I-79 traffic stop leads to drug arrests

Braxton County Deputy Sheriff Andrew Groves was patrolling I-79 Saturday, January 23 around 7:00 p.m. when he observed a Chevrolet Cobalt with defective exhaust and improper registration headed north about the 55-mile marker.

Upon conducting a traffic stop the officer identified the driver as Jerry Ray Hart, 43, of Sutton and his passenger as Bridgette Bender, 34, of Frametown. The officer observed a piece of tinfoil in the passenger seat under Ms. Bender's purse. The officer, with the assistance of Cpl. Cleve Westfall, detained the pair and searched the vehicle. The officers located a glass pipe in Hart's shirt pocket.

Search of the vehicle uncovered burnt foil, a large amount of cash and plastic bags often used in the distribution of illegal substances.

Upon questioning the female suspect voluntarily told the officers

that she had "a bag down my pants." Bender retrieved the substance which contained 24.5 grams of a crystal substance officers believed to be metamphamide and a second bag containing 8.9 grams of a white powdery substance believed to be Fentanyl.

Under questioning, Bender identified the substances as Meth and Fentanyl and told the officers that Hart gave her the bags to put down her pants when they saw the blue lights behind them.

Both were arrested on charges of possession of drugs with the intent to delivery and conspiracy. The pair were arraigned before Braxton County Magistrate Beth Smith where their bonds were set at \$35,000 each. The pair remain incarcerated at the Central Regional Jail at press-time in lieu of that cash only bond awaiting additional court proceedings.

Board of Education reviews new State COVID guidelines

The Braxton County Board of Education conducted their most recent regular meeting on January 18.

Evelyn Post opened the meeting thanking Superintendent Kathy Hypes for closing the schools recently due to the inclement weather.

During the meeting, Superintendent Hypes discussed the new COVID guidelines presented by the state. She discussed the isolation and quarantine guidelines for universal masking and how vaccination status affects that. Superintendent Hypes discussed the different symptoms being seen with the omicron variant including it being more of an upper respiratory issue.

She informed the board she is looking into the possibility of starting a county screening program for all schools which will include "test to stay" and "test to play" strategies for students. This will allow students to stay in school with negative testing as an alternative to quarantining at home. Student athletes would also be able to test, if exposed, in order to participate in sporting events. Superintendent Hypes is hop-

ing to be able to find a state approved laboratory to work with on this program to get it started.

She also discussed the state started a new practice in which every school must submit confirmed positive cases by 5:00 pm on Sunday for the previous Sunday through Saturday time period into statewide school surveillance. The information will be reported to the health department.

She noted that the recent closures of classrooms have been due more to staff shortages than to outbreaks. Only two of the classrooms closed were due to a virus outbreak.

Board President DeAnna Whipkey thanked new board member Martha Dean for stepping up to fill the seat left on the park board after the resignation of David Hoover. She also asked the other board members to consider stepping in to fill the other vacancy on the WV Extension Agency Board.

She reminded board members the WV School Board Association winter conference will be held on February 18 and 19 in Charleston. Options for attending

livestream or in person are available. Deadline is February 10.

Evelyn Post discussed issues coming up in the current legislative term concerning school systems. She encouraged board members to provide input to their representatives on these issues that will impact our county.

Superintendent Hypes reminded board members starting at the next regular meeting the schools will be coming two at a time to complete their LSIC presentations.

Hypes briefly reported on the enrollment numbers for the past two fiscal years and per pupil expenditures. The numbers show the expenditures for all funding, local, state and federal, as well as food programs and salaries. Enrollment has been declining every year. She discussed the declining numbers is a combination of the pandemic and a drop in population.

Evelyn Post discussed looking into using local funds to provide optical and dental insurance for employees. Board members noted the budget would need to

Sutton Town Council conducts busy session

The Sutton Town Council met for a regular meeting on Thursday, January 13, 2022 in the Council Chambers on the first floor of the Municipal Building. Mayor JD Hoover called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm.

Present were Council members: Steve Facemire, Catherine Hoover, Robyn Dolan, Marsha Lloyd, Beth Atkins, and Municipal Clerk, Robin Smith. Absent: Recorder Laurel Petolicchio, due to illness. Also present were: Dot Gioulis, Fernando Rodriguez, Sally Stewart, Rodney Jamison, Shane Boggs, Ryan Jarvis, Spencer Hall, and Deborah Minnich

Mayor Hoover recognized Brittany Fowler and Noah McCumbers for their hard work and initiative during the town's first snow storm.

