## Mobile Agriculture Lab visits Frametown Elementary

Frametown Elementary School students had a unique learning experience last week. The Mobile Agriculture Education Science Lab, a 40-foot mobile classroom sponsored by the West Virginia Farm Bureau, was on site to educate students on a variety of topics. The self-contained classroom travels

across the state bringing an interactive field trip style experience directly to schools and students in grades K-8.

The Mobile Ag Lab is equipped with over 30 STEM-based science experiments and lessons, a certified teacher, and all the supplies needed for hands-on learning. Each

science experiment is designed to emphasize a different aspect of agriculture, including West Virginia's commodities, the environment, biotechnology, food and fiber. While visiting the lab, students worked cooperatively to solve a problem as they formed hypothesis, collected data and drew conclusions while focusing on the scientific method. Each lesson on the Mobile Ag Lab focused on increasing student knowledge regarding the importance of agriculture and its impact on their daily lives.

While at Frametown Elementary School the Mobile Agriculture Science Lab gave students the opportunity to enjoy hands on learning taught by the magnificent Ms. Marilyn. PTA parents volunteered in the lab to help things run smoothly. The PTA also funded the Agriculture Lab's visit.

## Logging truck overturns results in diesel fuel leak

The Flatwoods Community Volunteer Fire Department responded to a logging truck accident on Tuesday morning, February 22. At approximately 10:30 a.m. the FCVFD was alerted that a log truck had rolled over on its side on Gauley Turnpike Rd with fuel spill.

Upon arrival the truck was off the roadway with one fuel tank leaking fuel. Fire officials estimate that approximately 100 gallons of diesel had been spilled. Officers of the department requested that the county hazmat unit respond to the scene which resulted in the quick containment of the hazardous materials.

The driver reportedly

escaped injury.

Traffic control was established, and WV Department of Highways was requested due to the length of time needed on scene. Units remained on scene for over 4 hours in case of more fuel leaking and the possibility of

a fire or explosion.

The FCVFD responded two units to the accident in addition to the County's hazardous material trailer. The DOH, WV Department of Environmental Protection, State Recovery and A & S Recovery were also on scene.

## Ireland Lion's Club Repairs Veterans' Memorial Wall

### Dedication To Be Held

After two years of delays and extensive repairs to the foundation, the Ireland Lions Club will unveil the new Ireland Veterans' Memorial on Sunday March 13th during the 40th Annual Irish Spring Festival's Opening Ceremony at 12 pm. The repair project began in 2019 and was thought to only require six to eight months to complete. However, delays due to the pandemic, supply problems, costs of materials, as well as the engraving, required the completion date to be extended. "Now that the repairs are complete, there is not a more fitting time for the Ireland Community to re-dedicate the memorial and honor our local veterans than during our Annual Irish Spring Festival," said Denton King, former Ireland Lions Club President. "The festival is the biggest event in our community and an appropriate time to pause in honor of our Veterans and their service."

Kevin Gregory is the current Ireland Lions Club President and commented on the significance of the memorial for the community. "This memorial speaks to the dedication and selfless service of our veterans and their families that have ties to the Ireland community. It is truly amazing, in such a small community with a current population of only 530 people in barely seventeen square miles, that there are over 400 names engraved on these granite tablets. Selfless service runs deep in our community, generation after generation. When we re-dedicate this memorial

to those men and women written upon these tablets, who have served this country, we will honor their service and recognize their sacrifices."

The original monument was funded and built by the Ireland Lions Club in 2004. The names on the monument span four centuries from the Revolutionary War to the current conflicts of our time. Through the years, weather and plantings near the wall caused structural damage and made a complete renovation necessary. "We simply had to do something with the structure. The wall had begun to lean, and it was very unsafe," said King. "The original wall consisted of engraved bricks in honor of each veteran. The bricks were purchased by family members to commemorate their loved one's service and the sale of those bricks funded the project."

The primary delay in the renovation project was finding a supplier to replace and engrave the damaged bricks. The memorial committee had exhausted about every possible lead for the bricks and the project stalled. As it happens, good fortune was shining upon the Ireland Lions Club when a part-time local, Jim Newlon, became aware of the renovation dilemma and offered a solution. Mr. Newlon is the owner of Strata Granite and Marble in Canton, Ohio and offered to donate marble slabs for the project. Eddie Williams, former Lions Club Treasurer, said, "We want to thank Jim Newlon and Strata Granite and

Marble for their very generous donation of twenty-two granite tablets. We would still be fundraising and trying to find suppliers if it weren't for Mr. Newlon."

