



Wow! Last Friday night, all West Virginians were Pioneers, as the Glenville State University Lady Pioneer basketball team won the NCAA Division 2 National Championship! What a wonderful and amazing accomplishment, which validates the great talent, hard work and coaching skills and philosophy, led by Head Coach Kim Stephens. Only days before the championship game, Coach Stephens was awarded the honor of being selected as NCAA Women's Basketball Coach of the Year.

The GSU Lady Pioneers accomplishments of the season and NCAA tournament week are even more amazing when you consider the enrollment of GSU compared to the schools they defeated in the NCAA Elite Eight tournament:

Quarterfinals: West Texas A&M (Canyon, TX) 10,000 students Semifinals: Grand Valley University (Grand 25,000

Finals: Western Washington University (Bellingham, WA) 16,000 students

National champion: Glenville State University 1,600 students

All along the way, the support from students and GSU fans that turned out and traveled to the tournament and tuned-in on radio and TV was nothing short of amazing. I appreciate Coach Stephens giving a shout-out to the fans, recognizing them as the team's "sixth man". Also, several tournament, team and individual records were eclipsed by this Pioneer team throughout the 35-1 season. Making it even more special, 2022 is the 150th anniversary of the school's founding; and Glenville State was granted university status on February 22 by the Legislature during the just completed session.

The team arrived back home late Saturday night, picking up a WV State Police escort at the State line. By the time they arrived at Burnsville, a

sizable crowd gathered, picking up a long and loud convoy of supporters all the way to the Waco Center, where they were met with thunderous cheers, hugs, and lots of keepsake photos

There is much going on in the world right now. Problems abound, at home and abroad. But this shining moment, earned by the hard work and dedication of the Lady Pioneers is a time for GSU, Glenville, Gilmer County, Glenville State alumni, central West Virginia, and our entire State to celebrate. I have always been proud to be a graduate of Glenville State. I met my wife, Jean, on campus. I've been honored to represent Gilmer County and GSU in the Legislature for over a quarter century, building relationships for a lifetime. I am thrilled that GSU has turned the corner on facilities and academics, strengthening existing programs while offering new programs in areas of need for our State and region. The university is a leader in music and the arts. Good things are happening at GSU that benefit all West Virginians, now and into the future. You don't have to be the biggest to be the best.

As the Governor continues to pour over the avalanche of completed legislation as it's enrolled and

sent to his desk, I'm excited that he signed two bills last week that will enhance the margin for safety and wellbeing of special needs kids in our schools. First, the Governor signed SB 261, mandating more frequency and intentional review of video from special needs classrooms. The cameras were mandated a few sessions ago by the Legislature. SB 261 requires principals to also turn over the video recordings to investigators and attorneys for students and parents. This law further protects the classroom teachers from false claims of wrongdoing, while providing another layer of protections and safety for kids and their families.

Another bill, HB 4600, makes it a felony for a person in a position of trust to abuse a disabled child verbally or physically. It further makes it a felony penalty to fail to report abuse if it is witnessed. Previously, both offenses were classified as misdemeanor offenses.

West Virginia is blessed with outstanding and dedicated teachers and aids. Those teaching special needs students have chosen a field that is their professional calling. It is extremely rewarding, personally and professionally, but not without chal-

as predator numbers increase and habitat decreases. Whitetail deer stood at their highest level in the 1990s. While the fact that Epizootic Hemorrhagic Disease (EHD) and Chronic Wastnow prevalent point to new environmental conditions which raise concern. In order for our whitetail to have a chance at fighting off these diseases, our deer and wildlife require a healthy habitat to support them year around.

What is the "so what" of all this bad news? The "so what" is through conservation (hunting, fishing and habitat improvements) we can turn much of this species loss around. Additionally, there are state and federal programs which will help landowners cost share their efforts. You can receive funding for planting pollinator plots, thinning your timber, removing invasive species, etc....

This series of articles will focus on a variety of outdoor activities, programs, practices, and conservation updates to help you become a contributor and not just a consumer of our wildlife habitat. 