Sally Stewart spoke on behalf of Just One Generation, a program to help the feral cat problem in Sutton. Robyn Dolan made a motion, seconded by Beth Atkins to pay 1/3 of the costs (approximately \$400) for the spay/neuter/testing/euthanasia if needed of the feral cats that they can catch. A notice will be given to

the community before that cat traps are set.

Dot Gioulis spoke on behalf of the SCDC - Sutton Community Development Corp. She shared with the council a brochure from FASTERWV, a program to help start new businesses. She also discussed the progress of the Elk River Trail. A consultant will be in the area in February. There will be public meetings about the Elk River Trail in March. The consultant will present the town with their report in August. The next SCDC meeting will be the 3rd Tuesday in February.

The construction permit approval was moved forward on the agenda. Steve Facemire made a motion, seconded by Catherine Hoover to approve the construction permit for Deborah Minnich at 100 N Main St.

Steve Facemire made a motion, seconded by Catherine Hoover to accept the minutes of the December 9, 2021 regular meeting with the addition of Vivian Parsons added to those in attendance.

Beth Atkins made a motion, seconded by Robyn Dolan to accept

the financial report and pay bills.

Steve Facemire and Marsha Lloyd discussed which roads belong to the town, county owned or private. Robyn Dolan will talk to DOH to clarify which roads they plow or provide materials for the town to take care of. Beth will get clarification about Flint Lane.

Street issues at Birch Street, Billy Hall residence, and N. Baxter Street at Shingler residence were also discussed.

Marsha Lloyd stated that Walmart would provide a laptop for a police officer after the position was filled. Steve made a motion, seconded by Marsha Lloyd to table the decision about a cell phone until the next meeting. The motion passed unanimously.

Catherine Hoover made a motion, seconded by Steve Facemire to accept the proposal from Waste Management to remove the town trash truck and its contents at no cost to the town. Motion passed with a vote of four to one.

The collection of tires in the town dump that were inherited by this administration is

Commission hopes to net \$4 million for broadband

One of the actions at last Friday's Braxton County Commission could bring as much as \$4 million to the county for broadband expansion. During the meeting Larry Clifton made a motion to pledge \$1 million of the county's allotted (ARP) American Recovery Plan funds to the West Virginia Department of Economic Development's GigReady Incentive Grant Program. The county's 25% match, could if approved, provide highspeed internet services to approximately 1366 area residents and businesses with the addition of 26 miles of fiber optic cable.

Addie Facemire, newly hired director of BC Drug Testing Services was first to address the Commission at last Friday's meeting. She presented the Commission with her agency's activity report for the month of December. That information revealed a total of 62 drug screens were administer. In addition, Facemire reported that two individuals had completed the requirements of their home confinement and had been released.

John Hoffman, County OES, 9-1-1 and EMS Director had several matters to discuss with the Commission.

He presented the Commission with a report on his agencies' activities for the month

of December and the accumulative totals for the calendar year. That information showed a total of 2088 calls had come into the 9-1-1 center in December. Of that total 564 were emergency related; 150 were for county law enforcement agencies, 78 for fire departments, 142 for EMS with the remaining 174 being miscellaneous by nature.

After a brief explanation from Hoffman, Melvin Gum made a motion to approve a resolution for the purchase of a new CAD (Computer Aided Dispatch) system for the 9-1-1 Center.

The Director also requested permission to hire Samuel James

Snyder as a full-time Medic/Driver for the ambulance service. He stated that Snyder would receive \$17 per hour as well as full county benefits. He will also serve a 90 probationary period. The request was granted on a motion by Larry Clifton.

Following a brief discussion, the Commission approved changes in the county's magisterial districts brought on by the recently completed census as suggested by the County Clerk's office.

In other action the Larry Clifton made a motion led to the approval of the short settlement for David Scott Mowery as pre-

sented by the Fiduciary Supervisor.

Only one purchase order came before the Commission for consideration. The Sheriff was granted approval to purchase two ballistic vests from Markl Supply Company Inc. at a cost of \$1,476.00.