Jim Clutter is the Ireland Lions Club Secretary and remarked on the outpouring of contributions to the project. "In addition to the donation of the granite tablets by Jim Newlon, the project was supported by a number of local businesses. Kid-die Monuments of Weston engraved the tablets at a greatly reduced rate and mounted the tablets on the wall, Bruffey Trucking of Ireland donated gravel and hauling, and members of the community and the Ireland Lions Club gave countless hours of planning, research, pouring over the details of names, rank, branches of service, and of course manual labor to repair the structure. This truly has been a community effort! We are truly proud of the teamwork and the resulting memorial."

The Ireland Veteran's Memorial Dedication ceremony will be held at 1200 pm, Sunday March 13th at the Ireland Community Building in Ireland, West Virginia. Ireland is a beautiful, picturesque hamlet that lies just beyond the Braxton/Lewis County line on the Gauley Turnpike (north from Flatwoods on US Hwy 19). # Legislative Update

Last Friday, February 18 marked the thirty-eighth day of the 2022 Legislative session. To date, 2,143 bills have been introduced; the House has introduced 1,458 bills; in the Senate, 685 bills have been introduced. 103 bills have passed the Senate; 93 bills have passed the House. Fourteen bills have passed both houses. The Governor has signed 9 bills, with another five bills en route to the Governor’s desk.

I want to thank everyone for the prayers and well-wishes from my knee surgery last Wednesday. While I had hoped to postpone the procedure until after the legislative session, it was apparent that putting it off was not going to be an option. I want to thank my orthopedic surgeon, Dr. Chad Lavender, of Marshall University Orthopedics and the physicians and staff at Cabell-Huntington Hospital and all my legislative colleagues that checked on my progress. The recovery is ongoing but I’m looking forward to being back in the Capitol this week as we enter the critical final three weeks of the session.

In the coming days, there are several important deadlines on the Legislative Calendar, which include:

- Forty-First Day – last day for bills to be introduced in the Senate – Feb. 21
- Forty-seventh Day – last day for House bills to pass out of House Committees – Feb. 27

- Fiftieth Day - last day for bills to pass their house of origin (crossover day) – March 2
  - Sixtieth Day – last day of the session, concluding at midnight – March 12
- Note: The deadline for House bill introduction was the Thirty-fifth Day – Feb.15
- The budget bill, appropriation bills and bills originating in committees are exempt from the aforementioned deadlines. Also, House and Senate resolutions do not have formal deadlines.
- Up to this point, we’ve seen only a few Senate bills appear on House agendas, but as crossover day approaches, House committees will soon turn to all Senate bills in the House: with House bills taking precedence in the Senate.
- One of the most unstructured and demanding aspects of the legislative process is the procedure when bills come back from the Senate on the VI order of business – Senate messages. Typically, these are messages received as the Senate passes their bills and they are referred in the House to the appropriate committees. It also can be a Senate message on a House bill. For example - a bill passes the House, regardless of margin, and heads to the Senate where it is altered by amendment. It could be as simple as grammar, punctuation, a definition, or it can be a major change that completely alters the intent of the bill. It may be as extreme as to do the ex-

act opposite of the intent of the legislation as it left the House of Delegates. When these messages are received, they typically do not go back to a committee. The majority leader reads the message and explains – to varying degrees of specificity – any changes that were made. Once that explanation is completed and questions or debate ensues on the House floor, it is up to each member to either (a) concur; (b) refuse to concur; (c) concur with further amendment; (d) other procedural motions. If the vote is to concur, the House then immediately has a roll call vote again on final passage of the bill (as amended by the Senate). The same procedure is followed in the Senate when receiving House messages.

It all sounds confusing and definitely requires your undivided attention. Admittedly, most explanations provided are that the amendments are “technical in nature”. That can and should mean grammar, a definition, faulty title, or some minor change. However, you have almost no time to glean the facts for yourself, hurriedly attempt to confirm by your own reading, and then make a split-second decision on voting for or against final passage of a bill. It is an extremely easy way to fumble the ball if you’re not on your toes and do your homework by looking ahead – to the extent possible – of what the Senate actually did to a bill and govern your actions accordingly. In the final days of the session, tracking the status of bills of in-

terest is a continuous job. That’s why, for twenty-six years, I’ve always opted to temper my support or opposition of bills, basing a final decision on what is actually contained in the final version of a bill. And that’s definitely not necessarily what may have been introduced or passed the House or Senate in the days or weeks before. Even if you’re the bill’s sponsor, once it goes through the committee process, you have no control over what the other 99 Delegates, or 34 Senators will do to the bill. Or, like most bills, it may just die, having never even made it onto a committee agenda.


In the final days of each session, it’s good to remember the informal legislative term – “fat ‘possums run at midnight”. In other words, in the closing days of the session it’s a cautionary reminder for what may be added to or removed from a bill without the knowledge of most members in an attempt to slip something through under the radar.

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# Hoop house

We have had various fresh lettuces all winter long in our hoop house.

