

Carpentry classes finish Students will view what they built in actual use

Sometime during the week of March7-11, BCHS engineering and building construction students will visit a Rock Forge Bridge in Spencer where they will see how the work they recently finished has been used. For the second year in a row, instructor Robert Lloyd's Carpentry I, II classes have completed an order for concrete panels to be used in construction of bridges in West Virginia. Their latest panels went straight to the Spencer bridge site.

Instructor Lloyd explained that his students "like to do handson work instead of book work." He noted that the class usually has projects, both large and

Good & bad legislation...

I would love to sit down with the legislative leadership and have them explain the reasoning behind some of the actions they are taking. Last week a bill was introduced to to SB 586. SB 586 will take power away from the State and ultimately the local Boards of Education. I have fought, for the nearly 50 years I have been behind this desk, to keep politics out of the educational system. Despite its flaw... the situation is much improved today compared to when I first picked up a pen.

Obviously, I don't think the legislature should be signing off on the actions of the State School Board. I certainly don't think they need veto power to circumvent rules they don't find popular. If this law passes it will make every decision dependent on how it floats in the political arena of which ever party is in power. It's simply a bad idea. There is not enough lipstick in the world make this pig look good.

I also view the bill that will put political party affiliations back into the Board of Education an equally bad idea. Past legislative leaders have taken political affiliation out of races for various judge positions as well as the Board of Education. I can't for the life of me figure out the reasoning behind such a blatantly stupid move. It ain't broke folks, so it really doesn't need fixing!

There was at least one good intended bill that I saw last week. It was SB 513 which, if passed, would allow volunteer and partvolunteer fire departments to use state grants to enhance their recruiting efforts. When I joined, it was a privilege to belong to the fire department and help our neighbors in their time of need. Unfortunately, we have now come to a time when volunteering is not very popular. In fact, most everyone is "just too busy." Wait till you're laying in a ditch, injured from an accident, and no one is there to help you. I have been on both sides of that fence and believe me you will be very happy to hear that siren and see those trucks roll up. But every department in the State is suffering from manpower shortages. In our county we are having to rely on multiple departments to muster enough manpower to get the job done during most daylight hours.

The fire service has tried for years to get the legislature to recognize the devotion of volunteer fire companies. Little things, like free license plates for their vehicles. We have been told that would be too costly. There have been a number of measurers presented over the years. Most were more token recognition opposed to monetary gain. Yet, the elected official always had some excuse for not honoring the request. I have no idea if this year will be any different. History certainly indicates that elected officials as a whole, take us for granted. But, regardless, something is going to have to be done to attract interest to the fire service... else we are all in a very bad place!

The WVSACA organization is opposed allow athletics to precede academics and that is not the message we should be sending to our students, parents, and community members. Finally, transferring schools is always difficult on a student's academics. It is quite rare that schools have the same daily class schedules, course availability, and for each class to have the same pacing or coverage of material.

SB 586 will increase the likelihood of overzealous adults recruiting kids to play sports at a certain school. We must continue to provide as many safeguards as possible to keep adults away from pressuring kids to transfer to schools because of athletics. We respectfully

spotted some concerning things in legal ads before because legal ads in newspapers keep government activity in the public eye.

Second, the West Virginia Press Association estimates most newspapers receive about 60% of their ad revenue from legal ads. This bill is stupid because last year, the Legislature passed SB 642, which instructs the State Auditor to create a website for legal ads and continue to publish them in newspapers.

That website hasn't even been created yet, but the Legislature is already trying to amend the law to cut newspapers out entirely. Sincerely,



While this column is a legislative update, I think it fitting and proper to mention the heroism of the brave Ukrainian people and their military personnel as they defend their democracy against the war waged on them by Russian criminal leaders and aggressors. can be trusted has proven foolish and dangerous.

Last Tuesday and Wednesday were important days for central West Virginia and for higher education in our State. The House passed HB 4264, changing the designation of Glenville State College to Glenville State University. Not only did we pass the bill in the House last Tuesday; the House immediately transmitted the bill to the Senate where they suspended the rules and passed the bill moments later. Hundreds of Glenville State faculty, students, staff, community and county and community leaders, joined President Mark Manchin, the GSC Board of Governors for citations on the House and Senate floor and in the galleries to witness the legislative action.

By the end of the day, the completed bill had been enrolled and ready for the Governor to act. Thank you, House Speaker Hanshaw and Senate President Blair for coordinating and prioritiz-

ing this legislation. Then, last Wednesday morning, a small group of House and Senate members, along with GSU President Mark Manchin and some of his senior administrative staff, met for a bill signing ceremony in the Governor's office, making the legislative and executive action complete. GSC is now officially GSU. I'm proud to have a pen and signed copy of the bill to commemorate the event. As the bill's sponsor, I want to thank my friend, colleague, and fellow Gilmer Co. delegate, Speaker Roger Hanshaw, along with Delegates Steve Westfall, Dave Pethtel, Ed Evans, Ben Queen, John Kelly, and Laura Kimble. The bill passed both the House and Senate unanimously.

This action is more than merely a name change. It designates that Glenville State University has met the rigorous standards and requirements outlined and approved by the WV **Higher Education Policy** Commission and accreditation bodies that are necessary to attain university status. With the new Registered Nursing program beginning this fall; the ability to begin offering master's degree programs in some pro-

grams with more to come: with a renewed focus on teacher education; and working to improve oncampus, off-campus, and non-traditional student access, GSU is positioned to continue to meet the ever-evolving higher education needs of central West Virginia and well beyond.