The Commission approved joining the Town of Sutton and Just One Generation in paying \$400 each to have a large colony of feral cats in Sutton spade and/or neutered.

Larry Clifton made a motion to give Sheriff Lou DellaMea permission to pay off two police vehicles totaling \$8,748.07 with funds in his budget.

It was also Clifton who introduced action

to allocate \$250 so the county would continue to participate in the Senior Companion Program.

After a review, the Commission approved the county and EMS invoices for payment.

Melvin Gum made a motion to approve the minutes of the Commission regular meeting on January 10 and a Special Meeting on January 12 as presented by the County Clerk.

The Commission adjourned at 9:27 a.m. The Commission's next regular meeting will convene on February 4 at 9:00 a.m.

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News from our Capitol

The weather has taken a remarkable turn toward what I consider to be true winter weather over the past few weeks. Accordingly, many secondary roads, town streets and sidewalks still have many icy spots. If you're out walking to your mailbox or getting your newspaper, take great care. One slip or fall - regardless of age or physical condition - can have major consequences. If you or anyone in your family feels safe in doing so, take the initiative to clear and treat the sidewalk or driveway for a neighbor or friend that may be physically unable to perform the task.

Last Friday, January 21 marked the tenth day of the 2022 Legislative session. To date, the House has introduced 957 bills; in the Senate, 464 bills have been introduced. Twenty bills have passed the Senate; 3 bills have passed the House. No bills have passed both houses, therefore, the Governor has taken no action on any bills from the regular

session.

Bills that have passed the House as of January 21 and head to the Senate:

- **HB 4059** Clarifying that new Department of Health and Human Resources' Deputy Commissioners are exempt from civil service.
- **HB 4060** Repealing outdated sections of code relating to health.
- **HB 4067** To make certain agency reports electronic or eliminating certain agency reports.

In the Senate, a few of the bills that are headed to the House for consideration include:

- **SB 9** Providing continued eligibility for developmental disability services to dependents of military members
- **SB 22** Relating to exempting certain organizations from property taxation
- **SB 77** Allowing certain veterans park free at metered parking in any state municipality
- **SB 228** Providing tuition and fee waivers at state higher education

institutions for volunteers who have completed service in AmeriCorps programs in WV

House bills out of committee and on the floor for consideration this week include:

- **HB 2184** Increasing the criminal penalties for exposure of police or governmental to fentanyl or any other harmful drug
- **HB 3220** Restrictions on taxpayer funded lobbying
- **HB 4065** Allowing DNR to teach hunter safety courses in schools

House Finance Committee budget hearings continue this week and should be back on schedule, pending another shot of inclement weather. They include:

Jan. 24 - Dept. of Environmental Protection; Department of Education; School Building Auth.

Jan. 25 - DHHR

Jan. 26 - Dept. of Admin; Dept. of Transportation, DOH, DMV

Jan. 27 - Lottery; Department of Revenue
Of the many bills introduced this session, I'm very proud and honored to have introduced, along with my friends, Speaker Hanshaw, Delegate Westfall and Delegate Queen, **House Bill 4264**, granting university status to GSC and changing the name to Glensville State

University. This is more than a name change. It is the culmination of much hard work through the years; meeting the criteria required by the Higher Education Policy Commission, including the ability to offer master's degree in some programs. With a renewed emphasis on teacher education and a new registered nurse program in conjunction with Marshall University, there is a renewed enthusiasm on campus and in central West Virginia for the future of local higher education opportunities for traditional students and non-traditional students that are seeking to begin or return to the path to an associate or baccalaureate degree.

This week, I want to offer my congratulations to BCHS Wrestling Coach Sterling Beane on being recognized for 50 years of coaching. He was recently honored at the Braxton Co. Invitational Wrestling Tournament by his assistant coaches, BCHS administration and faculty. Sterling has influenced and mentored hundreds of student-athletes over the years and amassed impressive coaching credentials, earning the utmost respect of his athletes and his coaching peers around

A request was made that the town clerk walks through Sutton and make sure all businesses have a business license.



Paul "Rex" Miller

Paul "Rex" Miller, 93, of Solomons, MD, sailed into the Port of Heaven on December 23, 2021. Rex is survived

by his wife and first mate, Donna, of 42 years, sons Paul Rex Miller, Jr. (Sue) CA, Eric Miller (Teri) MD, daughter Kristen Lauver (Tom Devlin) MD, sister Louise Woods, MD, and 5 grandchildren.

