catching on to what we knew twenty years ago, and I believe in the next year we're going to see the beginnings of getting the dream of broadband out to our citizens in our rural areas. While I recognize that it will not happen everywhere at the same time, I want to ensure that no home or business is lost in the process. That's why I keep in close contact with WV Development Office Secretary Mitch Carmichael. For all practical purposes, the WV Development Office is the manager of the billion dollars available for broadband expansion and the office that will have the most

leverage on where it goes and when.

One problem is that current providers – Frontier in particular – have not provided accurate maps of where broadband is available. In most cases, their information is flawed, indicating a larger coverage area than what is actually the case. In the Joint Committee on Government and Finance a couple of weeks ago during interim meetings, I asked Mitch how citizens that are unserved or underserved can ensure that they are not overlooked due to flawed maps.

He indicated that if you have service, but it is substandard, go on the website of the WV Development Office at: Broadband.wv.gov and take the speed test. This will verify both your location and current upload and download speed.

For those that have no service, call 304-356-0138. This will ensure that if you have no service, your location will be noted by the State Broadband Office. This is extremely

important, as we want no one left behind. If you have any questions, please let me know. Also, spread the word and have everyone in your area take the speed test or call. The better documentation we have in Gilmer and Braxton Counties of our lapses in coverage, the better chance we have of getting service as the first rounds of upgrades and deployments begin early next year.

During the interim period between legislative sessions, I can be reached at my home at 304-364-8411; or please address mail to: 151 Park Street, Gassaway, WV 26624. For those with Internet access, my legislative email address is: Brent.Boggs@WVHouse.gov

The 2022 legislative session begins on Wednesday, January 12, 2022, and I will be in the Capitol office daily beginning on January 10 until the session ends in mid-March.

The Glenville Democrat had this note at the end of the column: "Remember this poem when you next meet an older person who you might brush aside without looking at the young soul within.....we will all, one day, be there, too! PLEASE SHARE THIS POEM, The best and most beautiful things of this world can't be seen or touched. They must be felt by the heart...."

"When an old man died in the geriatric ward of a nursing home in an Australian country town, it was believed that he had nothing left of any value. Later, when the nurses were going through his meager possessions, they found this poem. On the Other Side of the Mountain

Learning how to sell something is a skill that has to be honed! We faced an uphill battle in WV trying to sell goat cheese and I totally understand the reluctance of people wanting to even taste goat's milk or cheese. When goat's milk is "goaty", it tastes pretty terrible. "Goaty" is the result of improper handling of the milk.

All equipment, milking buckets, strainers or pipeline milk systems, have to be sterilized before milking. We washed the goats' udders prior to milking with water mixed with hydrogen peroxide, then we dried them with paper towels. Of course, the milkers' hands had to be clean too.

The fat globules in goat's milk are very volatile and if the milk is not cooled down immediately after milking, the globules deteriorate, turn rancid which we interpret as "goaty".

The French expert on soft goat cheese advised us to use the double boiler method for pasteurizing the milk instead of the faster, new method of forcing the milk through platelets that would again be too harsh on the delicate composition of goat milk. "Goaty" is a fault, an indication of uncleanliness or improper cooling.

We got in touch with Delmer Robinson, the food writer for the Gazette at that time, to ask him for addresses for restaurants that would possibly be interested in using our cheese. It piqued his interest, and he made a trip up to the farm, writing an article in the newspaper. We had the addresses of the top ten restaurants in the state and we started with the Greenbrier.

We established contact and agreed on a date for testing the product at their hotel. We were kind of intimidated, but they made us feel welcome. We ate lunch at their chefs' table in the kitchen. After the tasting we returned home with our very first order. We had one problem. The cheese can be made in different shapes: pyramids, 3" rounds, 2" rounds and 8" logs.

The Greenbrier wanted logs and judging on their interest of future orders we did not have enough shapes. They were un-

available everywhere. I had to contact my au pair family in France where the cheese shapes were manufactured to ask for their help. They immediately agreed to get in touch with the factory and my parents from CH were going to be the financial resource for this transaction.

Later on, when the logs became available in the US again, we ended up with around 150 or more pieces, since the Greenbrier ordered sometimes 200 lbs. of cheese a week.

After the Greenbrier we visited The Red Fox Inn at Snowshoe. Brian was excited to use a local product and we were again leaving with an order of cheese. Then we visited a restaurant in Fairmont, they liked the cheese, but they served more Italian type food, no orders.

Then Susan Mc Queen, the manager of the wine and cheese department of the former Stone and Thomas store, asked us to show up for a tasting. Again, we were well received and had gained a new customer. We also went a few times to the Charleston Framers' Market on a Saturday.