Chances are that the vast majority of the readers of this column are former students of teachers, educators and administrators that earned their undergraduate degree at Glenville State. Moreover, with an institution that has the highest per capita rate of its graduates choosing to remain in West Virginia in pursuit of their careers and fields of study, this positive impact will continue to expand. University status is a noteworthy accomplishment, made even more special by coinciding with the 150th anniversary of this esteemed institution of learning. Congratulations Glenville State University!

stolen vehicle. The defense requested an alternative sentence be imposed by the court with the state staying silent per the plea Judge agreement. Facemire noted his previous violations of terms of the bond and his addiction issues he is not a good candidate for alternative sentencing. Shaffer was sentenced to one to five years in prison.

On February 4, James Douglas Key came before Judge Facemire with his attorney Andrew Chattin for a hearing on probation revocation. He admitted to allegations contained in the petition but requested to be readmitted to probation. The court denied the motion and sentenced the defendant to 10 to 25 years in prison on the felony offense of failure to register as a sexual offendersecond or subsequent offense.

On January 27, Tiffani Alison Moore and attorney Eric Wildman appeared in court for sentencing after her successful completion of the Anthony Center for Youthful Offenders. A motion for an alternative sentence was made by the defense with the state agreeing. The court granted the motion and suspended the one to five year sentence for the felony offense of possession of methamphetamine with intent to deliver. The defendant is to serve probation for five years.





Since there is a big debate about creamed tomatoes in our county, I thought I would research the history of the beloved dish. Creamed tomatoes or tomato gravy was born in Appalachia in a region where tomato gardens are plentiful and the fruit is canned and put up for winter. This was usually made when the cook had no milk on hand but a lot of the juicy tomatoes. Folks were poor and many had large families, so gravies were a way to stretch what they had to feed their family. This is a testament to the innovation and steadfastness of Appalachia. With all of that being said, I am not a fan of the dish but it was my mom's absolute favorite! She and my grandma would make this and it was like a treat for them. In almost every restaurant that we have gone into, it is on the menu; especially in small mom and pops.

I am sure most of you have your own recipe or one handed down for generations, but I found this one. Enjoy!

Creamed Tomatoes (for two)

6 Roma tomatoes, or 2 large beefsteak tomatoes, or a mixture blanched and peeled.

1/2 cup whole milk 2 heaping Table-

5 Tablespoon warm a crowd, water

2 Tablespoons sugar 1/8 teaspoon salt pepper to taste. For fresh tomatoes, and peel at least 6 Roma tomatoes or 2 large beefMELINDA FRAME

tomatoes boil enough water to cover tomatoes. Place tomatoes in boiling water for three minutes until skins wrinkle. Remove from heat and place in a sink or bowl of very cold water for about four minutes and slide peels sink tomatoes. Crush tomatoes with your hands into saucepan removing the core if it is white and tough. Simmer over medhigh heat until tomatoes soften and turn to a chunky sauce adding 1/2cup of milk. Stir mixture and heat back to simmer. In a cup or bowl put two heaping tablespoons corn starch and 5 Tablespoons warm water making a very runny paste. Mix until lumps are dissolved and pour slowly into simmering tomato milk mixture. Simmer until thick like gravy. Add two tablespoons sugar and 1/8 tsp salt and pepper to taste.

Prepare biscuits and bake until golden brown. Place biscuit on plate open-faced and top with a dab of real butter and cover with Creamed Tomatoes and enjoy the ripeness of summer all day long.

when there is no safe way to keep your loved one in their home or yours. My niece has allowed me to use one of many notes she has recorded each day of this journey. A note that is, of course, about a long, tiring, painful, ordeal. There have been some tender moments, some funny incidents, some dramatic episodes. I think she could use her daily journals to create a book or article that many might find interesting and maybe even helpful.

"I picked Aunt Pat up at about 4 pm to head to Holbrook.' Earlier, I dropped a car full off at Goodwill. Then Aunt Pat had the wonderful idea to call her neighbor, Dr. Carr, to see if the Parish House could use Mom's wheelchair and three walkers. She told me if I put them out on the porch he would come get them right then. He also took one cane, the shower seat, and the arm supports for Mom's toilet. It's wonderful to have so many big items removed. I have several bags of trash in the kitchen, but I think I can get ALL the trash out using Robin's method of filling up Mom's bin then putting a few in their bin. If I can't get it all next week. I will be able to get it all the week after. MOST of the trash is out. Every now and then I still find a pile of catalogs opened to that one special page amongst other debris, always in a place you wouldn't expect.

"Feeling fully capable of competently driving, I didn't hesitate to pick up Aunt Pat. I've had several adequate nights of sleep in a row and pray for one more tonight for the trip home tomorrow. Aunt Pat said Mom was dering where everybody was and she said we were both coming over and Mom was satisfied. The visit started out amiable. Mom was sitting at a 45 degree angle. She said she is having some back pain today, but the nurses knew how to get her more comfortable in bed. She says she can wait

"Her roommate was in and out of the room. We talked about Mom's apartment. At one point, Mom complains to herself, 'They are giving all my stuff away.' Later she says, 'I just don't have anything.' 