Rex was born in Baltimore, MD in 1928 and graduated from the Baltimore MD Polytechnic Institute in 1946. He enlisted in the Navy in 1946 and served in the Navy and the Navy Reserves. He graduated from Johns Hopkins University School of Engineering with a ME Degree, received a Masters Degree from the University of MD and attended the Oak Ridge School of Reactor Technology in Oak Ridge TN.

Rex began his career in 1951 as an academic instructor and flight test planner at the Navy's Test Pilot School at the Patuxent River Naval Air Base in Lexington Park MD, where he taught and flew with NASA Astronauts, John Glenn and Scott Carpenter. The test pilots inspired him to get his private pilot's license and he flew with the FAA Flying Club for many years.

This week's recipe is Slow-Cooker Italian Pork Loin

Ingredients

2cans (15 oz each) Progresso™ cannellini beans, drained, rinsed

1cup thinly sliced yellow onions

1red bell pepper, cut into thin slices

1tablespoon Italian seasoning

2tablespoons vegetable oil

2teaspoons salt

2 1/2to 3 1/2 lb boneless pork loin roast, trimmed

1can (28 oz) Muir Glen™ organic fire-roasted diced tomatoes, drained

1cup shredded mozzarella cheese (4 oz)

1/4cup shredded fresh basil leaves

Spray 5- to 6-quart slow cooker with cooking spray. Mix beans, onions, bell pepper, Italian seasoning, 1 tablespoon of the oil and 1 teaspoon of the salt in slow cooker.

Rub pork loin with remaining 1 tablespoon

oil, then rub in remaining 1 teaspoon salt. Heat 12-inch nonstick skillet over medium-high heat. Cook pork in hot skillet 3 to 5 minutes on both large flat sides or until browned. Transfer to slow cooker. Pour tomatoes over pork. Cover; cook on Low heat setting 3 to 4 hours or until pork is cooked through (145°F in center).

Transfer pork to cutting board; let stand until cool enough to handle. Stir bean mixture in slow cooker; using slotted spoon, transfer to serving platter. Cut pork into 8 slices; place on top of bean mixture on platter, then top with mozzarella cheese. Cover platter with foil 3 to 5 minutes or until cheese melts. Remove foil; top with basil.

If you love Italian Cuisine as much as we do, you have to try Muriel's in Fairmont. Oh my goodness! It is the best that I have ever had. It is authentic and the atmosphere is perfect. It is now one of our favorite places to go. If you have been there then you know what I mean! It is well worth the drive.

THIS WEEK IN WEST VIRGINIA HISTORY

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

Jan. 26, 1850: Wyoming County was formed by the Virginia General Assembly from a part of Logan County.

Jan. 26, 1960: Burnsville High School basketball player Danny Heater scored 135 points in a varsity game against Widen, setting a national record. Heater went on to receive an academic scholarship to attend the University of Richmond.



Jan. 27, 1925: Bernard L. Coffindaffer was born in Nicholas County. In the 1980s and 1990s, Coffindaffer erected clusters of crosses along the highways of West Virginia and much of the Southeast.



Jan. 27, 1933: Folk artist George Connard Wolfe was born in Standard, Kanawha County. A self-trained sculptor, he made his own tools from automobile leaf springs and engine valves and worked in stone and wood.

Jan. 27-28, 1998: Flat Top on the Mercer-Raleigh county line received a record snowfall of 35 inches in a 24-hour period.



Jan. 28, 1902: Miners Hospital No. One opened at Welch, with a young Dr. Henry Hatfield as president. The

legislature had passed a law requiring the building of state hospitals for those engaged in dangerous occupations, and eventually three hospitals were built in different sections of the state.



Jan. 28, 1937: In a flood that drove a million Ohio Valley residents from their homes, the Ohio River crested at Huntington at 69.45 feet, more than 19 feet above flood stage. By the time the water receded, five people were dead, and the city was in ruins.

Jan. 29, 1903: The great rhododendron was designated the official state flower of West Virginia, after being recommended by the governor and voted on by students in the public schools.

Jan. 30, 1818: Nicholas County was created by the Virginia legislature from parts of Greenbrier, Kanawha, and Randolph counties. The county was named for Wilson Cary Nicholas, a Virginia governor and U.S. senator who lived from 1761 to 1820.