A Swiss journalist who resided in Washington DC had asked some mutual friends in CH for our address. He called us and asked if he could spend some days with us to get an immersion in Swiss ambience, because he felt he needed a shot of it. We hit it off right away.

We talked Swiss, we enjoyed eating together and commenting on what made good grub! He loved our cheese. He wanted to know if we sold any in DC so he could purchase it on his return and recommend it to friends.

No, we only sold it in WV. After he returned to DC, he tore out some yellow pages from his phonebook on which he circled the stores we should contact.

We did not send samples; we wrote a letter in which we described our cheese. Sutton Place which later sold to Fresh Fields and still later to Whole Foods placed an order to see if they would like it.

We did not hear back from them, and it just happened that we had to order more culture from New England Cheese Making and I mentioned to them my slight disappointment. Ricky straightened me out right away.

YOU are the seller, THEY are the customer, and they are to be treated like gold. Who cares how YOU feel, you have a good product, but you have to learn how to market. YOU have to contact THEM, not the other way around.

Another lesson learned. We called them and they wanted to know, why it took us so long to ask about their judgement. They loved it and ordered for three more stores.

We were really getting busy and hired another employee, Karen. Then I got a phone-call from my father that my mother, who had been ill, took a turn for the worse.

He advised me if I wanted to see her one more time I should hurry. It was summer, school

was out, and I immediately made reservations for a flight to CH.

On the plane from Charleston to NY, I met "Peachy" a Charleston businessman. His real name was Edwin Masinter (B+B Loans), but he deserved his nick name, he was a real Peach in every regard.

We exchanged business experiences, of course he was a pro in the field.

Then he asked if we sold our cheese in NYC. I told him I would not have the slightest idea how to get in touch with these stores. "I tell you what" said Peachy, "next time I go to NYC, and I go there often, I'll call you and you bring me some samples of your cheese to take with me to NY."

He kept his word, he took the cheese to Zabar's, Balducci, Dean and Delucca, Fairway and we landed in NYC. Was it the quality of our

cheese or the charm of Peachy that opened these famous doors?

My mother recovered, but she passed away two years later from the ravages of diabetes which had plagued her most of her life, but nobody recognized the symptoms at that time.

In 1987 we entered a competition again at the American Cheese Society and among 135 entries from different producers, we won one blue, two red and one white ribbon.

Now the doors became wide open, no more chance encounters that helped us move along, these memorable and most appreciated contacts that were so crucial to learning the ins and outs of marketing, now it was the cheese that did it by itself.

The Story does not end here, there is a little more to tell next week.

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

NOTICE is hereby given that the Town of Burnsville, a public sewer utility, has adopted, by ordinance on December 13, 2021, a tariff containing increased rates, tolls and charges for furnishing sewer collection and disposal service to sewer customers in and around Burnsville in the County of Braxton, West Virginia. Burnsville deems the present customer rates and charges for the furnishing of sewer service throughout the entire territory served by Burnsville to be inadequate to provide sufficient revenues to the Town to maintain and operate the sewer collection and disposal system and to maintain required debt service coverage.

The Town is proposing a two step increase in rates and charges to assist its customers. The Step I increase in rates and charges is necessary to provide sufficient revenues to the Town to maintain and operate the sewer collection and disposal system and to maintain required debt service coverage. The Step I rate increase, being a percentage increase of 10.66% over current rates, will be effective for bills rendered after February 1, 2022.

The Step II increase in rates and charges is necessary to satisfy the monthly payments on the loan for the Town's wastewater collection system improvements project. The project will be funded by grants in the amount of \$2,669,500 and a loan in the amount of \$169,500. The Step II rate increase, being a percentage increase of 20.01% over current rates, will be effective for bills rendered after substantial completion of the wastewater collection system improvements project.

Holiday Potatoes

I fixed candied white sweet potatoes for Thanksgiving and our granddaughter had never had them. She had only had yams but she really liked these. I explained to her about my Dad growing them and I didn't know how to do that, but her Grandpa did.

My job was to stay in the house after supper, take care of my baby brother and do supper dishes. Mom said she would go to the gardens with Dad and the boys.

Mr. R. said he hated that job of planting and growing sweet potatoes. His job was to water them every evening.

He had to pump up water from the well into a big wash tub, carry buckets of water to the

garden, and use a dipper to water each plant. Sometimes there were two rows of them clear through the garden.

They are different from regular potatoes in that you make the ridge and set plants in the ridge. With regular potatoes, you hill them up after they are already grown. He remembers someone telling him that he didn't have to use a hoe to make those ridges clear through the garden.