For many years we grew lettuce in a low tunnel, about 15' long. We covered the rows with concrete reinforcement wire that we bent into hoops, covering the width of the row, supporting a plastic cover when the conditions required it. Once the weather turned colder, we added hoops made of PVC pipes, at about 4' height. These outer hoops served as a frame for a clear plastic cover. It worked fine but there were inconveniences, like not being able to go underneath the covers, just lifting them and struggling to get to the plants. This system also was not as reliable in heavy winds or deep snow-covering. It tended to collapse on occasion. We decided to buy a small hoop house, 8'x12', 7' height. It was great, easy access, good results. It broke, after 30 yrs of use, during Sandy, when a huge tree fell on it. Greg rebuilt it from scratch, using 1" conduit pipe, and making a mold to bend the pipes consistently in the same shape to form a bow. It has been in use ever since. We eventually bought a bigger hoop house, 14'x24', 10' in height because we wanted to have more possibilities.

Hoop houses offer protection from frost, wind and storms. They extend the growing season at the beginning and end by about 6 weeks. When perusing the websites that provide information on what to grow in a hoop house, I found it very confusing. I agree with planting heat loving crops (tomatoes, eggplants, peppers, melons and squashes) in the

summer and cold resistant ones (kales, endives and greens) in the fall for harvest in the winter, but there are also suggestions to raise raspberries, grapes, fruit trees etc. These crops take up huge spaces, have a one time or at least a short time return. Of course everybody has the freedom to plant in their hoop house what they want. My approach is more reality based. I want to remind you that I am not talking about commercial production, just for a home garden. These same websites also recommend installing heaters in winter. The best advice comes from the Rodale Institute and Elliot Coleman who uses hoop houses in Maine. They want these structures to be passively solar heated, no other heating elements. They are supposed to be economical and extend the season.

Coleman mentions that the cover of the hoop house provides one number extension of the growing zone in which one lives. Add another layer of protection with low tunnel hoops inside and you advance two or even three growing zones, depending on how many layers of cover you put on the inside hoops.

One needs a water supply in the hoop house. Greg drilled holes in PVC pipes, put connections and shut-offs on each end. We have a black plastic water line running along the garden with several brass fittings where water hoses can be attached when needed. The same water line continues towards the pastures, for supplying water for the animals during the grazing season and past the hoop house. We rarely need water in the winter, but sometimes if the ground thaws, we give

it a good soaking.

NRCS made hoop houses available all over the country. We have many acquaintances and friends who took part in the cost sharing practice.

This is a wonderful program, very popular. Some use them for selling produce on a more commercial basis, others appreciate them for personal gardening purposes. This program helps people stay healthier, either by using it for the family or by selling fresh food directly or at farmer's markets.

When talking about commercial enterprises, the guy who has it all figured out is the owner of "Neversink Farm" in NY. He runs several hoop houses, all climate controlled by computers and an outdoor garden. His technically sophisticated system lets him know when the fans or the heaters come on, or when the installed irrigation does its job. He runs a big, organic business, has many employees and sells his crops in NYC, an inexhaustible market. We family farmers don't need an operation like he does. It is said that he has the most productive vegetable operation in the country.

Here are my thoughts and my experiences with our two hoop houses.

One can build a hoop house with all kinds of material, conduit pipe, PVC pipe, cattle panels, wood. The most important factor must be that the frame is very sturdy to withstand high winds and heavy snow. The most recommended brand of complete kits on the market is "Clear Span", easy to install, very sturdy and available in many different sizes. I looked up a reasonably priced hoop house at Lowes. It looked good, but it mentioned in the ad that it should be reinforced.

Here are the crops we raise in our hoop houses. I start 4 tomato plants in our house, middle of February. Once they reach about 4", I transplant them in quart containers and in April I put them in the hoop house, inside tomato cages. If it gets really cold at night, I throw a few blankets over the cages to protect the plants from frosts. We have the first ripe tomatoes at the beginning of July. I also set out various peppers and a few cucumbers I started in the house for an early treat. I seed summer lettuces and greens the second week of February, covering them with reemay to warm up the soil a few degrees faster. We harvest fresh greens beginning of April, about the time when I seed the first lettuce outside for later on. In fall I start different kinds of endives and radicchio in the hoop house in late August, with a second seeding 7 days later. The first crop is ready by Thanksgiving, with thinning out the rows a little earlier, using the culled plants for a salad. The next seeding is still smaller but catches up before Christmas, growing slowly on warm days. I don't need to grow broccoli or cabbages in the hoop house, they are set out at the end of April in the garden outdoors. I think it is too hot for the cool loving broccoli in the hot environs of the hoop house. Don't waste space on planting potatoes in the hoop house. For ages, we have had potatoes that lasted well into the late spring in root cellars, no need to raise a crop inside when it does perfectly well outside. This is just my take. We are satisfied with our set-up, having some fresh produce all year round.