Jan. 30, 1895: Mingo County was created from the southern part of Logan County. Mingo is the youngest county in West Virginia.

Jan. 31, 1878: Educator William Woodson Trent was born in rural Nicholas County. He served as state superintendent of schools from 1933 until 1957.




Jan. 31, 1922: Movie and television actress Joanne Dru was born Joan Letitia Lacock in Logan. Her movie career included

more than 40 films.



Jan. 31, 1945: Sergeant Jonah Edward Kelley of Mineral County was killed in action while leading his squad against German positions during World War II. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for his "superb courage."

Feb. 1, 1832: Education reformer Alexander Luark Wade was born. Wade reorganized rural Monongalia County schools to require progress through eight prescribed levels with a graduating exercise and receipt of a diploma. Wade's system worked so well, it was copied in other counties and states.



Feb. 1, 1901: Frank Buckles, the last known American veteran of World War I, was born in Missouri. Buckles purchased a farm in Charles Town in 1954 and continued to live there until his death in 2011.

Thinking of our long time of little or no visiting due to Covid and then the extreme weather.

As of next weekend, I will have lived 88 years.

Things have really changed when I think of how we fill in our hours during these stay-at-home days. I have this computer and can catch up on some correspondence more easily than I did in the past. In those days it was either a written note or an expensive long-distance call. We had no T.V. in those days. We played games, but not electronic ones. We did listen to the radio and had special ones we learned to love in those years.

Our imagination was our "television"! We could "see" the people and the happenings. I wonder if that was a stimulant to our brains, our imagination.

I found the following memories in some things written by my brother, Sonny. My younger brother, Sammy, drew pictures of things he thought of, remarkable pictures which led him to a career in advertising ads back before computers, so his ads were hand drawn from the newspapers in D. C.. Following is a letter written from somewhere Sonny was living or working and he

is obviously very homesick:

From a letter written home (Harry V. Wiant, Feb. 18, 1962)

"I can see the two maples, bare of leaves at this time of year, the long steps, and the house so full of good memories and love. The river flows as it did when I probed its secrets with Toby, the old shop kind of misses being used as a saloon for cowboy games, the ashes of many a campfire where we slept could still be found in the fields and woods. I miss the special sound of the wind around the eaves of the house when one is snug under many quilts, sounds that can never be duplicated elsewhere. The best the world has ever seen envied the foxes, for the Son of Man had no place to lay his head. Man, the smartest of the creatures, leaves the fields of home, driven by the need for success and fortune. Life that is less wise stays on familiar trails. In this respect is man the wiser? He searches through the world for he knows not what and forever dreams of the fields of home. "Mid pleasures or palaces" he fails to find what he left. That will only be found again in the better land."

Then in another letter from Sonny, he is again lonely and homesick, I think:

From a letter to the folks at home (Sonny, Jan. 14, 1961)

"It's one of those rainy, foggy days, the kind of day one should do no more than throw a chunk of coal on the fire, give the dog a gentle stroke, and go to sleep curled up in the old rocking chair. After a good, long nap, one could make his way to the supper table and the thick slices of homemade bread with big chunks of butter, fresh milk, and everything else that makes a perfect meal, including a man-size serving of apple cobbler. Then, Pat or Mary would play from "The Golden Book of Favorites", Carry Me Back to Old Virginia, Juanita, and Drink to Me Only with Thine Eyes, while we'd sing in happy, if not beautiful, voices. That night, one could snuggle in the big armchair with a good book and a big pan of popcorn. In the still of the night, when the town and the surrounding green hills are at rest, it was good to go out on the porch and take a deep breath of the damp but pure mountain air, then slip off to the big, comfortable bed and heavy, homey quilts. Ah! Home! The memories are burned so deep that neither time nor distance can erase one wonderful detail."

I hope you have enjoyed these thoughts of "HOME" in those wonderful, long-ago days. You can understand why I miss my brothers so much.


Dog Stories from the Braxton Tales: County Animal Shelter





The basketball games kicked off at 1:00 with the 3rd/4th grade league.


This week we wanted to showcase our 5th/6th grade teams. Our 5th/6th graders are made up of two teams from Gassaway, the Elks and Razorbacks.






